A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

2	relating to the health literacy advisory committee and health
3	literacy in the state health plan.
4	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
5	SECTION 1. Section 104.002, Health and Safety Code, is
6	amended by adding Subdivision (6) to read as follows:
7	(6) "Health literacy" means the degree to which an
8	individual has the capacity to find, understand, and use health
9	information and services to inform health-related decisions and
10	actions.
11	SECTION 2. Subchapter B, Chapter 104, Health and Safety
12	Code, is amended by adding Section 104.0156 to read as follows:
13	Sec. 104.0156. HEALTH LITERACY ADVISORY COMMITTEE. (a)

- The statewide health coordinating council shall establish an 14
- advisory committee on health literacy composed of representatives 15
- of relevant interest groups, including the academic community, 16
- consumer groups, health plans, pharmacies, and associations of 17
- physicians, dentists, nurses, and hospitals. 18
- 19 (b) Members of the advisory committee shall elect one member
- 20 as presiding officer.
- 21 (c) The advisory committee shall develop a long-range plan
- 22 for improving health literacy in this state. The committee shall
- 23 update the plan at least once every two years.
- (d) In developing the long-range plan, the advisory 24

- 1 committee shall study the economic impact of low health literacy on
- 2 state health programs and health insurance coverage for state
- 3 residents. The advisory committee shall:
- 4 (1) identify primary risk factors contributing to low
- 5 health literacy;
- 6 (2) examine methods for health care practitioners,
- 7 health care facilities, and other persons to address the health
- 8 literacy of patients and other health care consumers;
- 9 (3) examine the effectiveness of using quality
- 10 measures in state health programs to improve health literacy;
- 11 (4) identify strategies for expanding the use of plain
- 12 language instructions for patients; and
- 13 (5) examine the impact of improved health literacy on
- 14 enhancing patient safety, reducing preventable events, and
- 15 increasing medication adherence to attain greater
- 16 cost-effectiveness and better patient outcomes in the provision of
- 17 health care.
- (e) Not later than December 1 of each even-numbered year,
- 19 the advisory committee shall submit the long-range plan developed
- 20 or updated under this section to the governor, the lieutenant
- 21 governor, the speaker of the house of representatives, and each
- 22 <u>member of the legislature.</u>
- 23 (f) An advisory committee member serves without
- 24 compensation but is entitled to reimbursement for the member's
- 25 travel expenses as provided by Chapter 660, Government Code, and
- 26 the General Appropriations Act.
- 27 (g) Sections 2110.002, 2110.003, and 2110.008, Government

- 1 Code, do not apply to the advisory committee.
- 2 (h) Meetings of the advisory committee under this section
- 3 are subject to Chapter 551, Government Code.
- 4 SECTION 3. Sections 104.022(e) and (f), Health and Safety
- 5 Code, are amended to read as follows:
- 6 (e) The state health plan shall be developed and used in
- 7 accordance with applicable state and federal law. The plan must
- 8 identify:
- 9 (1) major statewide health concerns, including the
- 10 prevalence of low health literacy among health care consumers;
- 11 (2) the availability and use of current health
- 12 resources of the state, including resources associated with
- 13 information technology and state-supported institutions of higher
- 14 education; and
- 15 (3) future health service, information technology,
- 16 and facility needs of the state.
- 17 (f) The state health plan must:
- 18 (1) propose strategies for the correction of major
- 19 deficiencies in the service delivery system;
- 20 (2) propose strategies for improving health literacy
- 21 to attain greater cost-effectiveness and better patient outcomes in
- 22 the provision of health care;
- (3) (3) propose strategies for incorporating
- 24 information technology in the service delivery system;
- 25 (4) [(3)] propose strategies for involving
- 26 state-supported institutions of higher education in providing
- 27 health services and for coordinating those efforts with health and

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- 1 human services agencies in order to close gaps in services; and
- (5) (4) provide direction for the state's
- 3 legislative and executive decision-making processes to implement
- 4 the strategies proposed by the plan.
- 5 SECTION 4. This Act takes effect September 1, 2023.
