4 (b) for the college readiness 5 performance standard as determined under Section 39.0241, the 6 percentage of students who performed satisfactorily on the 7 assessment instruments, aggregated across grade levels by subject 8 area; and

9 (ii) an indicator that accounts for the under 10 results of assessment instruments required Section 39.023(b), as applicable for the district and campus, including the 11 12 percentage of students who performed satisfactorily on the assessment instruments, as determined by the performance standard 13 adopted by the agency, aggregated across grade levels by subject 14 15 area; [<del>and</del>]

Section 6301 et seq.) 1 subject to the exclusions provided by Subsections (g), (g-1), 2 (q-2), (q-3), and (q-4); 3 4 (x) students who successfully completed an 5 OnRamps dual enrollment course; 6 (xi) students who successfully completed a 7 practicum or internship approved by the State Board of Education; 8 (xii) students who are awarded an associate degree; and 9 10 (xiii) students who successfully completed a program of study in career and technical education; 11 12 (2) in the school progress domain, indicators for effectiveness in promoting student learning, which must include: 13 14 (A) for assessment instruments, including 15 assessment instruments under Subdivisions (1)(A)(i) and (ii), the percentage of students who met the standard for improvement, as 16 17 determined by the commissioner; and (B) for evaluating relative performance, 18 the 19 performance of districts and campuses compared to similar districts 20 or campuses; and 21 (3) in the closing the gaps domain, the use of disaggregated data to demonstrate the differentials among students 22 23 from different racial and ethnic groups, socioeconomic 24 backgrounds, and other factors, including: 25 (A) students formerly receiving special education services; 26 27 (B) students continuously enrolled; and

2	(c-4) In evaluating the performance of elementary, middle,
3	and junior high school campuses and districts that include those
4	campuses in the student achievement domain, the commissioner shall
5	give equal weight to the indicators:
6	(1) adopted by the commissioner under Subsection
7	(c)(1)(A-1); and
8	(2) under Subsection (c)(1)(A)(i)(a) that account for
9	the results of assessment instruments.
10	SECTION 2. This Act applies beginning with the 2023-2024
11	school year.
12	SECTION 3. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives
13	a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as
14	provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this
15	Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this
16	Act takes effect September 1, 2023.
