5	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
6	SECTION 1. Section 104.002, Health and Safety Code, is
7	amended by adding Subdivision (6) to read as follows:
8	(6) "Health literacy" means the degree to which an
9	individual has the capacity to find, understand, and use health
10	information and services to inform health-related decisions and
11	actions.
12	SECTION 2. Subchapter B, Chapter 104, Health and Safety
13	Code, is amended by adding Section 104.0156 to read as follows:
14	Sec. 104.0156. HEALTH LITERACY PLAN. (a) The statewide
15	health coordinating council shall develop a long-range plan for
16	improving health literacy in this state. The council shall update
17	the plan at least once every two years.
18	(b) In developing the long-range plan, the statewide health
19	coordinating council shall study the economic impact of low health
20	literacy on state health programs and health insurance coverage for
21	state residents. The council shall:
22	(1) identify primary risk factors contributing to low
23	health literacy;
24	(2) examine methods for health care practitioners,

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1	health care facilities, and other persons to address the health
2	literacy of patients and other health care consumers;
3	(3) examine the effectiveness of using quality
4	measures in state health programs to improve health literacy;
5	(4) identify strategies for expanding the use of plain
6	language instructions for patients; and
7	(5) examine the impact of improved health literacy on
8	enhancing patient safety, reducing preventable events, and
9	increasing medication adherence to attain greater
10	cost-effectiveness and better patient outcomes in the provision of
11	health care.
12	(c) Not later than November 1 of each even-numbered year,
13	the statewide health coordinating council shall submit the
14	long-range plan developed or updated under this section to the
15	governor, the lieutenant governor, the speaker of the house of
16	representatives, and each member of the legislature.
17	SECTION 3. Sections 104.022(e) and (f), Health and Safety
18	Code, are amended to read as follows:
19	(e) The state health plan shall be developed and used in
20	accordance with applicable state and federal law. The plan must
21	identify:
22	(1) major statewide health concerns, including the
23	<pre>prevalence of low health literacy among health care consumers;</pre>
24	(2) the availability and use of current health
25	resources of the state, including resources associated with
26	information technology and state-supported institutions of higher
27	education; and

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(3) future health service, information technology,
 and facility needs of the state.

3 (f) The state health plan must:

4 (1) propose strategies for the correction of major5 deficiencies in the service delivery system;

6 (2) propose strategies for improving health literacy
7 to attain greater cost-effectiveness and better patient outcomes in
8 the provision of health care;

9 <u>(3)</u> [(2)] propose strategies for incorporating 10 information technology in the service delivery system;

11 <u>(4)</u> [(3)] propose strategies for involving 12 state-supported institutions of higher education in providing 13 health services and for coordinating those efforts with health and 14 human services agencies in order to close gaps in services; and

15 (5) [(4)] provide direction for the state's 16 legislative and executive decision-making processes to implement 17 the strategies proposed by the plan.

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SECTION 4. This Act takes effect September 1, 2023.

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
