- 5 SECTION 1. Section 492.0131, Government Code, is amended to
- 6 read as follows:
- 7 Sec. 492.0131. PAROLE RULES, POLICIES, PROCEDURES. The
- 8 board and the <u>presiding officer of the</u> Board of Pardons and Paroles
- 9 [Policy Board] shall jointly review all rules, policies, and
- 10 procedures of the department and the Board of Pardons and Paroles
- 11 that relate to or affect the operation of the parole process. The
- 12 board and the <u>presiding officer of the Board of Pardons and Paroles</u>
- 13 [policy board] shall identify areas of inconsistency between the
- 14 department and the Board of Pardons and Paroles and shall amend
- 15 rules or change policies and procedures as necessary for consistent
- 16 operation of the parole process.
- 17 SECTION 2. Section 508.001, Government Code, is amended by
- 18 amending Subdivision (8) and adding Subdivision (10) to read as
- 19 follows:
- 20 (8) "Parole commissioner" means a person employed by
- 21 the board to perform the duties described by Section 508.0441
- 22 ["Policy board" means the Board of Pardons and Paroles Policy
- 23 Board].
- 24 (10) "Presiding officer" means the presiding officer

- of the Board of Pardons and Paroles.
- 2 SECTION 3. Section 508.031(a), Government Code, is amended
- 3 to read as follows:
- 4 (a) The board consists of seven [18] members appointed by
- 5 the governor with the advice and consent of the senate.
- 6 SECTION 4. Section 508.032, Government Code, is amended by
- 7 adding Subsections (c)-(e) to read as follows:
- 8 (c) A person who is a former employee of the department may
- 9 not serve on the board before the second anniversary of the date the
- 10 person terminated employment with the department.
- 11 (d) At any time not more than three members of the board may
- 12 <u>be former employees of the department.</u>
- (e) For purposes of Subsections (c) and (d), previous
- 14 service as a board member is not considered to be employment with
- 15 the department.
- SECTION 5. Section 508.034, Government Code, is amended to
- 17 read as follows:
- 18 Sec. 508.034. GROUNDS FOR REMOVAL. (a) It is a ground for
- 19 removal from the board that a member:
- 20 (1) does not have at the time of taking office the
- 21 qualification required by Section 508.032(b) for appointment to the
- 22 board;
- 23 (2) is ineligible for membership under Section
- 24 508.033;
- 25 (3) is unable to discharge the member's duties for a
- 26 substantial part of the term for which the member is appointed
- 27 because of illness or disability; or

(4) is absent from more than half of the regularly scheduled board or panel meetings that the member is eligible to attend during each calendar year[, except when the absence is excused by majority vote of the board].

- (b) [It is a ground for removal from the board and the policy board if a member of the policy board is absent from more than half of the regularly scheduled policy board meetings that the member is eligible to attend during each calendar year.
- [(c)] The board administrator or the board administrator's designee shall provide to members of the board[, to members of the policy board,] and to employees, as often as necessary, information regarding their qualification for office or employment under this chapter and their responsibilities under applicable laws relating to standards of conduct for state officers or employees.
  - (c)  $[\frac{d}{d}]$  The validity of an action of  $[\cdot]$
- $\left[\frac{(1)}{(1)}\right]$  the board or panel is not affected by the fact that the action is taken when a ground for removal of a board member exists  $\left[\frac{1}{2}\right]$
- [(2) the policy board is not affected by the fact that
  the action is taken when a ground for removal of a member of the
  policy board exists].
  - (d) [(e)] If the general counsel to the board has knowledge that a potential ground for removal exists, the general counsel shall notify the presiding officer of the board of the potential ground. The presiding officer shall notify the governor and the attorney general that a potential ground for removal exists. If the potential ground for removal involves the presiding officer, the

- 1 general counsel to the board shall notify the governor and the
- 2 attorney general that a potential ground for removal exists.
- 3 (e)  $[\frac{f}{f}]$  It is a ground for removal from the board that a
- 4 member fails to comply with policies or rules adopted by the
- 5 [<del>policy</del>] board.
- 6 SECTION 6. Section 508.035, Government Code, is amended by
- 7 amending Subsection (c) and adding Subsection (d) to read as
- 8 follows:
- 9 (c) The presiding officer reports directly to the governor
- 10 and serves as the administrative head of the [policy board and the]
- 11 board.
- 12 <u>(d) The presiding officer may:</u>
- 13 <u>(1) delegate responsibilities and authority to other</u>
- 14 members of the board, parole commissioners, or to employees of the
- 15 board;
- 16 (2) appoint advisory committees from the membership of
- 17 the board or from parole commissioners to further the efficient
- administration of board business; and
- 19 (3) establish policies and procedures to further the
- 20 efficient administration of the business of the board.
- 21 SECTION 7. Section 508.036, Government Code, as amended by
- 22 Section 31.01, Senate Bill No. 287, Acts of the 78th Legislature,
- 23 Regular Session, 2003, is amended to read as follows:
- Sec. 508.036. [POLICY BOARD: COMPOSITION;] GENERAL
- 25 ADMINISTRATIVE DUTIES. (a) The presiding officer [governor shall
- 26 designate seven members of the board to serve as the Board of
- 27 Pardons and Paroles Policy Board. The governor shall designate the

presiding officer of the board as one of the seven members of the policy board, and the presiding officer of the board shall serve as presiding officer of the policy board. Service on the policy board is an additional duty of office for members appointed to the policy board.

- [(b) Members of the board designated as members of the policy board serve on the policy board for six-year terms that are concurrent with their six-year terms on the board, with the service of two or three members expiring February 1 of each odd-numbered year.
- 11 [(c) The policy board] shall:

- (1) <u>develop</u> and <u>implement</u> policies that clearly separate the policy-making responsibilities of the board and the management responsibilities of the board administrator, parole commissioners, and the staff of the board [adopt rules relating to the decision-making processes used by the board and parole panels];

- (3) update parole guidelines, assign precedential value to previous decisions of the board relating to the granting of parole and the revocation of parole or mandatory supervision, and develop policies to ensure that members of the board and parole commissioners use guidelines and previous decisions of the board and parole commissioners in making decisions under this chapter;
- 27 (4) require members of the board and parole

- 1 <u>commissioners</u> to file activity reports[ , on forms provided by the
- 2 policy board, that provide information on release decisions made
- 3 by members of the board and parole commissioners, the workload and
- 4 hours worked of the members of the board and parole commissioners,
- 5 and the use of parole guidelines by members of the board and parole
- 6 commissioners; and
- 7 (5) report at least annually to the governor and the
- 8 legislature on  $\underline{\text{the}}$  [ $\underline{\text{board}}$ ] activities  $\underline{\text{of the board and parole}}$
- 9 <u>commissioners</u>, parole release decisions, and the use of parole
- 10 guidelines by the board <u>and parole commissioners</u>.
- 11 (b) The board shall:
- 12 <u>(1) adopt rules relating to the decision-making</u>
- 13 processes used by the board and parole panels;
- 14 (2) prepare information of public interest describing
- the functions of the board and make the information available to the
- 16 public and appropriate state agencies;
- 17 (3) comply with federal and state laws related to
- 18 program and facility accessibility; and
- 19 <u>(4) prepare annually a complete and detailed written</u>
- 20 report that meets the reporting requirements applicable to
- 21 financial reporting provided in the General Appropriations Act and
- 22 accounts for all funds received and disbursed by the board during
- 23 <u>the preceding fiscal year.</u>
- 24 (c) The board administrator shall prepare and maintain a
- written plan that describes how a person who does not speak English
- 26 can be provided reasonable access to the board's programs and
- 27 services.

- 1 (d) The board, in performing its duties, is subject to the
  2 open meetings law, Chapter 551, and the administrative procedure
  3 law, Chapter 2001. This subsection does not affect the provisions
  4 of Section 2001.223 exempting hearings and interviews conducted by
  5 the board or the division from Section 2001.038 and Subchapters
- 6 <u>C-H, Chapter 2001.</u>

- 3 SECTION 23. (a) The governor shall appoint new members to
- 4 the Board of Pardons and Paroles on or before January 1, 2004, and
- 5 the terms of members serving on December 31, 2003, expire on the
- 6 appointment of the new members. The governor shall appoint as new
- 7 members at least three persons who:
