6	read as follows:

9	(1) the average number of students enrolled in the

14	[(2) for a district that operates under a flexible				
15	year program under Section 29.0821, the quotient of the sum of

17	Section 29.0821(b)(1) divided by the number of actual days of				
18	instruction as permitted by Section 29.0821(b)(1);				
19	[(3) for a district that operates under a flexible

1 the average <u>enrollment</u> [daily attendance] calculated under 2 Subdivision (1).

3 (b) A school district that experiences a decline of two 4 percent or more in average <u>enrollment</u> [daily attendance] shall be 5 funded on the basis of:

6 (1) the actual average <u>enrollment</u> [daily attendance] 7 of the preceding school year, if the decline is the result of the 8 closing or reduction in personnel of a military base; or

9 (2) subject to Subsection (e), an average <u>enrollment</u> 10 [daily attendance] not to exceed 98 percent of the actual average 11 <u>enrollment</u> [daily attendance] of the preceding school year, if the 12 decline is not the result of the closing or reduction in personnel 13 of a military base.

14 (c) The commissioner shall adjust the average <u>enrollment</u> 15 [daily attendance] of a school district that has a significant 16 percentage of students who are migratory children as defined by 20 17 U.S.C. Section 6399.

(d) The commissioner may adjust the average enrollment 18 [daily attendance] of a school district in which a disaster, flood, 19 extreme weather condition, fuel curtailment, or other calamity has 20 a significant effect on the district's enrollment [attendance]. In 21 addition to providing the adjustment 22 for the amount of 23 instructional days during the semester in which the calamity first 24 occurred, an adjustment under this section may only be provided based on a particular calamity for an additional amount of 25 26 instructional days equivalent to one school year. The commissioner may divide the adjustment between two consecutive school years. 27

(e) For each school year, the commissioner shall adjust the
 average <u>enrollment</u> [daily attendance] of school districts that are
 entitled to funding on the basis of an adjusted average <u>enrollment</u>
 [daily attendance] under Subsection (b)(2) so that:

5 (1) all districts are funded on the basis of the same 6 percentage of the preceding year's actual average <u>enrollment</u> [daily 7 attendance]; and

8 (2) the total cost to the state does not exceed the 9 amount specifically appropriated for that year for purposes of 10 Subsection (b)(2).

11 (f) An open-enrollment charter school is not entitled to 12 funding based on an adjustment under Subsection (b)(2).

If a student may receive course credit toward the 13 (q) 14 student's high school academic requirements and toward the 15 student's higher education academic requirements for a single course, including a course provided under Section 28.009 by a 16 17 public institution of higher education, the time during which the student attends the course shall be counted as part of the minimum 18 number of instructional hours required for a student to be 19 considered a full-time student in average <u>enrollment</u> [daily 20 attendance] for purposes of this section. 21

[(g=1) The commissioner shall adopt rules to calculate average daily attendance for students participating in a blended learning program in which classroom instruction is supplemented with applied workforce learning opportunities, including participation of students in internships, externships, and apprenticeships.]

<u>Time</u> [Subject to rules adopted by the commissioner under 1 (h) Section 48.007(b), time] that a student participates in an 2 3 off-campus instructional program provided by an entity other than a school district or open-enrollment charter school and approved by 4 the commissioner in accordance with commissioner rule [under 5 Section 48.007(a)] shall be counted as part of the minimum number of 6 instructional hours required for a student to be considered a 7 8 full-time student in average <u>enrollment</u> [daily attendance] for purposes of this section. 9

10 (i) A district or a charter school operating under Chapter 11 12 that operates a prekindergarten program is eligible to receive 12 one-half of average <u>enrollment</u> [daily attendance] under Subsection 13 (a) if the district's or charter school's prekindergarten program 14 provides at least 32,400 minutes of instructional time to students.

(j) A district or charter school is eligible to earn full average <u>enrollment</u> [daily attendance] under Subsection (a) if the district or school provides at least 43,200 minutes of instructional time to students enrolled in:

19 (1) a dropout recovery school or program operating 20 under Section 12.1141(c) or Section 39.0548;

(2) an alternative education program operating under
Section 37.008;

(3) a school program located at a day treatment facility, residential treatment facility, psychiatric hospital, or medical hospital;

26 (4) a school program offered at a correctional27 facility; or

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(5) a school operating under Subchapter G, Chapter 12. 2 (k) A charter school operating under a charter granted under Chapter 12 before January 1, 2015, is eligible to earn full average 3 enrollment [daily attendance] under Subsection (a), as that 4 5 subsection existed immediately before January 1, 2015, for:

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(1) all campuses of the charter school operating 7 before January 1, 2015; and

8 (2) any campus or site expansion approved on or after January 1, 2015, provided that the charter school received an 9 10 academic accountability performance rating of C or higher, and the 11 campus or site expansion is approved by the commissioner.

12 (1)A school district campus or charter school described by Subsection (j) may operate more than one program and be eligible for 13 14 full average enrollment [daily attendance] for each program if the 15 programs operated by the district campus or charter school satisfy all applicable state and federal requirements. 16

17 (m) The commissioner shall adopt rules necessary to implement this section, including rules that: 18

19 (1)determine the method to calculate the average number of students enrolled in a school district during a school 20 21 year;

(2) establish the minimum amount of instructional time 22 per day that allows a school district or charter school to be 23 24 eligible for full average enrollment [daily attendance], which may differ based on the instructional program offered by the district 25 26 or charter school;

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(3) $\left[\frac{(2)}{(2)}\right]$ establish the requirements necessary for a

1 school district or charter school to be eligible for one-half of 2 average <u>enrollment</u> [daily attendance], which may differ based on 3 the instructional program offered by the district or charter 4 school;

5 <u>(4)</u> [(3)] proportionally reduce the average 6 <u>enrollment</u> [daily attendance] for a school district if any campus 7 or instructional program in the district provides fewer than the 8 required minimum minutes of instruction to students; and

9 <u>(5)</u> [(4)] allow a grade or course repeated under 10 Section 28.02124 to qualify for average <u>enrollment</u> [daily 11 attendance] even if the student previously passed or earned credit 12 for the grade or course, if the grade or course would otherwise be 13 eligible.

(n) To assist school districts in implementing this section
as amended by H.B. 2442, [Acts of the] 85th Legislature, Regular
Session, 2017, the commissioner may waive a requirement of this
section or adopt rules to implement this section.

SECTION 2. Section 7.062(a), Education Code, is amended to read as follows:

(a) In this section, "wealth per student" means a school
district's taxable value of property as determined under Subchapter
M, Chapter 403, Government Code, or, if applicable, Section 48.258,
divided by the district's average <u>enrollment</u> [daily attendance] as
determined under Section 48.005.

25 SECTION 3. Section 11.052(f), Education Code, is amended to 26 read as follows:

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(f) If single-member trustee districts are adopted or

approved as provided by this section, the board shall divide the 1 school district into the appropriate number of trustee districts, 2 3 based on the number of members of the board that are to be elected from single-member trustee districts, and shall number each trustee 4 5 district. The trustee districts must be compact and contiguous and must be as nearly as practicable of equal population. In a district 6 with 150,000 or more students in average enrollment 7 [daily 8 attendance], the boundary of a trustee district may not cross a county election precinct boundary except at a point at which the 9 10 boundary of the school district crosses the county election precinct boundary. Trustee districts must be drawn not later than 11 the 90th day before the date of the first election of trustees from 12 those districts. 13

SECTION 4. Sections 12.106(a), (a-2), and (d), Education Code, are amended to read as follows:

(a) A charter holder is entitled to receive for the 16 17 open-enrollment charter school funding under Chapter 48 equal to the amount of funding per student in weighted average enrollment 18 19 [daily attendance], excluding the adjustment under Section 48.052, the funding under Sections 48.101, 48.110, 48.111, and 48.112, and 20 enrichment funding under Section 48.202(a), to which the charter 21 holder would be entitled for the school under Chapter 48 if the 22 school were a school district without a tier one local share for 23 24 purposes of Section 48.266.

(a-2) In addition to the funding provided by Subsection (a),
 a charter holder is entitled to receive for the open-enrollment
 charter school an allotment per student in average <u>enrollment</u>

No. 1703 1 [daily attendance] in an amount equal to the difference between: 2 (1) the product of: 3 (A) the quotient of: 4 (i) the total amount of funding provided to 5 eligible school districts under Section 48.101(b) or (c); and 6 (ii) the total number of students in average <u>enrollment</u> [daily attendance] in school districts that 7 8 receive an allotment under Section 48.101(b) or (c); and 9 (B) the sum of one and the quotient of: (i) the total number of students in average 10 enrollment [daily attendance] in school districts that receive an 11 allotment under Section 48.101(b) or (c); and 12 (ii) the total number of students 13 in 14 average enrollment [daily__attendance] in school districts 15 statewide; and 16 (2) \$125. 17 (d) Subject to Subsection (e), in addition to other amounts provided by this section, a charter holder is entitled to receive, 18 19 for the open-enrollment charter school, funding per student in average <u>enrollment</u> [daily attendance] in an amount equal to the 20 guaranteed level of state and local funds per student per cent of 21 22 tax effort under Section 46.032(a) multiplied by the lesser of: 23 (1) the state average interest and sinking fund tax 24 rate imposed by school districts for the current year; or 25 (2) a rate that would result in a total amount to which charter schools are entitled under this subsection for the current 26 year equal to \$60 million. 27

H.B. No. 1703 1 SECTION 5. Sections 12.263(a), (b), and (c), Education 2 Code, are amended to read as follows:

3 (a) Except as otherwise provided by this section, funding for an adult education program operated under a charter granted 4 5 under this subchapter is an amount per participant through the Foundation School Program equal to the amount of state funding per 6 student in weighted average enrollment [daily attendance] that 7 8 would be allocated under the Foundation School Program for the student's attendance at an open-enrollment charter school in 9 accordance with Section 12.106. 10

(b) For purposes of determining the average <u>enrollment</u> [daily attendance] of an adult education program operated under a charter granted under this subchapter, a student is considered to be in average <u>enrollment</u> [daily attendance, with a 100 percent attendance rate,] for:

16 (1) all of the instructional days of the school year, 17 if the student is enrolled for at least 75 percent of the school 18 year;

19 (2) half of the instructional days of the school year,
20 if the student is enrolled for at least 50 percent but less than 75
21 percent of the school year;

(3) a quarter of the instructional days of the school
year, if the student is enrolled for at least 25 percent but less
than 50 percent of the school year; or

(4) one-tenth of the instructional days of the school
year, if the student is enrolled for at least 10 percent but less
than 25 percent of the school year.

1 (c) A student enrolled in an adult education program 2 operated under a charter granted under this subchapter for less 3 than 10 percent of a school year may not be counted toward the adult 4 education program's average <u>enrollment</u> [daily attendance] for that 5 school year.

6 SECTION 6. Section 13.051(c), Education Code, is amended to 7 read as follows:

8 (c) Territory that does not have residents may be detached 9 from a school district and annexed to another school district if:

10 (1) the total taxable value of the property in the 11 territory according to the most recent certified appraisal roll for 12 each school district is not greater than:

(A) five percent of the district's taxable value
of all property in that district as determined under Subchapter M,
Chapter 403, Government Code; and

16 (B) \$5,000 property value per student in average 17 <u>enrollment</u> [daily attendance] as determined under Section 48.005; 18 and

19 (2) the school district from which the property will 20 be detached does not own any real property located in the territory. 21 SECTION 7. Section 13.102, Education Code, is amended to 22 read as follows:

Sec. 13.102. MINIMUM AREA AND <u>ENROLLMENT</u> [ATTENDANCE] REQUIREMENTS. A new district may not be created with an area of less than nine square miles or fewer than 8,000 students in average <u>enrollment</u> [daily attendance], and a district may not be reduced to an area of less than nine square miles or fewer than 8,000 students

1 in average <u>enrollment</u> [daily attendance].

2 SECTION 8. Section 13.283, Education Code, is amended to 3 read as follows:

Sec. 13.283. PAYMENTS REDUCED. The incentive aid payments shall be reduced in direct proportion to any reduction in the average <u>enrollment</u> [daily attendance] as determined under Section 48.005 of the reorganized school district for the preceding year.

8 SECTION 9. Section 19.009(d-2), Education Code, is amended 9 to read as follows:

10 (d-2) Beginning with the 2009-2010 school year, the 11 district shall increase the monthly salary of each classroom 12 teacher, full-time speech pathologist, full-time librarian, 13 full-time school counselor certified under Subchapter B, Chapter 14 21, and full-time school nurse employed by the district by the 15 greater of:

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(1) \$80; or

17 (2) the maximum uniform amount that, when combined with any resulting increases in the amount of contributions made by 18 19 the district for social security coverage for the specified employees or by the district on behalf of the specified employees 20 21 under Section 825.405, Government Code, may be provided using an amount equal to the product of \$60 multiplied by the number of 22 students in weighted average enrollment [daily attendance] in the 23 24 district during the 2009-2010 school year.

25 SECTION 10. Section 25.038, Education Code, is amended to 26 read as follows:

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Sec. 25.038. TUITION FEE FOR TRANSFER STUDENTS. The

1 receiving school district may charge a tuition fee to the extent that the district's actual expenditure per student in average 2 3 enrollment [daily attendance], as determined by its board of trustees, exceeds the sum the district benefits from state aid 4 5 sources as provided by Section 25.037. However, unless a tuition fee is prescribed and set out in a transfer agreement before its 6 execution by the parties, an increase in tuition charge may not be 7 8 made for the year of that transfer that exceeds the tuition charge, if any, of the preceding school year. 9

10 SECTION 11. Section 25.045(c), Education Code, is amended 11 to read as follows:

12 (c) A student who transfers to another school district under 13 this section may not be charged tuition. The student is included in 14 the average <u>enrollment</u> [daily attendance] of the district in which 15 the student attends school.

SECTION 12. Sections 25.081(e) and (f), Education Code, are amended to read as follows:

(e) A school district or education program is exempt from the minimum minutes of operation requirement if the district's or program's average <u>enrollment</u> [daily attendance] is calculated under Section 48.005(j).

(f) The commissioner may proportionally reduce the amount of funding a district receives under Chapter 46, 48, or 49 and the average <u>enrollment</u> [daily attendance] calculation for the district if the district operates on a calendar that provides fewer minutes of operation than required under Subsection (a).

27 SECTION 13. Section 25.087(d), Education Code, is amended

1 to read as follows:

(d) A student whose absence is excused under Subsection (b), 2 (b-1), (b-2), (b-4), (b-5), (b-7), (b-8), or (c) may not be 3 penalized for that absence and shall be counted as if the student 4 5 attended school for purposes of funding under Chapter 48 [calculating the average daily attendance of students in the school 6 district]. A student whose absence is excused under Subsection (b), 7 8 (b-1), (b-2), (b-4), (b-5), (b-7), (b-8), or (c) shall be allowed a reasonable time to make up school work missed on those days. If the 9 10 student satisfactorily completes the school work, the day of absence shall be counted as a day of compulsory attendance. 11

SECTION 14. Section 25.111, Education Code, is amended to read as follows:

Sec. 25.111. STUDENT/TEACHER RATIOS. Except as provided by Section 25.112, each school district must employ a sufficient number of teachers certified under Subchapter B, Chapter 21, to maintain an average ratio of not less than one teacher for each 20 students in average <u>enrollment</u> [daily attendance].

SECTION 15. Sections 25.112(a) and (b), Education Code, are amended to read as follows:

(a) Except as otherwise authorized by this section, a school
district may not enroll more than 22 students in a prekindergarten,
kindergarten, first, second, third, or fourth grade class. That
limitation does not apply during:

(1) any 12-week period of the school year selected by
the district, in the case of a district whose average <u>enrollment</u>
[daily attendance] is adjusted under Section 48.005(c); or

(2) the last 12 weeks of any school year in the case of
 any other district.

3 (b) Not later than the 30th day after the first day of the 4 12-week period for which a district whose average <u>enrollment</u> [daily 5 attendance] is adjusted under Section 48.005(c) is claiming an 6 exemption under Subsection (a), the district shall notify the 7 commissioner in writing that the district is claiming an exemption 8 for the period stated in the notice.

9 SECTION 16. Section 29.008(b), Education Code, is amended 10 to read as follows:

Except as provided by Subsection (c), costs of an 11 (b) approved contract for residential placement may be paid from a 12 combination of federal, state, and local funds. The local share of 13 14 the total contract cost for each student is that portion of the 15 local tax effort that exceeds the district's local fund assignment under Section 48.256, divided by the average enrollment [daily 16 17 attendance] in the district. If the contract involves a private facility, the state share of the total contract cost is that amount 18 remaining after subtracting the local share. 19 If the contract involves a public facility, the state share is that amount 20 remaining after subtracting the local share from the portion of the 21 22 contract that involves the costs of instructional and related For purposes of this subsection, "local tax effort" 23 services. 24 means the total amount of money generated by taxes imposed for debt service and maintenance and operation less any amounts paid into a 25 26 tax increment fund under Chapter 311, Tax Code.

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SECTION 17. Section 29.014(b), Education Code, is amended

1 to read as follows:

(b) A school district to which this section applies may
operate an extended year program for a period not to exceed 45 days.
[The district's average daily attendance shall be computed for the
regular school year plus the extended year.]

6 SECTION 18. Section 29.081(f), Education Code, is amended 7 to read as follows:

8 (f) The commissioner shall include а student who successfully completes a course offered through a program under 9 Subsection (e) in the computation of the district's or school's 10 average enrollment [daily attendance] for funding purposes. [For a 11 student who successfully completes a remote course offered through 12 the program, the commissioner shall include the student in the 13 14 computation of the district's or school's average daily attendance 15 with an attendance rate equal to:

16 [(1) the district's or school's average attendance 17 rate for students successfully completing a course offered in 18 person under the program; or

19 [(2) if the district or school does not offer courses 20 in person under the program, the statewide average attendance rate 21 for students successfully completing a course offered in person 22 under a program under Subsection (e).]

23 SECTION 19. Section 29.0822(d), Education Code, is amended 24 to read as follows:

(d) The commissioner may adopt rules for the administration of this section, including rules establishing application requirements. [Subject to Subsection (d-1), the commissioner shall

1 calculate average daily attendance for students served under this section. The commissioner shall allow accumulations of hours of 2 instruction for students whose schedule would not otherwise allow 3 full state funding. Funding under this subsection shall be 4 5 determined based on the number of instructional days in the school district calendar and a seven-hour school day, but attendance may 6 be cumulated over a school year, including any summer or vacation 7 8 session. The attendance of students who accumulate less than the number of attendance hours required under this subsection shall be 9 10 proportionately reduced for funding purposes. The commissioner may: 11 12 [(1) set maximum funding amounts for an individual

13 course under this section; and

14 [(2) limit funding for the attendance of a student 15 described by Subsection (a)(3) in a course under this section to 16 funding only for the attendance necessary for the student to earn 17 class credit that, as a result of attendance requirements under 18 Section 25.092, the student would not otherwise be able to receive 19 without retaking the class.]

20 SECTION 20. Section 29.184(b), Education Code, is amended 21 to read as follows:

(b) A student who attends career and technology classes at another school under a contract authorized by Subsection (a) is included in the average <u>enrollment</u> [daily attendance] of the district in which the student is regularly enrolled.

26 SECTION 21. Sections 29.203(a) and (c), Education Code, are 27 amended to read as follows:

1 (a) A student who under this subchapter uses a public 2 education grant to attend a public school in a school district other 3 than the district in which the student resides is included in the 4 average <u>enrollment</u> [daily attendance] of the district in which the 5 student attends school.

6 (c) A school district is entitled to additional facilities
7 assistance under Section 48.301 if the district agrees to:

8 (1) accept a number of students using public education 9 grants that is at least one percent of the district's average 10 <u>enrollment</u> [daily attendance] for the preceding school year; and

(2) provide services to each student until the student either voluntarily decides to attend a school in a different district or graduates from high school.

SECTION 22. Section 29.403(b), Education Code, is amended to read as follows:

(b) A student who is enrolled in a program under this
 subchapter is included in determining the average <u>enrollment</u> [daily
 attendance] under Section 48.005 of the partnering school district.

SECTION 23. Section 29.457(a), Education Code, is amended to read as follows:

21 In addition to other funding to which a school district (a) is entitled under this code, each district in which alleged 22 offender residents attend school is entitled to an annual allotment 23 24 \$5,100 for each resident in average enrollment of [daily 25 attendance] or a different amount for any year provided by 26 appropriation.

27 SECTION 24. Section 29.912(c), Education Code, is amended

1 to read as follows:

(c) The program must enable an eligible school district that
has fewer than 1,600 students in average <u>enrollment</u> [daily
attendance] to partner with at least one other school district
located within a distance of 100 miles to offer a broader array of
robust college and career pathways. Each partnership must:

7 (1) offer college and career pathways that align with 8 regional labor market projections for high-wage, high-demand 9 careers; and

10 (2) be managed by a coordinating entity that:

(A) has or will have at the time students are served under the partnership the capacity to effectively coordinate the partnership;

(B) has entered into a performance agreement approved by the board of trustees of each partnering school district that confers on the coordinating entity the same authority with respect to pathways offered under the partnership provided to an entity that contracts to operate a district campus under Section 11.174;

20 (C) is an eligible entity as defined by Section
21 12.101(a); and

(D) has on the entity's governing board as either voting or ex officio members, or has on an advisory body, representatives of each partnering school district and members of regional higher education and workforce organizations.

26 SECTION 25. Section 30.003(b), Education Code, is amended 27 to read as follows:

(b) If the student is admitted to the school for a full-time 1 program for the equivalent of two long semesters, the district's 2 share of the cost is an amount equal to the dollar amount of 3 maintenance and debt service taxes imposed by the district for that 4 5 divided by the district's average enrollment year [daily attendance] for the preceding year. 6

SECTION 26. Section 30.102(a), Education Code, is amended 7 8 to read as follows:

9 (a) The Texas Juvenile Justice Department is entitled to receive the state available school fund apportionment based on the 10 [daily attendance] in the department's average enrollment 11 educational programs of students who are at least three years of age 12 and not older than 21 years of age. 13

14 SECTION 27. Section 30A.151(f), Education Code, is amended 15 to read as follows:

16 (f) For a full-time electronic course program offered 17 through the state virtual school network for a grade level at or above grade level three but not above grade level eight, a school 18 district or open-enrollment charter school is entitled to receive 19 federal, state, and local funding for a student enrolled in the 20 program in an amount equal to the funding the district or school 21 would otherwise receive for a student enrolled in the district or 22 [The district or school may calculate the average daily 23 school. 24 attendance of a student enrolled in the program based on:

25 [(1) hours of contact with the student;

or

26 [(2) the student's successful completion of a course; 27

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[(3) a method approved by the commissioner.]

2 SECTION 28. Section 33.157, Education Code, is amended to 3 read as follows:

4 Sec. 33.157. PARTICIPATION IN PROGRAM. An elementary or 5 secondary school receiving funding under Section 33.156 shall participate in a local Communities In Schools program if the number 6 of students enrolled in the school who are at risk of dropping out 7 8 of school is equal to at least 10 percent of the number of students in average enrollment [daily attendance] at the school, 9 as 10 determined by the agency.

11 SECTION 29. Section 37.0061, Education Code, is amended to 12 read as follows:

Sec. 37.0061. FUNDING FOR ALTERNATIVE EDUCATION SERVICES IN 13 JUVENILE RESIDENTIAL FACILITIES. A school district that provides 14 15 education services to pre-adjudicated and post-adjudicated students who are confined by court order in a juvenile residential 16 17 facility operated by a juvenile board is entitled to count such students in the district's average enrollment [daily attendance] 18 19 for purposes of receipt of state funds under the Foundation School Program. 4 (ii) some amount of long-term indebtedness 5 outstanding or proposed to be issued that is rated in one of the 6 four highest rating categories for long-term debt instruments by a 7 nationally recognized rating agency for municipal securities, 8 without regard to the effect of any credit agreement or other form 9 of credit enhancement entered into in connection with the 10 obligation.

11 SECTION 79. Section 1431.001(3), Government Code, is
12 amended to read as follows:

(3) "Eligible school district" means an independent
school district that has an average <u>enrollment</u> [daily attendance]
of 190,000 or more as determined under Section 48.005, Education
Code.

SECTION 80. Section 325.011(a), Local Government Code, is amended to read as follows:

The district is governed by a board of directors 19 (a) composed of five members, with two directors appointed by the 20 21 commissioners court of the county, two directors appointed by the governing body of the municipality having the largest population in 22 23 the county, and one director appointed by the governing body of the 24 school district with the largest number of students in average enrollment [daily attendance] in the county. 25 The board shall 26 manage the district and administer this chapter.

27 SECTION 81. Section 1, Article 2688d, Vernon's Texas Civil

1 Statutes, is amended to read as follows:

Section 1. In all counties of the State where, according to 2 the preceding annual statistical report of the schools said county 3 has not more than four (4) school districts, with one (1) of such 4 5 districts comprising more than half of the county and having more than two thousand (2,000) pupils in average enrollment [daily 6 attendance] in the one (1) district alone, and such district having 7 8 an assessed valuation of more than Twenty Million Dollars 9 (\$20,000,000) and where there is only one (1) common school district in such county with an average enrollment [daily 10 attendance] of less than sixteen (16), the office of county 11 superintendent is hereby abolished, to be effective at the end of 12 the term of the incumbent county superintendent, as is now provided 13 14 by law.
