- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
- 5 SECTION 1. The heading to Article 42.0372, Code of Criminal
- Procedure, is amended to read as follows: 6
- Art. 42.0372. MANDATORY RESTITUTION FOR [CHILD] VICTIMS OF 7
- TRAFFICKING OF PERSONS OR [COMPELLING] PROSTITUTION 8 RELATED
- 9 OFFENSES.

- SECTION 2. Article 42.0372(a), Code of Criminal Procedure, 10
- is amended to read as follows: 11
- (a) The court shall order a defendant convicted of an 12
- offense under Chapter 20A or Subchapter A, Chapter 43 [Section 13
- 20A.02 or 43.05(a)(2)], Penal Code, to pay restitution in an amount 14
- 15 equal to:
- 16 (1) the cost of necessary rehabilitation, including
- medical, psychiatric, and psychological care and treatment; and 17
- (2) the cost of the removal of a tattoo the victim 18
- 19 received as a result of force, fraud, or coercion related to the
- offense[, for any victim of the offense who is younger than 18 years 20
- 21 of age].
- 22 SECTION 3. Article 56B.003(10), Code of Criminal Procedure,
- is amended to read as follows: 23

- 1 (10) "Pecuniary loss" means the amount of the expense
- 2 reasonably and necessarily incurred as a result of personal injury
- 3 or death for:
- 4 (A) medical, hospital, nursing, or psychiatric
- 5 care or counseling, or physical therapy;
- 6 (B) actual loss of past earnings and anticipated
- 7 loss of future earnings and necessary travel expenses because of:
- 8 (i) a disability resulting from the
- 9 personal injury;
- 10 (ii) the receipt of medically indicated
- 11 services related to the disability; or
- 12 (iii) participation in or attendance at
- 13 investigative, prosecutorial, or judicial processes or any
- 14 postconviction or postadjudication proceeding relating to
- 15 criminally injurious conduct;
- 16 (C) care of a child or dependent, including
- 17 specialized care for a child who is a victim;
- 18 (D) funeral and burial expenses, including, for a
- 19 family member or household member of the victim, the necessary
- 20 expenses of traveling to and attending the funeral;
- 21 (E) loss of support to a dependent, consistent
- 22 with Article 56B.057(b)(5);
- 23 (F) reasonable and necessary costs of cleaning
- 24 the crime scene;
- 25 (G) reasonable replacement costs for clothing,
- 26 bedding, or property of the victim seized as evidence or rendered
- 27 unusable as a result of the criminal investigation;

- 1 (H) reasonable and necessary costs for
- 2 relocation and housing rental assistance payments as provided by
- 3 Articles 56B.106(c) and (c-1);
- 4 (I) for a family member or household member of a
- 5 deceased victim, bereavement leave; [and]
- 6 (J) reasonable and necessary costs of traveling
- 7 to and from a place of execution to witness the execution, including
- 8 lodging near the place where the execution is conducted; and
- 9 <u>(K) tattoo removal as provided by Article</u>
- 10 56B.106(c-4).
- 11 SECTION 4. Article 56B.106, Code of Criminal Procedure, is
- 12 amended by adding Subsection (c-4) to read as follows:
- 13 <u>(c-4)</u> A victim of trafficking of persons may receive
- 14 compensation in an amount not to exceed \$3,000 for the removal of a
- 15 tattoo the victim received as a result of force, fraud, or coercion
- 16 related to the applicable offense.
- 17 SECTION 5. The changes in law made by this Act apply only to
- 18 an offense committed on or after the effective date of this Act. An
- 19 offense committed before the effective date of this Act is governed
- 20 by the law in effect on the date the offense was committed, and the
- 21 former law is continued in effect for that purpose. For purposes of
- 22 this section, an offense was committed before the effective date of
- 23 this Act if any element of the offense occurred before that date.
- 24 SECTION 6. This Act takes effect September 1, 2025.
