BACKGROUND AND PURPOSE

House Bill 1733 exempts the state or a political subdivision of the state from the responsibility of having to maintain a written weight record of each vehicle weighed.

The 77th Legislature passed Senate Bill 220 requiring persons weighing cargo to keep for 180 days a written record of the vehicles weighed. Due to the number of vehicles weight enforcement officers routinely weigh, keeping a weight record on every vehicle weighed is time consuming, costly, and of no direct benefit to the state.
