HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

1 WHEREAS, Fifty students from several member institutions of 2 the Texas A&M University System are providing valuable support to the 88th Texas Legislature while gaining experience in public 3 service as members of the Agricultural and Natural Resources Policy 4 5 Internship Program, the Public Policy Internship Program, the Bush School of Government & Public Service Capstone Scholars Program, 6 7 the School of Law Residency Externship Program in Public Policy, and the Tarleton State University internship program; and 8 9 WHEREAS, For over three decades, the Agricultural and Natural Resources Policy Internship Program has sent students from the 10 11 Texas A&M University College of Agriculture & Life Sciences to 12 Austin, Washington, D.C., and abroad to work on a wide array of issues; their strong background and interest in agriculture and 13 14 natural resources allow them to offer specialized knowledge to offices; over 1,000 students have participated in this program to 15 16 date; the current ANRP interns are Victoria Benavides, Cameron Castillo, Sarah Denison, Bailey Halbert, William Howe, and Cason 17 18 Moorman; and WHEREAS, The Texas A&M University Public Policy Internship 19 Program, established in 1999, invites students across all Texas A&M 20 21 University degree programs to create an interdisciplinary environment for comprehensive academic training, research, and 22 23 policy programming; interns in the nation's capital, in Austin, and abroad serve in a variety of settings that align with their 24

- 10 WHEREAS, Since the 82nd Session, the Bush School of
- 11 Government and Public Service at Texas A&M University has sent a
- 12 select group of graduate students, known as Capstone Scholars, to
- 13 work in the legislature; these students, most of whom intend to work
- 14 in government positions when they graduate, bring knowledge,
- 15 skills, and motivation to their respective offices; their
- 16 legislative experiences add greatly to their professional
- 17 development and benefit the state of Texas in myriad ways; the
- 18 current Bush School Capstone interns are Tal Carson, Sydney De
- 19 Vault-Garvey, Israel Eisenbeiss, Willie Gonzales, Ryan Heare,
- 20 Taitelyn Morris, Aditya Prasetyo, Debbra Willis, and Abdulatif
- 21 Zaki; and
- 22 WHEREAS, The Texas A&M School of Law Residency Externship
- 23 Program in Public Policy, first offered in 2016, brings law
- 24 students to Washington, D.C., and Austin to serve in a variety of
- 25 legislative, executive, and advocacy settings that align with their
- 26 professional goals; students are selected for their academic
- 27 achievement, demonstrated interest in public service, and

- 1 completion of studies specific to legislation, regulation, and
- 2 substantive policy law; this preparation allows them to offer
- 3 advanced skills and knowledge to the policymakers and advocates
- 4 with whom they work; current Texas A&M Law Students are Michael
- 5 Chavarria, Meagan Corser, and McKenna Martinez; and
- 6 WHEREAS, Since 2010, Tarleton State University has sent
- 7 numerous interns to Austin and Washington, D.C., where they work on
- 8 an array of issues; their strong background and interest in public
- 9 policy, history, education, criminal justice, health care, and
- 10 agriculture, among other topics, equip them to offer specialized
- 11 knowledge to legislators; current Tarleton interns are Desirae
- 12 Garcia, Emilie Gaucin-Rodarte, Walker Kirk, Olivia Lasater, and
- 13 Kiara Owen; and
- 14 WHEREAS, Through the years, these programs have helped
- 15 exceptional students deepen their understanding of legislative
- 16 processes and general government functionality while developing
- 17 important professional skills and critical peer networks, and past
- 18 program participants have gone on to make vital contributions and
- 19 assume leadership roles in a variety of arenas; the outstanding
- 20 young people who are giving of their time and talents, with the
- 21 utmost integrity, throughout this legislative session can indeed
- 22 take pride in their achievements and selfless service to the Lone
- 23 Star State; now, therefore, be it

- 25 hereby recognize the 2023 Texas A&M University System policy
