RESOLUTION

1 WHEREAS, The observance of World War II Veterans Capitol Day 2 on May 11, 2023, provides an opportunity to honor brave members of

3 the Greatest Generation for their selfless service; and

WHEREAS, On December 7, 1941, the United States was drawn

into the most devastating and consequential conflict in human

6 history; then-Texas Governor Coke R. Stevenson predicted that

7 Texans would rise proudly to the challenge of defending their

8 country, and he was proved correct by the long lines of volunteers

9 waiting eagerly to enlist at recruiting centers around the state;

11 WHEREAS, Although Texas in that era had but five percent of

12 the nation's population, the state provided seven percent of armed

13 forces personnel; by the end of the war, 750,000 Texans, including

14 12,000 women, had contributed to victory over enemy forces; the

15 majority of these service members were in the U.S. Army and the Army

16 Air Force, but nearly a quarter served in other branches; over

17 22,000 Texans made the ultimate sacrifice, a third of this number in

18 the U.S. Navy, Marine Corps., or Coast Guard; Texas A&M University

19 alone produced more officers than both of the extant military

20 academies together; and

21 WHEREAS, Individual Texans fought with great valor in all the

22 theaters of the war, and 33 were awarded the Medal of Honor; one

23 such honoree, Lieutenant Audie L. Murphy of Farmersville, was the

24 most highly decorated American of the Second World War; another

- 1 honoree, Private First Class Silvestre S. Herrera of El Paso, was
- 2 injured in a fight that led to the capture of eight enemy soldiers;
- 3 more than 150 generals and 12 admirals were either natives or
- 4 residents of Texas, the Supreme Allied Commander in Europe, General
- 5 Dwight D. Eisenhower, a Denison native who was stationed at Fort Sam
- 6 Houston when the war began; Admiral Chester W. Nimitz, appointed
- 7 Commander in Chief, US Pacific Fleet and Commander in Chief,
- 8 Pacific Ocean Areas following the attack on Pearl Harbor, was born
- 9 in Fredericksburg and descended from a pioneer Texas German family;
- 10 other Texans who served with particular distinction include Women's
- 11 Army Corp. Colonel Oveta Culp Hobby, who also served as a
- 12 parliamentarian in this chamber, Navy cook Doris "Dorie" Miller of
- 13 Waco, Marine parachuter Harlan Block, Major General Claire
- 14 Chennault of Commerce, and Major General James Earl Rudder of Eden,
- 15 among many others who we honor today; and
- WHEREAS, According to the National World War II Museum, as of
- 17 2022, 8,200 World War II veterans were living in Texas, the
- 18 fifth-highest number of all states in the U.S.; they represent 0.6
- 19 percent of the state's total veteran population of approximately
- 20 1,400,000; and
- 21 WHEREAS, Inspired by a deep sense of patriotism, love for
- 22 freedom, and opposition to tyranny everywhere, the veterans of
- 23 World War II answered their nation's call to duty, and it is indeed
- 24 fitting to express our enduring respect and admiration for their
- 25 courage and immeasurable fortitude; now, therefore, be it
- 26 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives of the 88th Texas
- 27 Legislature hereby recognize May 11, 2023, as World War II Veterans
