3	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
4	SECTION 1. Subchapter A, Chapter 263, Family Code, is
5	amended by adding Section 263.0081 to read as follows:
6	Sec. 263.0081. FOSTER PARENT'S BILL OF RIGHTS. (a) In this
7	section:
8	(1) "Child-placing agency" has the meaning assigned by
9	Section 42.002, Human Resources Code.
10	(2) "Foster care" means the temporary placement of a
11	child who is in the conservatorship of the department or ar
12	authorized agency in a facility licensed or certified under Chapter
13	42, Human Resources Code, in which care is provided for 24 hours a
14	day.
15	(3) "Foster parent's bill of rights" means the rights
16	described by Subsection (c).
17	(b) The state recognizes that foster parents:
18	(1) play an important and significant role in the

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- 19 lives of foster children;
- (2) are an essential part of the child protective 20
- 21 services system; and
- (3) should be treated with respect by all employees of 22
- 23 the department and child-placing agency.
- (c) It is the policy of this state that, to the extent 24

- 1 provided by state or federal law or policy, each foster parent has
- 2 the right:
- 3 (1) to be treated with dignity, respect, and
- 4 consideration as a professional member of the child protective
- 5 services team;
- 6 (2) to be free from being discriminated against on the
- 7 basis of religion, race, color, sex, national origin, age, or
- 8 disability;
- 9 (3) to be assured that all members of the foster
- 10 parent's family are safe from physical violence, emotional abuse,
- 11 and harassment;
- 12 (4) to be given standardized preservice training,
- 13 including cultural competence training and appropriate ongoing
- 14 training to meet mutually assessed needs and improve the foster
- 15 parent's skills;
- 16 (5) to be informed of the contact information of and
- 17 the process to contact the appropriate child-placing agency or
- 18 other source to receive information and assistance and to access
- 19 supportive services 24 hours a day, seven days a week;
- 20 (6) to receive timely financial reimbursement
- 21 commensurate with the level of care the foster child requires,
- 22 considering any medical or psychiatric care specified in the
- 23 child's service plan, any previous hospitalization due to medical
- 24 or psychiatric care, and the child's runaway status;
- 25 (7) to receive post-placement counseling for loss,
- 26 <u>secondary trauma</u>, and grief;
- 27 (8) to communicate with other professionals who work

- 1 with foster children, including therapists, physicians, and
- 2 teachers;
- 3 (9) to be considered as a placement option for a foster
- 4 child who was formerly placed with the foster parent if the child
- 5 reenters foster care, subject to a determination that the placement
- 6 is consistent with the best interest of the child and any other
- 7 child in the foster parent's home;
- 8 (10) to refuse a placement;
- 9 <u>(11) to file a grievance and be informed of</u> the process
- 10 for filing a grievance;
- 11 (12) to be timely notified of and be provided access to
- 12 the appeals process of the department or child-placing agency, as
- 13 appropriate;
- 14 (13) to be free from acts of harassment and
- 15 retaliation by any other party when exercising the right to appeal
- 16 or refuse a placement;
- 17 (14) to be provided, in a consistent and timely
- 18 manner, any information:
- 19 (A) that is pertinent to the care and needs of the
- 20 child or to the child's permanency plan and essential to the foster
- 21 parent's understanding of the needs of and care required for the
- 22 child, including information regarding the foster child and the
- 23 foster child's family and information related to previous
- 24 placements; and
- 25 (B) that the child's family consents to disclose
- 26 regarding the child or the child's family;
- 27 (15) to be provided a clear, written accounting of a

1 child-placing agency's plan concerning the placement of a foster 2 child in the foster parent's home, including a summary of the foster parent's responsibility to support activities that promote the 3 foster child's right to relationships with the child's family and 4 5 cultural heritage; 6 (16) to provide comments concerning the service plan 7 for the child and to have those comments fully considered in the 8 same manner as information presented by any other child protective services professional; 9 10 (17) except as otherwise provided by a court order or when a child is at imminent risk of harm, to be provided written 11 12 notice of and a description of the reasons for: (A) changes in a foster child's case plan; or 13 14 (B) any plan to terminate the placement of the 15 child with the foster parent; 16 (18) to be notified of relevant staffing and scheduled 17 meetings regarding the foster child to allow the foster parent to actively participate in the case-planning and decision-making 18 process with regards to the child, including individual service 19 planning meetings, administrative case reviews, interdisciplinary 20 staffings, and individual educational planning meetings; 21 22 (19) to be provided timely, written notice of all court hearings, including the following details: 23 24 (A) the date and time; 25 (B) the name of the judge or hearing officer; 26 (C) the location; and

(D) the docket number;

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1	(20) to be reminded in writing that the foster parent
2	has a right to speak at the court hearings;
3	(21) to be informed of decisions made by the court or
4	the department concerning the child;
5	(22) to be provided a fair, timely, and impartial
6	investigation of any complaint concerning the foster parent's
7	<u>licensure;</u>
8	(23) to be provided an opportunity to have a person of
9	the foster parent's choosing present during any investigation;
10	(24) to receive mediation or an administrative review,
11	or both, regarding decisions that affect the foster parent's
12	license; and
13	(25) to be presented with a specific explanation of
14	any licensing corrective action plan, including the specific
15	licensing standard violated.
16	(d) The department or the child-placing agency that places a
17	<pre>foster child with a foster parent shall:</pre>
18	(1) provide the foster parent with:
19	(A) a written copy of the foster parent's bill of
20	rights; and
21	(B) the grievance process; and
22	(2) orally inform the foster parent of the rights
23	provided by the foster parent's bill of rights.
24	(e) The department's child protective services division or
25	a contractor shall provide the cultural competence training
26	described by Subsection (c)(4) to assist foster parents in
27	providing care that is respectful of the child's cultural identity

- 1 <u>and needs. The training must:</u>
- 2 (1) assist the foster parents in learning cultural
- 3 competence; and
- 4 (2) specifically address cultural needs of children,
- 5 including information on:
- 6 (A) skin and hair care;
- 7 (B) any specific religious or cultural practices
- 8 of the child's biological family; and
- 9 (C) referrals to community resources for ongoing
- 10 <u>education and support.</u>
- 11 (f) The commissioner of the department shall ensure that the
- 12 rules and policies governing foster care are consistent with the
- 13 state policy outlined by Subsection (c).
- 14 SECTION 2. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives
- 15 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as
- 16 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this
- 17 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this
- 18 Act takes effect on the 91st day after the last day of the
- 19 legislative session.
