

R E S O L U T I O N

1 WHEREAS, An exemplary life dedicated to music and education
2 drew to a close with the death of former Amarillo College professor
3 Dr. Dale Alvin Roller on August 24, 2020, at the age of 90; and

4 WHEREAS, Dale Roller was born to Sylvester and Hattie Belle
5 Roller in Cleveland, Oklahoma, on February 1, 1930, and he grew up
6 with four brothers; inspired by two older brothers and his high
7 school music teacher, he studied music at college, earning
8 bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of Tulsa, and in
9 1974 he returned to school to earn a doctorate in music education
10 from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign; during the
11 Korean War, he served with the 657th Air Force Band, rising to the
12 rank of sergeant; and

13 WHEREAS, Dr. Roller began his career by teaching piano at the
14 University of Tulsa, and in 1956, he joined the faculty of Amarillo
15 College; over the course of his 35-year tenure with the college,
16 Dr. Roller taught piano, music history, and humanities, conducted
17 the school's choirs, and rose to become head of the music
18 department; he brought the Suzuki Program to the campus, and he
19 served as one of the college's most charismatic ambassadors,
20 persuading countless students across the Panhandle to apply for
21 admission; after retirement, he served for eight years on the
22 Amarillo College Board of Regents, including a year as chair, and he
23 was named professor emeritus in 2005; and

24 WHEREAS, In addition, Dr. Roller founded the Amarillo Master

1 Chorale in 1985 and the Amarillo Youth Choir in 1989, and he also
2 directed choirs at several area churches, including 22 years at
3 First Christian Church; he served on many local boards, including
4 the board of the Greater Southwest Music Festival, and for 30 years
5 he and his wife were executive secretaries for music for Region I of
6 the University Interscholastic League; from 2012 to 2019, he led
7 "The Happy Timers," an ecumenical vocal group for seniors; and

8 WHEREAS, In 1956, Dr. Roller was introduced to Betty Jo
9 Denman, a violinist for the Amarillo Symphony; the couple were
10 married in 1957 and went on to share 60 rewarding years together,
11 until her death in 2018; he was the proud father of three sons,
12 Scott, Kirk, and Jeff, and later in life he was blessed with seven
13 grandchildren and two great-grandchildren; and

14 WHEREAS, For more than six decades, Dale Roller was an
15 inspiring teacher, musician, and cultural leader in Amarillo,
16 bringing the gift of music to his fellow citizens and to generations
17 of students, and he leaves behind a legacy that will continue to
18 inspire all those who knew and loved him; now, therefore, be it

19 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives of the 87th Texas
20 Legislature hereby pay tribute to the memory of Dale Alvin Roller
21 and extend sincere condolences to the members of his family: to his
22 sons, Scott Roller, Kirk Roller and his wife, Anne, and Jeff Roller
23 and his wife, Carol; to his grandchildren, Sean Roller and his wife,
24 Theresa, Beth Roller and her husband, Josh Smothers, Josh Roller
25 and his fiancée, Maddie Jones, and Megan, Timothy, Blake, and Jenna
26 Roller; to his great-grandchildren, Marlene and Janosch; and to his
27 other relatives and friends; and, be it further
