A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT

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- 2 relating to required training regarding trauma-informed care for 3 certain judges and attorneys.
- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
- 5 SECTION 1. Subchapter A, Chapter 264, Family Code, is
- 6 amended by adding Section 264.016 to read as follows:
- 7 Sec. 264.016. TRAINING RELATED TO TRAUMA-INFORMED CARE.
- 8 (a) The department shall ensure that each attorney whom the
- 9 department employs or contracts with to represent the state in a
- 10 suit filed by a governmental entity under this subtitle seeking
- 11 termination of the parent-child relationship or the appointment of
- 12 <u>a conservator for the child completes a training program regarding</u>
- 13 trauma-informed care and the effect of trauma on children in the
- 14 conservatorship of the department.
- 15 (b) An attorney shall complete the training required by this
- 16 section before the attorney may represent the state in a suit
- 17 described by Subsection (a).
- 18 <u>(c) The training required by this section must include</u>
- 19 information regarding:
- 20 (1) the symptoms of trauma and the impact that trauma
- 21 has on a child, including how trauma may affect a child's
- 22 <u>development</u>, emotions, memories, behavior, and decision-making;
- 23 (2) attachment and how a lack of attachment may affect
- 24 a child;

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1 (3) the role that trauma-informed care and services can have in a child's ability to build connections, feel safe, and 2 regulate the child's emotions to help the child build resiliency 3 and overcome the effects of trauma and adverse childhood 4 5 experiences; (4) the importance of screening children for trauma 6 7 and the risk of mislabeling and inappropriate treatment of children without proper screening, including the risk associated with 8 increasing the use of psychotropic medication; 9 10 (5) the potential for re-traumatization of children in the conservatorship of the department; and 11 12 (6) the availability of: (A) research-supported, trauma-informed, 13 14 non-pharmacological interventions; and 15 (B) trauma-informed advocacy to increase a child's access, while the child is in the conservatorship of the 16 17 department, to: 18 (i) trauma-informed care; and 19 (ii) trauma-informed mental and behavioral 20 health services. 21 SECTION 2. Section 22.011, Government Code, is amended to read as follows: 2.2 INSTRUCTION RELATED Sec. 22.011. JUDICIAL 23 TO FAMILY 24 VIOLENCE, SEXUAL ASSAULT, TRAFFICKING OF PERSONS, CHILDHOOD TRAUMA, AND CHILD ABUSE. (a) The supreme court shall provide 25 26 judicial training related to the problems of family violence, sexual assault, trafficking of persons, childhood trauma, and child 27

- 2 (d) The instruction must include information about:
- 3 (1) statutory and case law relating to videotaping a
- 4 child's testimony and relating to competency of children to

- 8 (3) case law, statutory law, and procedural rules
- 9 relating to family violence, sexual assault, trafficking of

- 14 (5) available community and state resources for

- SECTION 3. The heading to Section 22.110, Government Code,
- 25 is amended to read as follows:
- Sec. 22.110. JUDICIAL TRAINING [INSTRUCTION] RELATED TO
- 27 FAMILY VIOLENCE, SEXUAL ASSAULT, TRAFFICKING OF PERSONS, CHILDHOOD

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- 2 SECTION 4. Section 22.110, Government Code, is amended by
- 3 amending Subsections (a), (b), and (d) and adding Subsection (d-2)
- 4 to read as follows:
- 5 (a) The court of criminal appeals shall assure that judicial
- 6 training related to the problems of family violence, sexual
- 7 assault, trafficking of persons, childhood trauma, and child abuse
- 8 and neglect is provided.
- 9 (b) The court of criminal appeals shall adopt the rules
- 10 necessary to accomplish the purposes of this section. The rules
- 11 must:
- 12 (1) require each district judge, judge of a statutory
- 13 county court, associate judge appointed under Chapter 54A of this
- 14 code or Chapter 201, Family Code, master, referee, and magistrate
- 15 to complete at least 12 hours of the training within the judge's
- 16 first term of office or the judicial officer's first four years of
- 17 service that includes:
- 18 (A) at [and provide a method for certification of
- 19 completion of that training. At] least four hours of [the] training
- 20 that:
- 21 <u>(i) is</u> [must be] dedicated to issues
- 22 related to trafficking of persons and child abuse and neglect; and
- 23 <u>(ii) covers</u> [must cover] at least two of the
- 24 topics described in Subsections (d)(8)-(13);
- (B) at $\left[\frac{(d)(8)-(12)}{At}\right]$ least six hours of

- 1 (C) for a judge of a court with jurisdiction over cases involving children in the conservatorship of the Department 2 of Family and Protective Services or children in the juvenile 3 justice system, at least three hours of training dedicated to the 4 training described by Subsection (d)(13); 5 6 (2) provide a method for certifying the completion of 7
 - the training described by Subdivision (1);
- 8 [. The rules must] require each judge and judicial officer to complete an additional five hours of training during 9 each additional term in office or four years of service, including: 10
- (A) at[. At] least two hours of [the additional] 11 training [must be] dedicated to issues related to trafficking of 12 persons and child abuse and neglect; and 13
- 14 (B) for a judge of a court with jurisdiction over 15 cases involving children in the conservatorship of the Department of Family and Protective Services or children in the juvenile 16 17 justice system, at least one hour of training dedicated to the training described by Subsection (d)(13); and 18
- 19 (4)[. The rules must] exempt from the training requirement of this subsection each judge or judicial officer who 20 files an affidavit stating that the judge or judicial officer does 21 not hear any cases involving family violence, sexual assault, 22 23 trafficking of persons, childhood trauma, or child abuse and 24 neglect.

- 8 (b) An attorney employed by or under contract with the
- 9 Department of Family and Protective Services on the effective date
- 10 of this Act to represent the state in a suit filed by a governmental
- 11 entity under Subtitle E, Title 5, Family Code, seeking termination
- 12 of the parent-child relationship or the appointment of a
- 13 conservator for the child, must complete the training required by
- 14 Section 264.016, Family Code, as added by this Act, not later than
- 15 September 1, 2024.
- SECTION 6. This Act takes effect September 1, 2023.
