9 WHEREAS, In addition to being a major employer of veterans, 10 the Socorro Police Department has established itself as a proud partner of the military community through its support for service 11 projects organized by the El Paso Veterans & Riders Association and 12 the 3rd Battalion, 133rd Field Artillery Regiment of the Texas Army 13 14 National Guard; these projects have included the 7th annual 15 Veterans Food Drive, through which the department helped collect and distribute over 11,000 pounds of food to area veterans and their 16 17 families, and Operation Appreciation, which involves delivering care packages to members of the Texas Army National Guard and public 18 19 safety personnel who are patrolling the Texas border; moreover, the department became the first law enforcement agency to complete the 20 21 Bataan Memorial Death March on March 19, 2023; and
