H.B. No. 2381

A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT

relating to the establishment of the Texas Energy and Communications Commission to consolidate the functions of the Public Utility Commission of Texas and the Railroad Commission of Texas.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

ARTICLE 1. RAILROAD COMMISSION OF TEXAS REESTABLISHED AS TEXAS ENERGY AND COMMUNICATIONS COMMISSION

SECTION 1.01. The heading to Chapter 81, Natural Resources Code, is amended to read as follows:

CHAPTER 81. TEXAS ENERGY AND COMMUNICATIONS [~~RAILROAD~~] COMMISSION
[~~OF TEXAS~~]

SECTION 1.02. Section 81.001, Natural Resources Code, is amended to read as follows:

Sec. 81.001. DEFINITIONS. In this chapter:

(1) "Commission" means the Texas Energy and Communications [~~Railroad~~] Commission [~~of Texas~~].

(2) "Commissioner" means any member of the Texas Energy and Communications [~~Railroad~~] Commission [~~of Texas~~].

SECTION 1.03. Subchapter A, Chapter 81, Natural Resources Code, is amended by adding Section 81.003 to read as follows:

Sec. 81.003. TEXAS ENERGY AND COMMUNICATIONS COMMISSION.

(a) The Railroad Commission of Texas is reestablished as the Texas Energy and Communications Commission.

1 rights, contracts, records, employees, property, funds, and
2 appropriations of the Public Utility Commission of Texas are
3 transferred to the Texas Energy and Communications Commission on
4 September 1, 2022, as provided by this section.

5 (b) The Railroad Commission of Texas and the Texas Energy
6 and Communications Commission shall administer the transfer
7 described by Subsection (a) of this section. The Public Utility
8 Commission of Texas shall cooperate with and assist in the transfer
9 planning and administration.

10 (c) The Railroad Commission of Texas and the Texas Energy
11 and Communications Commission shall ensure that the transfer
12 described by Subsection (a) of this section does not adversely
13 affect a proceeding pending before the Public Utility Commission of
14 Texas or the rights of the parties to the proceeding.

15 (d) After the transfer has been completed, the Texas Energy
16 and Communications Commission shall prepare a written report
17 detailing the specifics of the transfer described by Subsection (a)
18 of this section and shall submit the report to the governor and the
19 legislature.

20 SECTION 2.02. On September 1, 2022:

21 (1) all powers, duties, functions, programs, and
22 activities of the Public Utility Commission of Texas are
23 transferred to the Texas Energy and Communications Commission;

24 (2) all obligations, rights, contracts, records, and
25 property in the custody of the Public Utility Commission of Texas
26 and all funds appropriated by the legislature to the Public Utility
27 Commission of Texas are transferred to the Texas Energy and

1 Communications Commission;

2 (3) all employees of the Public Utility Commission of
3 Texas become employees of the Texas Energy and Communications
4 Commission, to be assigned duties by the Texas Energy and
5 Communications Commission;

6 (4) the Public Utility Commission of Texas is
7 abolished; and

8 (5) a reference in law to the Public Utility
9 Commission of Texas means the Texas Energy and Communications
10 Commission.

11 SECTION 2.03. (a) On September 1, 2022, a rule, policy,
12 procedure, decision, or form adopted by the Public Utility
13 Commission of Texas that relates to the regulation of the electric
14 or telecommunications industries is a rule, policy, procedure,
15 decision, or form of the Texas Energy and Communications Commission
16 and remains in effect until altered by the Texas Energy and
17 Communications Commission. The secretary of state may adopt rules
18 as necessary to expedite the implementation of this subsection.

19 (b) On September 1, 2022, a rule, policy, procedure,
20 decision, or form of the Public Utility Commission of Texas that
21 relates to the management and daily operation of the Public Utility
22 Commission of Texas, to the extent of any conflict, is superseded by
23 the rules, policies, procedures, decisions, and forms of the Texas
24 Energy and Communications Commission relating to the management and
25 daily operation of the Texas Energy and Communications Commission.

26 SECTION 2.04. (a) The abolition of the Public Utility
27 Commission of Texas and the transfer of its powers, duties,

1 functions, programs, activities, obligations, rights, contracts,
2 records, property, funds, and employees to the Texas Energy and
3 Communications Commission does not affect or impair an act done,
4 any obligation, right, order, permit, certificate, rule,
5 criterion, standard, or requirement existing, any investigation
6 begun, or any penalty accrued under former law, and that law remains
7 in effect for any action concerning those matters.

8 (b) An action brought or proceeding commenced before the
9 effective date of a transfer prescribed by this Act, including a
10 contested case or a remand of an action or proceeding by a reviewing
11 court, is governed by the laws and rules applicable to the action or
12 proceeding before the transfer.

13 ARTICLE 3. CONFORMING AMENDMENTS

14 SECTION 3.01. Section 11.002(c), Utilities Code, is amended
15 to read as follows:

16 (c) Significant changes have occurred in the
17 telecommunications and electric power industries since the Public
18 Utility Regulatory Act was originally adopted. Changes in
19 technology and market structure have increased the need for minimum
20 standards of service quality, customer service, and fair business
21 practices to ensure high-quality service to customers and a healthy
22 marketplace where competition is permitted by law. It is the
23 purpose of this title to grant the Texas Energy and Communications
24 [~~Public Utility~~] Commission [~~of Texas~~] authority to make and
25 enforce rules necessary to protect customers of telecommunications
26 and electric services consistent with the public interest.

27 SECTION 3.02. Sections 11.003(4) and (5), Utilities Code,

1 are amended to read as follows:

2 (4) "Commission" means the Texas Energy and
3 Communications [~~Public Utility~~] Commission [~~of Texas~~].

4 (5) "Commissioner" means a member of the Texas Energy
5 and Communications [~~Public Utility~~] Commission [~~of Texas~~].

6 SECTION 3.03. Section 12.001, Utilities Code, is amended to
7 read as follows:

8 Sec. 12.001. TEXAS ENERGY AND COMMUNICATIONS [~~PUBLIC~~
9 ~~UTILITY~~] COMMISSION [~~OF TEXAS~~]. The Texas Energy and
10 Communications [~~Public Utility~~] Commission [~~of Texas~~] exercises
11 the jurisdiction and powers conferred by this title.

12 SECTION 3.04. Section 12.201, Utilities Code, is amended to
13 read as follows:

14 Sec. 12.201. PUBLIC INTEREST INFORMATION. (a) The
15 commission shall prepare information of public interest describing
16 the functions of the commission under this title and the
17 commission's procedures by which a complaint concerning a matter
18 subject to this title is filed with and resolved by the commission.
19 The commission shall make the information available to the public
20 and appropriate state agencies.

21 (b) The commission by rule shall establish methods by which
22 consumers and service recipients are notified of the name, mailing
23 address, and telephone number of the commission for the purpose of
24 directing [~~complaints~~] to the commission complaints concerning a
25 matter subject to this title.

26 SECTION 3.05. Sections 12.202(a) and (c), Utilities Code,
27 are amended to read as follows:

1 (a) The commission shall develop and implement policies
2 that provide the public with a reasonable opportunity to appear
3 before the commission and to speak on any issue under the
4 jurisdiction of the commission under this title.

5 (c) The commission shall prepare and maintain a written plan
6 that describes how a person who does not speak English may be
7 provided reasonable access to the commission's programs and
8 services under this title.

9 SECTION 3.06. Section [12.203](#)(a), Utilities Code, is amended
10 to read as follows:

11 (a) The commission shall prepare annually a complete and
12 detailed written report accounting for all funds received and
13 disbursed by the commission under this title during the preceding
14 fiscal year. The annual report must meet the reporting
15 requirements applicable to financial reporting in the General
16 Appropriations Act.

17 SECTION 3.07. Section [12.204](#), Utilities Code, is amended to
18 read as follows:

19 Sec. 12.204. INTERNET FOR HEARINGS AND MEETINGS. The
20 commission shall make publicly accessible without charge live
21 Internet video of all public hearings and meetings the commission
22 holds under this title for viewing from the Internet website found
23 at <http://www.puc.state.tx.us>. The commission may recover the
24 costs of administering this section by imposing an assessment
25 against a:

- 26 (1) public utility;
- 27 (2) corporation described by Section [32.053](#);

1 (3) retail electric provider that serves more than
2 250,000 customers; or

3 (4) power generation company that owns more than 5,000
4 megawatts of installed capacity in this state.

5 SECTION 3.08. Section 14.002, Utilities Code, is amended to
6 read as follows:

7 Sec. 14.002. RULES. The commission shall adopt and enforce
8 rules reasonably required in the exercise of its powers and
9 jurisdiction under this title.

10 SECTION 3.09. Sections 14.0025(a) and (b), Utilities Code,
11 are amended to read as follows:

12 (a) The commission shall develop and implement a policy to
13 encourage the use of:

14 (1) negotiated rulemaking procedures under Chapter
15 2008, Government Code, for the adoption of commission rules under
16 this title; and

17 (2) appropriate alternative dispute resolution
18 procedures under Chapter 2009, Government Code, to assist in the
19 resolution of internal and external disputes under the commission's
20 jurisdiction under this title.

21 (b) The commission's procedures relating to alternative
22 dispute resolution under this title must conform, to the extent
23 possible, to any model guidelines issued by the State Office of
24 Administrative Hearings for the use of alternative dispute
25 resolution by state agencies.

26 SECTION 3.10. Section 14.006, Utilities Code, is amended to
27 read as follows:

1 Sec. 14.006. INTERFERENCE WITH TERMS OR CONDITIONS OF
2 EMPLOYMENT; PRESUMPTION OF REASONABLENESS. In exercising its
3 jurisdiction under this title, the [~~The~~] commission may not
4 interfere with employee wages and benefits, working conditions, or
5 other terms or conditions of employment that are the product of a
6 collective bargaining agreement recognized under federal law. An
7 employee wage rate or benefit that is the product of the collective
8 bargaining is presumed to be reasonable.

9 SECTION 3.11. Section 14.007, Utilities Code, is amended to
10 read as follows:

11 Sec. 14.007. ASSISTANCE TO MUNICIPALITY. On request by the
12 governing body of a municipality, the commission may provide
13 commission employees as necessary to advise and consult with the
14 municipality on a [~~pending~~] matter pending under this title.

15 SECTION 3.12. Section 14.051, Utilities Code, is amended to
16 read as follows:

17 Sec. 14.051. PROCEDURAL POWERS. In exercising its
18 jurisdiction under this title, the [~~The~~] commission may:

- 19 (1) call and hold a hearing;
- 20 (2) administer an oath;
- 21 (3) receive evidence at a hearing;
- 22 (4) issue a subpoena to compel the attendance of a
23 witness or the production of a document; and
- 24 (5) make findings of fact and decisions to administer
25 this title or a rule, order, or other action of the commission.

26 SECTION 3.13. Sections 14.052(a) and (b), Utilities Code,
27 are amended to read as follows:

1 (a) The commission shall adopt and enforce rules governing
2 practice and procedure before the commission under this title and,
3 as applicable, practice and procedure before the utility division
4 of the State Office of Administrative Hearings under this title.

5 (b) The commission shall adopt rules that authorize an
6 administrative law judge acting under this title to:

7 (1) limit the amount of time that a party may have to
8 present its case;

9 (2) limit the number of requests for information that
10 a party may make in a contested case;

11 (3) require a party to a contested case to identify
12 contested issues and facts before the hearing begins;

13 (4) limit cross-examination to only those issues and
14 facts identified before the hearing and to any new issues that may
15 arise as a result of the discovery process; and

16 (5) group parties, other than the office, that have
17 the same position on an issue to facilitate cross-examination on
18 that issue.

19 SECTION 3.14. Sections 14.053(a) and (b), Utilities Code,
20 are amended to read as follows:

21 (a) The utility division of the State Office of
22 Administrative Hearings shall conduct each hearing in a contested
23 case under this title that is not conducted by one or more
24 commissioners.

25 (b) The commission may delegate to the utility division of
26 the State Office of Administrative Hearings the authority to make a
27 final decision and to issue findings of fact, conclusions of law,

1 and other necessary orders in a proceeding under this title in which
2 there is not a contested issue of fact or law.

3 SECTION 3.15. Section 14.054(a), Utilities Code, is amended
4 to read as follows:

5 (a) The commission by rule shall adopt procedures governing
6 the use of settlements to resolve contested cases under this title.

7 SECTION 3.16. Sections 14.057(a) and (b), Utilities Code,
8 are amended to read as follows:

9 (a) A commission order under this title must be in writing
10 and contain detailed findings of the facts on which it is passed.

11 (b) The commission shall retain a copy of the transcript and
12 the exhibits in any matter in which the commission issues an order
13 under this title.

14 SECTION 3.17. Section 15.001, Utilities Code, is amended to
15 read as follows:

16 Sec. 15.001. RIGHT TO JUDICIAL REVIEW. Any party to a
17 proceeding before the commission under this title is entitled to
18 judicial review under the substantial evidence rule.

19 SECTION 3.18. Section 15.002, Utilities Code, is amended to
20 read as follows:

21 Sec. 15.002. COMMISSION AS DEFENDANT. The commission must
22 be a defendant in a proceeding for judicial review under this title.

23 SECTION 3.19. Section 15.003(a), Utilities Code, is amended
24 to read as follows:

25 (a) A party represented by counsel who alleges that existing
26 rates are excessive or that rates prescribed by the commission are
27 excessive and who prevails in a proceeding for review of a

1 commission order or decision under this title is entitled in the
2 same action to recover against the regulation fund reasonable fees
3 for attorneys and expert witnesses and other costs for the party's
4 efforts before the commission and the court.

5 SECTION 3.20. Section 15.004, Utilities Code, is amended to
6 read as follows:

7 Sec. 15.004. JUDICIAL STAY OR SUSPENSION. While an appeal
8 of an order, ruling, or decision of a regulatory authority under
9 this title is pending, the district court, court of appeals, or
10 supreme court, as appropriate, may stay or suspend all or part of
11 the operation of the order, ruling, or decision. In granting or
12 refusing a stay or suspension, the court shall act in accordance
13 with the practice of a court exercising equity jurisdiction.

14 SECTION 3.21. Section 15.022, Utilities Code, is amended to
15 read as follows:

16 Sec. 15.022. CONTEMPT. The commission may file a court
17 action for contempt against a person who:

18 (1) fails to comply with a lawful order of the
19 commission under this title;

20 (2) fails to comply with a subpoena or subpoena duces
21 tecum issued under this title; or

22 (3) refuses to testify about a matter that is subject
23 to the commission's jurisdiction under this title and on which the
24 person may be lawfully interrogated.

25 SECTION 3.22. Sections 15.024(a), (b), (d), (e), and (f),
26 Utilities Code, are amended to read as follows:

27 (a) If the commission [~~executive director~~] determines that

1 a violation of this title or a rule or order adopted under this
2 title has occurred, the commission [~~executive director~~] may issue
3 [~~to the commission~~] a report that states:

4 (1) the facts on which the determination is based;
5 (2) whether [~~and~~] the commission proposes to impose
6 [~~executive director's recommendation on the imposition of~~] an
7 administrative penalty; and

8 (3) if a penalty is proposed, [~~including a~~
9 ~~recommendation on~~] the amount of the proposed penalty.

10 (b) Not later than the 14th day after the date the report is
11 issued, the commission [~~executive director~~] shall give written
12 notice of the report to the person against whom the penalty may be
13 imposed [~~assessed~~]. The notice may be given by certified mail. The
14 notice must:

15 (1) include a brief summary of the alleged violation;
16 (2) state the amount of the proposed [~~recommended~~]
17 penalty; and

18 (3) inform the person that the person has a right to a
19 hearing on the occurrence of the violation, the amount of the
20 penalty, or both the occurrence of the violation and the amount of
21 the penalty.

22 (d) Not later than the 20th day after the date the person
23 receives the notice, the person may accept the determination and
24 proposed [~~recommended~~] penalty of the commission [~~executive~~
25 ~~director~~] in writing or may make a written request for a hearing on
26 the occurrence of the violation, the amount of the penalty, or both
27 the occurrence of the violation and the amount of the penalty.

1 (e) If the person accepts the commission's [~~executive~~
2 ~~director's~~] determination and proposed [~~recommended~~] penalty, the
3 commission by order shall approve the determination and impose the
4 proposed [~~recommended~~] penalty.

5 (f) If the person requests a hearing or fails to timely
6 respond to the notice, the commission [~~executive director~~] shall
7 set a hearing and give notice of the hearing to the person. The
8 hearing shall be held by an administrative law judge of the State
9 Office of Administrative Hearings. The administrative law judge
10 shall make findings of fact and conclusions of law and promptly
11 issue to the commission a proposal for a decision about the
12 occurrence of the violation and the amount of a proposed penalty.
13 Based on the findings of fact, conclusions of law, and proposal for
14 a decision, the commission by order may find that a violation has
15 occurred and impose a penalty or may find that no violation
16 occurred.

17 SECTION 3.23. Section [15.025](#), Utilities Code, is amended to
18 read as follows:

19 Sec. 15.025. PAYMENT OF ADMINISTRATIVE PENALTY. (a) Not
20 later than the 30th day after the date the commission's order
21 imposing an administrative penalty under this subchapter is final
22 as provided by Section [2001.144](#), Government Code, the person shall:

23 (1) pay the amount of the penalty;
24 (2) pay the amount of the penalty and file a petition
25 for judicial review contesting:

26 (A) the occurrence of the violation;

27 (B) the amount of the penalty; or

1 (C) both the occurrence of the violation and the
2 amount of the penalty; or

3 (3) without paying the amount of the penalty, file a
4 petition for judicial review contesting:

5 (A) the occurrence of the violation;

6 (B) the amount of the penalty; or

7 (C) both the occurrence of the violation and the
8 amount of the penalty.

9 (b) Not later than the 30th day after the date the
10 commission's order is final as provided by Section [2001.144](#),
11 Government Code, a person who acts under Subsection (a)(3) may:

12 (1) stay enforcement of the penalty by:

13 (A) paying the amount of the penalty to the court
14 for placement in an escrow account; or

15 (B) giving to the court a supersedeas bond that
16 is approved by the court for the amount of the penalty and that is
17 effective until all judicial review of the commission's order is
18 final; or

19 (2) request the court to stay enforcement of the
20 penalty by:

21 (A) filing with the court a sworn affidavit of
22 the person stating that the person is financially unable to pay the
23 amount of the penalty and is financially unable to give the
24 supersedeas bond; and

25 (B) giving a copy of the affidavit to the
26 commission [~~executive director~~] by certified mail.

27 (c) The commission [~~executive director~~], on receipt of a

1 copy of an affidavit under Subsection (b)(2), may file with the
2 court, not later than the fifth day after the date the copy is
3 received, a contest to the affidavit. The court shall hold a
4 hearing on the facts alleged in the affidavit as soon as practicable
5 and shall stay the enforcement of the penalty on finding that the
6 alleged facts are true. The person who files an affidavit has the
7 burden of proving that the person is financially unable to pay the
8 amount of the penalty and to give a supersedeas bond.

9 (d) If the person does not pay the amount of the penalty and
10 the enforcement of the penalty is not stayed, the commission
11 [~~executive director~~] may refer the matter to the attorney general
12 for collection of the amount of the penalty.

13 SECTION 3.24. Section 15.026(a), Utilities Code, is amended
14 to read as follows:

15 (a) Judicial review of a commission order imposing an
16 administrative penalty under this subchapter is:

17 (1) instituted by filing a petition as provided by
18 Subchapter G, Chapter 2001, Government Code; and

19 (2) under the substantial evidence rule.

20 SECTION 3.25. Section 15.027(c), Utilities Code, is amended
21 to read as follows:

22 (c) The commission [~~executive director~~] may delegate any
23 power or duty relating to an administrative penalty given the
24 commission [~~executive director~~] by this subchapter to a person
25 designated by the commission [~~executive director~~].

26 SECTION 3.26. Sections 15.051(b) and (c), Utilities Code,
27 are amended to read as follows:

1 (b) The commission shall keep for a reasonable period
2 information about each complaint filed with the commission that the
3 commission has authority to resolve under this title. The
4 information shall include:

5 (1) the date the complaint is received;

6 (2) the name of the complainant;

7 (3) the subject matter of the complaint;

8 (4) a record of each person contacted in relation to
9 the complaint;

10 (5) a summary of the results of the review or
11 investigation of the complaint; and

12 (6) if the commission took no action on the complaint,
13 an explanation of the reason the complaint was closed without
14 action.

15 (c) The commission shall keep a file about each written
16 complaint filed with the commission that the commission has
17 authority to resolve under this title. The commission shall
18 provide to the person filing the complaint and to each person or
19 entity complained about information concerning the commission's
20 policies and procedures on complaint investigation and resolution.
21 The commission, at least quarterly and until final disposition of
22 the complaint, shall notify the person filing the complaint and
23 each person or entity complained about of the status of the
24 complaint unless the notice would jeopardize an undercover
25 investigation.

26 SECTION 3.27. Section 39.157(d), Utilities Code, is amended
27 to read as follows:

1 (d) Not later than January 10, 2000, the commission shall
2 adopt rules and enforcement procedures to govern transactions or
3 activities between a transmission and distribution utility and its
4 competitive affiliates to avoid potential market power abuses and
5 cross-subsidizations between regulated and competitive activities
6 both during the transition to and after the introduction of
7 competition. Nothing in this subsection is intended to affect or
8 modify the obligations or duties relating to any rules or standards
9 of conduct that may apply to a utility or the utility's affiliates
10 under orders or regulations of the Federal Energy Regulatory
11 Commission or the Securities and Exchange Commission. A utility
12 that is subject to statutes or regulations in other states that
13 conflict with a provision of this section may petition the
14 commission for a waiver of the conflicting provision on a showing of
15 good cause. The rules adopted under this section shall ensure that:

16 (1) a utility makes any products and services, other
17 than corporate support services, that it provides to a competitive
18 affiliate available, contemporaneously and in the same manner, to
19 the competitive affiliate's competitors and applies its tariffs,
20 prices, terms, conditions, and discounts for those products and
21 services in the same manner to all similarly situated entities;

22 (2) a utility does not:

23 (A) give a competitive affiliate or a competitive
24 affiliate's customers any preferential advantage, access, or
25 treatment regarding services other than corporate support
26 services; or

27 (B) act in a manner that is discriminatory or

1 anticompetitive with respect to a nonaffiliated competitor of a
2 competitive affiliate;

3 (3) a utility providing electric transmission or
4 distribution services:

5 (A) provides those services on nondiscriminatory
6 terms and conditions;

7 (B) does not establish as a condition for the
8 provision of those services the purchase of other goods or services
9 from the utility or the competitive affiliate; and

10 (C) does not provide competitive affiliates
11 preferential access to the utility's transmission and distribution
12 systems or to information about those systems;

13 (4) a utility does not release any proprietary
14 customer information to a competitive affiliate or any other
15 entity, other than an independent organization as defined by
16 Section 39.151 or a provider of corporate support services for the
17 purposes of providing the services, without obtaining prior
18 verifiable authorization, as determined from the commission, from
19 the customer;

20 (5) a utility does not:

21 (A) communicate with a current or potential
22 customer about products or services offered by a competitive
23 affiliate in a manner that favors a competitive affiliate; or

24 (B) allow a competitive affiliate, before
25 September 1, 2005, to use the utility's corporate name, trademark,
26 brand, or logo unless the competitive affiliate includes on
27 employee business cards and in its advertisements of specific

1 services to existing or potential residential or small commercial
2 customers located [~~locating~~] within the utility's certificated
3 service area a disclaimer that states, "(Name of competitive
4 affiliate) is not the same company as (name of utility) and is not
5 regulated by the Texas Energy and Communications [~~Public Utility~~]
6 Commission [~~of Texas~~], and you do not have to buy (name of
7 competitive affiliate)'s products to continue to receive quality
8 regulated services from (name of utility).";

9 (6) a utility does not conduct joint advertising or
10 promotional activities with a competitive affiliate in a manner
11 that favors the competitive affiliate;

12 (7) a utility is a separate, independent entity from
13 any competitive affiliates and, except as provided by Subdivisions
14 (8) and (9), does not share employees, facilities, information, or
15 other resources, other than permissible corporate support
16 services, with those competitive affiliates unless the utility can
17 prove to the commission that the sharing will not compromise the
18 public interest;

19 (8) a utility's office space is physically separated
20 from the office space of the utility's competitive affiliates by
21 being located in separate buildings or, if within the same
22 building, by a method such as having the offices on separate floors
23 or with separate access, unless otherwise approved by the
24 commission;

25 (9) a utility and a competitive affiliate:

26 (A) may, to the extent the utility implements
27 adequate safeguards precluding employees of a competitive

1 affiliate from gaining access to information in a manner

15 Sec. 152.301. ELECTRIC TRANSMISSION SERVICES AND
16 FACILITIES. Notwithstanding any other law, a river authority may:

17 (1) provide transmission services, as defined by the
18 Utilities Code or the Texas Energy and Communications [~~Public~~
19 ~~Utility~~] Commission [~~of Texas~~], on a regional basis to any eligible
20 transmission customer at any location within or outside the
21 boundaries of the river authority; and

22 (2) acquire, including by lease-purchase, lease from
23 or to any person, finance, construct, rebuild, operate, or sell
24 electric transmission facilities at any location within or outside
25 the boundaries of the river authority.

SECTION 4.01. The following are repealed:

- (7) Section 12.013(h), Water Code.

SECTION 4.02. This article takes effect September 1, 2022.

ARTICLE 5. TRANSITION; EFFECTIVE DATE

SECTION 5.01. The Railroad Commission of Texas shall adopt a timetable for phasing in the change of the agency's name so as to minimize the fiscal impact of the name change. Until January 1, 2022, to allow for phasing in the change of the agency's name and in accordance with the timetable established as required by this section, the agency may perform any act authorized by law for the Railroad Commission of Texas as the Railroad Commission of Texas or as the Texas Energy and Communications Commission. Any act of the Railroad Commission of Texas acting as the Texas Energy and Communications Commission after the effective date of this Act and before January 1, 2022, is an act of the Railroad Commission of Texas.

SECTION 5.02. Except as otherwise provided by this Act, this Act takes effect immediately if it receives a vote of

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1 two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as provided by
2 Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this Act does not
3 receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this Act takes
4 effect on the 91st day after the last day of the legislative
5 session.
