- 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
- 4 SECTION 1. Section 28.0095(a), Education Code, is amended
- 5 by adding Subdivision (5) to read as follows:
- 6 (5) "School district" includes the Windham School
- 7 <u>District.</u>
- 8 SECTION 2. Sections 28.0095(c), (e), and (f), Education
- 9 Code, are amended to read as follows:
- 10 (c) A student is eligible to enroll at no cost in a dual
- 11 credit course under the program if the student:
- 12 (1) is enrolled:
- 13 (A) in a grade level from 9 through 12 [high
- 14 school] in a school district or charter school; and
- 15 (B) in a dual credit course at a participating
- 16 institution of higher education; and
- 17 (2) was educationally disadvantaged at any time
- 18 during:
- 19 (A) the school year in which the student enrolls
- 20 <u>in the dual credit course described by Subdivision (1)(B); or</u>
- 21 (B) the four school years preceding the student's
- 22 enrollment in the dual credit course described by Subdivision
- 23 (1)(B).
- 24 (e) Each school district or charter school shall:

- 1 (1) on the [a high school student's] enrollment of a
- 2 student in a grade level from 9 through 12 in a dual credit course,
- 3 determine whether the student meets the criteria for the program
- 4 under Subsection (c)(2); and
- 5 (2) notify the institution of higher education that
- 6 offers the dual credit course in which the student is enrolled of
- 7 the district's or school's determination under Subdivision (1).
- 8 (f) A school district or charter school may make the
- 9 determination under Subsection (e)(1) based on the district's or
- 10 school's records, the agency's records, or any other method
- 11 authorized by commissioner or coordinating board rule. If the
- 12 district or school bases the determination on a method other than
- 13 the agency's records, the district or school shall report the
- 14 method used and the data on which the method is based to the agency
- 15 for purposes of verification. The agency shall make available to
- 16 school districts and charter schools any available and relevant

- 6 SECTION 4. Section 61.003(2), Education Code, is amended to

- 8 (2) "Public junior college" means any junior college
- 9 associated with a junior college district described by Subchapter
- 10 J, Chapter 130 [listed as a public junior college in accordance with
- 11 Section 61.063].
- 12 SECTION 5. Subchapter B, Chapter 61, Education Code, is
- 13 amended by adding Section 61.0275 to read as follows:
- Sec. 61.0275. ADOPTION BY REFERENCE. The board may adopt by
- 15 reference a manual or policy document as a rule.
- SECTION 6. Section 130A.005, Education Code, is amended by
- 17 adding Subsection (d) to read as follows:
- 18 (d) The coordinating board may use the emergency rulemaking
- 19 procedures established under Section 2001.034, Government Code, to
- 20 adopt rules necessary to align the funding formulas under this
- 21 chapter with appropriations or other legislative action. The
- 22 coordinating board is not required to make the finding described by
- 23 Section 2001.034(a), Government Code, to adopt rules under this
- 24 <u>subsection.</u>
- 25 SECTION 7. Section 130A.101(c), Education Code, is amended
- 26 to read as follows:
- 27 (c) The measurable outcomes considered for purposes of

- 1 performance tier funding are:
- 2 (1) the number of credentials of value awarded, as
- 3 determined by the coordinating board based on analyses of wages and
- 4 costs associated with the credential, including degrees,
- 5 certificates, and other credentials from credit and non-credit
- 6 programs that equip students for continued learning and greater
- 7 earnings in the state economy, with an additional weight for
- 8 placement of students who earn that credential in a high-demand
- 9 occupation, as defined by coordinating board rule, or an
- 10 appropriate proxy determined by the coordinating board based on
- 11 available data;
- 12 (2) the number of students who earn at least 15
- 13 semester credit hours or the equivalent at the junior college
- 14 district and:
- 15 (A) subsequently transfer to:
- (i) a general academic teaching
- 17 institution, as that term is defined by Section 61.003; or
- 18 (ii) a private or independent institution
- 19 of higher education, as that term is defined by Section 61.003, that
- 20 offers four-year degree programs; or
- 21 (B) are enrolled in a structured co-enrollment
- 22 program, as authorized by coordinating board rule; and
- 23 (3) the number of students who complete a sequence of
- 24 at least 15 semester credit hours or the equivalent for dual credit
- 25 or dual enrollment courses, as defined by coordinating board rule,
- 26 that apply toward academic or workforce program requirements at the
- 27 postsecondary level.

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- 1 SECTION 8. Subchapter C, Chapter 130A, Education Code, is
- 2 amended by adding Section 130A.102 to read as follows:
- 3 Sec. 130A.102. CREDENTIALS OF VALUE. (a) For purposes of
- 4 Section 130A.101(c)(1), the coordinating board shall designate a
- 5 credential as a credential of value if the credential:
- 6 (1) provides a positive return on investment for a
- 7 student who received the credential, as measured by earning or
- 8 being expected to earn cumulative wages at least equal to the
- 9 cumulative median earnings for high school graduates in this state
- 10 and earning at least the individual self-sufficient wage, as
- 11 defined by coordinating board rule, during the period specified by
- 12 coordinating board rule but not more than 10 years after the date on
- 13 which the credential is received; and
- 14 (2) allows a student who received the credential to
- 15 recoup the net cost of attendance at a public junior college,
- 16 <u>including opportunity cost</u>, where:
- 17 (A) the net cost of attendance is the net cost of
- 18 attendance used for purposes of financial aid at the college less
- 19 any aid received by the student; and
- 20 (B) opportunity cost is the difference between
- 21 cumulative median earnings for high school graduates in this state
- 22 and cumulative median earnings for students while enrolled in the
- 23 <u>certificate or degree program leading to the credential for:</u>
- (i) a period of two years for an associate
- 25 degree program;
- 26 (ii) a period of four years for a
- 27 baccalaureate degree program; and

- 1 (iii) a period determined by coordinating
- 2 board rule based on the program's design for a certificate or degree
- 3 program not described by Subparagraph (i) or (ii).
- 4 (b) The coordinating board shall calculate the return on
- 5 investment for a credential under Subsection (a)(1) using the most
- 6 current data available to the coordinating board from:
- 7 (1) the integrated postsecondary education data
- 8 system maintained by the National Center for Education Statistics;
- 9 (2) wage records obtained from the Texas Workforce
- 10 Commission;
- 11 (3) the American Community Survey by the United States
- 12 Census Bureau;
- 13 (4) the coordinating board's data reporting systems;
- 14 <u>or</u>
- 15 (5) other data sources selected by the coordinating
- 16 board.
- 17 (c) In adopting a definition of individual self-sufficient
- 18 wage for purposes of Subsection (a)(1), the coordinating board
- 19 shall ensure the definition is correlated with the statewide median
- 20 of the self-sufficient wage determined under Section 2308A.012,
- 21 Government Code.
- (d) The coordinating board may designate a credential in
- 23 education or health care as a credential of value regardless of
- 24 whether the credential meets the criteria under Subsection (a) if
- 25 the coordinating board determines the designation is necessary to
- 26 ensure the workforce needs of this state are met in those fields.
- (e) The coordinating board shall adopt rules as necessary to

- 4 SECTION 9. Chapter 2308A, Government Code, is amended by
- 5 adding Section 2308A.0115 to read as follows:
- 6 Sec. 2308A.0115. COORDINATION OF GRANT PROGRAMS FOR
- 7 SECONDARY AND POSTSECONDARY CAREER AND TECHNICAL EDUCATION
- 8 PROGRAMS. (a) For the establishment, implementation, and expansion
- 9 of secondary and postsecondary career and technical education
- 10 programs that are aligned with the state workforce development
- 11 goals, the agency, coordinating board, and commission shall
- 12 coordinate the competitive grant programs for those programs,
- 13 including:
- 14 (1) the Jobs and Education for Texans (JET) Grant
- 15 Program under Chapter 134, Education Code;
- 16 (2) the grant program established under the Pathways
- 17 in Technology Early College High School (P-TECH) program under
- 18 Section 29.556, Education Code;
- 19 (3) the Texas Reskilling and Upskilling through
- 20 Education (TRUE) Program established under Subchapter T-2, Chapter
- 21 61, Education Code; and
- 22 (4) federal career and technical education grant
- 23 programs, including grant programs under the Carl D. Perkins Career
- 24 and Technical Education Act of 2006 (20 U.S.C. Section 2301 et
- 25 seq.).
- 26 (b) In coordinating grant programs under Subsection (a),
- 27 the agency, coordinating board, and commission shall jointly:

- 1 (1) address career and technical education program
- 2 startup and delivery costs by aligning two or more grant funding
- 3 streams;
- 4 (2) identify and work to reduce duplication in grant
- 5 programs across the agency, coordinating board, and commission;
- 6 (3) identify opportunities to structure grant funding
- 7 for career and technical education projects that support
- 8 secondary-to-postsecondary career pathways, including by providing
- 9 for career and technical education dual credit or the attainment of
- 10 postsecondary credentials by secondary students;
- 11 (4) identify opportunities to structure grant funding
- 12 for career and technical education projects that are:
- 13 (A) aligned with the attainment of credentials of
- 14 value, as designated by the coordinating board for purposes of
- 15 Section 130A.101(c)(1), Education Code; and
- 16 (B) designed to meet state workforce needs in
- 17 high-demand fields; and
- 18 (5) to the extent possible, prioritize comprehensive
- 19 funding of facilities, equipment, instructional materials, and
- 20 faculty and staff for program development and delivery to best meet
- 21 the state workforce development goals.
- SECTION 10. Section 204.0025, Labor Code, is amended to
- 23 read as follows:
- Sec. 204.0025. ADDITIONAL WORKFORCE DATA REPORTING. The
- 25 commission shall [It is the intent of the legislature that the
- 26 commission, subject to the availability of federal funding or other
- 27 resources for the purpose, work with employers to enhance the

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- 1 reporting of employment and earnings data by employers to the
- 2 commission as part of an employer's routine wage filings under this
- 3 subtitle or commission rule and consistent with federal law and
- 4 regulations. The enhanced wage filings must include information
- 5 related to wage, industry, occupational field, full-time and
- 6 part-time status, county of primary employment, remote work status,
- 7 [occupation] and other important employment information necessary
- 8 to conduct the assessment required under Section 302.0205 [that
- 9 would improve the state's labor market information].
- 10 SECTION 11. Subchapter A, Chapter 302, Labor Code, is
- 11 amended by adding Section 302.0205 to read as follows:
- 12 Sec. 302.0205. REGIONAL LABOR DEMAND ASSESSMENT. (a) In
- 13 this section, "institution of higher education" has the meaning
- 14 assigned by Section 61.003, Education Code.
- 15 (b) The commission shall conduct a biennial assessment of
- 16 <u>available regional labor demands across this state using the best</u>
- 17 available state and federal labor market data, as determined by the
- 18 commission, to allow institutions of higher education to better
- 19 align educational programs with workforce needs. The assessment
- 20 must:
- 21 (1) analyze current and projected workforce needs in
- 22 <u>each region of this state over a 10-year period, disaggregated to</u>
- 23 the extent possible by wage, industry, occupational field,
- 24 full-time and part-time status, county of primary employment, and
- 25 remote work status; and
- 26 (2) identify for each region and county of this state
- 27 the industries and occupations that lead to an individual

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- 1 self-sufficient wage, as defined by Texas Higher Education
- 2 Coordinating Board rule in accordance with Section 130A.102,
- 3 Education Code.
- 4 (c) The commission may coordinate with other state
- 5 agencies, including the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board
- 6 and the Texas Education Agency, to conduct the assessment under
- 7 this section.
- 8 <u>(d) In conducting the assessment under this section, the</u>
- 9 commission may:
- 10 (1) obtain any data the commission is authorized by
- 11 law to obtain from a state or federal agency or institution of
- 12 higher education at no cost to the commission;
- 13 (2) obtain expedited access at no cost to the
- 14 commission to data available through a center for education
- 15 <u>research established under Section 1.005, Education Code; and</u>
- 16 (3) contract with a state agency or institution of
- 17 higher education to conduct or assist in conducting the assessment.
- 18 (e) If the commission contracts with an institution of
- 19 higher education to conduct or assist in conducting the assessment
- 20 under Subsection (d)(3), the Texas Higher Education Coordinating
- 21 Board and the Texas Education Agency shall enter into a data sharing
- 22 agreement with the institution to provide to the institution any
- 23 data necessary to conduct the assessment.
- 24 (f) Not later than March 1 of each odd-numbered year, the
- 25 commission shall provide the results of the assessment to:
- 26 (1) the governor;
- 27 (2) the lieutenant governor;

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- 1 (3) the speaker of the house of representatives;
- 2 (4) the standing legislative committees with primary
- 3 jurisdiction over higher education;
- 4 (5) the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board;
- 5 (6) the Texas Education Agency;
- 6 (7) institutions of higher education; and
- 7 <u>(8) public schools.</u>
- 8 SECTION 12. Section 28.0095, Education Code, as amended by 9 this Act, applies beginning with the 2025-2026 school year.
- 10 SECTION 13. The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board
- 11 may identify rules required by the passage of Section 56.0035,
- 12 Education Code, as added by this Act, that must be adopted on an
- 13 emergency basis for purposes of the 2025-2026 academic year and may
- 14 use the procedures established under Section 2001.034, Government
- 15 Code, for adopting those rules. The coordinating board is not
- 16 required to make the finding described by Section 2001.034(a),
- 17 Government Code, to adopt emergency rules under this section.
- 18 SECTION 14. Not later than December 1, 2026, the Texas
- 19 Higher Education Coordinating Board shall evaluate the data
- 20 available under Section 204.0025, Labor Code, as amended by this
- 21 Act, to identify the effects of transitioning to a county-by-county
- 22 definition of individual self-sufficient wage for purposes of
- 23 Section 130A.102, Education Code, as added by this Act.
- SECTION 15. (a) Section 130A.102, Education Code, as added
- 25 by this Act, applies to associate degrees awarded by a public junior
- 26 college beginning with the 2025-2026 academic year. That section
- 27 applies to other degrees and certificates awarded by a public

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- 1 junior college beginning with the 2027-2028 academic year.
- 2 (b) Not later than August 1, 2027, the Texas Higher
- 3 Education Coordinating Board, in consultation with the standing
- 4 advisory committee established under Section 130.001, Education
- 5 Code, shall adopt rules implementing Section 130A.102, Education
- 6 Code, as added by this Act, for each certificate program offered by
- 7 a public junior college.
- 8 SECTION 16. (a) Except as provided by Subsection (b) of this
- 9 section, this Act takes effect immediately if it receives a vote of
- 10 two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as provided by
- 11 Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this Act does not
- 12 receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this Act takes
- 13 effect September 1, 2025.
- 14 (b) Section 130A.101(c), Education Code, as amended by this
- 15 Act, and Section 130A.102, Education Code, as added by this Act,
- 16 take effect September 1, 2025.
