### **BACKGROUND AND PURPOSE**

House Bill 1733 exempts the state or a political subdivision of the state from the responsibility of having to maintain a written weight record of each vehicle weighed.

The 77<sup>th</sup> Legislature passed Senate Bill 220 requiring persons weighing cargo to keep for 180 days a written record of the vehicles weighed. Due to the number of vehicles weight enforcement officers routinely weigh, keeping a weight record on every vehicle weighed is time consuming, costly, and of no direct benefit to the state.

### **RULEMAKING AUTHORITY**

It is the committee's opinion that this bill does not expressly grant any additional rulemaking authority to a state officer, department, agency, or institution.

### **ANALYSIS**

HB 1733 amends Section 621.410(e), Transportation Code, as follows:

Section 621.410(e): excludes weight enforcement officers and vehicles weighed on scales owned by the state or a political subdivision of the state from having to keep a written record of vehicles weighed.

### **EFFECTIVE DATE**

Upon passage, or, if the Act does not receive the necessary vote, the act takes effect September 1, 2003.
