BILL ANALYSIS

S.B. 441 By: Harris Transportation Committee Report (Unamended)

BACKGROUND AND PURPOSE

Currently, an airport operated or controlled by a joint board may license taxicabs transporting passengers to or from the airport and impose fees for issuing the licenses. Under the DFW Airport's Code of Rules and Regulations, there is a Class C Misdemeanor imposed on those who solicit or engage in the ground transportation business without a license. As proposed, S.B. 441 makes it a Class B misdemeanor for someone to solicit or engage in the ground transportation business without a license from a joint board.

RULEMAKING AUTHORITY

It is the committee's opinion that this bill does not expressly grant any additional rulemaking authority to a state officer, department, agency, or institution.

ANALYSIS

SECTION 1. Amends Chapter 22D, Transportation Code, by adding Section 22.0815, as follows:

Sec. 22.0815. (a) Defines "ground transportation business."

- (b) Provides that a person commits an offense if, within the boundaries of an airport operated or controlled by a joint board for which the constituent agencies are populous home-rule municipalities, the person solicits or engages in ground transportation business without the permission of the joint board, if required.
- (c) Provides that an offense under this section is a Class B misdemeanor.

SECTION 2. Amends Chapter 22B, Transportation Code, by adding Section 22.027, as follows:

Sec. 22.027. MUNICIPAL PERMISSION FOR GROUND TRANSPORTATION; OFFENSE. (a) Defines "ground transportation."

- (b) Provides that a person commits an offense if, within the boundaries of an airport operated by a home-rule municipality, the person solicits ground transportation business without the permission of the municipality, if required, or engages in ground transportation business without the permission of the municipality, if required.
- (c) Provides that an offense under this section is a Class B misdemeanor.

SECTION 3. Effective date: September 1, 2003.
