BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: 6 7 SECTION 1. Subchapter A, Chapter 33, Education Code, is amended by adding Section 33.010 to read as follows: 8 9 Sec. 33.010. LIFE SKILLS ADVISOR PILOT PROGRAM. (a) In 10 this section: (1) "Crime of violence" has the meaning assigned by 11 12 Article 59.01, Code of Criminal Procedure. 13 (2) "Pilot program" means the life skills advisor 14 pilot program established under this section. (b) This section <u>applies only to a county that:</u> 15 16 (1) is adjacent to: (A) at least two counties that border the Gulf of 17 Mexico; and 18 (B) at least two counties that are located on the 19 international border; and 20 21 (2) is located within 50 miles of a county described by Subdivision (1). 22 23 (c) The commissioner shall: (1) establish a life skills advisor pilot program at 24

No. 3898 1 each high school campus located in a county subject to this section as a strategy for addressing emotional and mental health concerns 2 3 of students; and 4 (2) develop a mental health and safety curriculum for 5 use by life skills advisors under the program. 6 (d) Subject to Subsection (e), a school district located in a county subject to this section shall designate for each district 7 8 high school campus located in the county an educator employed by the district to serve as a life skills advisor under the pilot program. 9 (e) The number of life skills advisors in a school district 10 may not exceed the number of school counselors employed by the 11 12 district. (f) A life skills advisor serving at a high school campus 13 14 under this section shall: 15 (1) collaborate with school district administrators, school counselors, social workers, other appropriately 16 17 credentialed mental health professionals, and local law enforcement agencies to address mental health concerns affecting 18 19 students at the high school campus; 20 (2) provide instruction to students enrolled at the 21 high school campus relating to: 22 (A) skills and techniques to cope with anxiety, frustration, and other emotions; and 23 24 (B) the mental health and safety curriculum 25 developed by the commissioner under Subsection (c); 26 (3) counsel any students enrolled at the high school 27 campus who have committed a crime of violence or are identified as

2	(4) establish a life skills circle described by
3	Subsection (g) to assess certain student behavior and make a
4	recommendation regarding the appropriate disciplinary action a
5	school should take in response to that student behavior.
6	(g) A life skills advisor shall establish a life skills
7	circle to assess a student's behavior if an incident involving the
8	student occurs that:
9	(1) violates school policy;
10	(2) requires the involvement of law enforcement; and
11	(3) involves violence or drugs.
12	(h) A life skills circle established under Subsection (g)
13	must include the life skills advisor and students enrolled at the
14	high school campus.
15	(i) During a life skills circle, the life skills advisor
16	shall facilitate open discussion between participating students
17	regarding the relevant incident, including allowing students to ask
18	questions, speak to witnesses, and review evidence.
19	(j) Based on discussion during a life skills circle, the
20	life skills advisor and participating students shall make a
21	recommendation regarding the appropriate disciplinary action the
22	school should take against the student whose behavior is being
23	assessed and submit the recommendation to the school administrator
24	designated by the school district.
25	(k) A recommendation under Subsection (j) may include:
26	(1) restricting the student's participation in certain
27	extracurricular activities;

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1	(2) requiring the student to perform community
2	service; or
3	(3) a combination of the actions described by
4	Subdivisions (1) and (2).
5	(1) If the life skills advisor and participating students
6	find that the student did not violate school policy, the advisor and
7	students shall submit a letter to the designated school
8	administrator stating the finding.
9	(m) The school district shall consider the life skills
10	circle's recommendation when determining the disciplinary action
11	to take against the student.
12	(n) A school district located in a county subject to this
13	section may solicit and accept a gift, grant, or donation from any
14	source, including a foundation, private entity, governmental
15	entity, or institution of higher education to implement or
16	administer the pilot program.
17	(o) Not later than January 1, 2029, the commissioner shall
18	review the pilot program established under this section and submit
19	to the governor, the lieutenant governor, the speaker of the house
20	of representatives, and the presiding officer of each legislative
21	standing committee with primary jurisdiction over primary and
22	secondary education a written report regarding the progress made by
23	the pilot program in addressing emotional and mental health
24	concerns of students.
25	(p) The commissioner shall adopt rules necessary to
26	administer the pilot program.
27	(q) This section expires September 1, 2029.

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1 SECTION 2. (a) Not later than December 1, 2023, the 2 commissioner of education shall adopt rules necessary to implement 3 and administer the life skills advisor pilot program established 4 under Section 33.010, Education Code, as added by this Act.

5 (b) As soon as practicable after the effective date of this 6 Act, the commissioner of education shall develop the mental health 7 and safety curriculum required by Section 33.010(c), Education 8 Code, as added by this Act.

9 (c) The life skills advisor pilot program established under 10 Section 33.010, Education Code, as added by this Act, shall be 11 implemented in each public high school located in a county subject 12 to that section beginning with the 2024-2025 school year.

13 SECTION 3. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives 14 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as 15 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this 16 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this 17 Act takes effect September 1, 2023.
