RESOLUTION

1 WHEREAS, The year 2004 marks the 150th anniversary of the 2 founding of the Republican Party, with humble beginnings at an 3 organizational meeting on March 20, 1854, in a small schoolhouse in Ripon, Wisconsin, where 54 dedicated antislavery citizens met and 4 5 adopted the name "Republican" for the group of Americans committed 6 to protesting the expansion of slavery into new states proposed to be carved out in what is today the western central region of the 7 continental United States; and 8

WHEREAS, A subsequent convention held "under the oaks" in 9 Jackson, Michigan, on July 6, 1854, using the "Republican" title 10 was attended by more than 10,000 activists who described slavery as 11 12 "a great moral, social, and political evil" and moved New York 13 newspaper magnate Horace Greeley to editorialize, "We should not 14 care much whether those thus united [against slavery] were designated as 'Whig,' 'Free Democrat' or something else; though we 15 think some simple name like 'Republican' would more fitly designate 16 those who had united to restore the Union to its true mission of 17 18 champion and promulgator of Liberty rather than propagandist of slavery."; and 19

20 WHEREAS, Elections conducted later in 1854 captured numerous 21 public offices in Michigan--and in other states--clearly 22 demonstrating a remarkable electoral strength to challenge the 23 status quo of slavery legally existing in some regions of our nation 24 and it being unlawful in other areas; and

1 WHEREAS, These events laid the groundwork for the February 2 22, 1856, convention in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, which was 3 followed by the June 17, 1856, nominating convention in 4 Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, announcing the Republican Party as a 5 unified political force seeking the total abolition of slavery 6 everywhere in America; and

WHEREAS, While the first presidential candidate of the new 7 8 Republican Party, retired Army officer John C. Fremont, "The 9 Trailblazer" best known for his courageous crossings of the Rocky Mountains and wresting California from Mexico, went down to defeat 10 by Democrat James Buchanan in the 1856 elections, undaunted 11 Republicans continued to build their way to the successful 1860 12 election of Abraham Lincoln as 16th President of the United States; 13 14 and

WHEREAS, Among the many accomplishments attributed to Lincoln during his tenure in our nation's highest public office, was foremost the preservation of the union of states as a perpetual one--at a time when that concept was more strongly contested than at any other in our 227-year history; and

WHEREAS, The "Grand Old Party" or "GOP," as it has been 20 nicknamed since 1888, has espoused limited government, strong 21 national defense and homeland security, personal freedom, and a 22 healthy overall business climate and has at various times held the 23 24 presidency and both houses of Congress and has contributed 25 countless talented men and women in the service of our great country, and this historic anniversary is indeed worthy of 26 27 legislative recognition; now, therefore, be it
