## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1 AN ACT 2 relating to homeland security. 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: SECTION 1. Subtitle B, Title 4, Government Code, is amended 4 5 by adding Chapter 421 to read as follows: 6 CHAPTER 421. HOMELAND SECURITY SUBCHAPTER A. GENERAL PROVISIONS 7 Sec. 421.001. DEFINITIONS. In this chapter: 8 (1) "Agency" means any governmental entity. 9 (2) "Critical infrastructure" includes all public or 10 11 private assets, systems, and functions vital to the security, 12 governance, public health and safety, economy, or morale of the state or the nation. 13 14 (3) "Homeland security activity" means any activity related to the prevention or discovery of, response to, or recovery 15 from a terrorist attack, natural or man-made disaster, hostile 16 military or paramilitary action, or extraordinary law enforcement 17 18 emergency. Sec. 421.002. HOMELAND SECURITY STRATEGY. (a) 19 The governor shall develop a statewide homeland security strategy that 20 21 improves the state's ability to: 22 (1) detect and deter threats to homeland security; 23 (2) respond to homeland security emergencies; and 24 (3) recover from homeland security emergencies.

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1	(b) The governor's homeland security strategy shall
2	coordinate homeland security activities among and between local,
3	state, and federal agencies and the private sector and must include
4	specific plans for:
5	(1) intelligence gathering and analysis;
6	(2) information sharing;
7	(3) reducing the state's vulnerability to homeland
8	security emergencies;
9	(4) protecting critical infrastructure;
10	(5) protecting the state's international border,
11	ports, and airports;
12	(6) detecting, deterring, and defending against
13	terrorism, including cyber-terrorism and biological, chemical, and
14	nuclear terrorism;
15	(7) positioning equipment, technology, and personnel
16	to improve the state's ability to respond to a homeland security
17	<pre>emergency;</pre>
18	(8) directing the Texas Infrastructure Protection
19	Communications Center and giving the center certain forms of
20	authority to implement the governor's homeland security strategy;
21	and
22	(9) using technological resources to:
23	(A) facilitate the interoperability of
24	government technological resources, including data, networks, and
25	applications;
26	(B) coordinate the warning and alert systems of
27	state and local agencies;

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1	(C) incorporate multidisciplinary approaches to
2	homeland security; and
3	(D) improve the security of governmental and
4	private sector information technology and information resources.
5	(c) The governor's homeland security strategy must
6	complement and operate in coordination with the federal homeland
7	security strategy.
8	Sec. 421.003. CRIMINAL INTELLIGENCE INFORMATION. The
9	Department of Public Safety of the State of Texas is:
10	(1) the repository in this state for the collection of
11	multi-jurisdictional criminal intelligence information that is
12	about terrorist activities or otherwise related to homeland
13	security activities; and
14	(2) the state agency that has primary responsibility
15	to analyze and disseminate that information.

17	SUBCHAPTER B. CRITICAL INFRASTRUCTURE PROTECTION COUNCIL
18	Sec. 421.021. MEMBERSHIP. (a) The Critical Infrastructure
19	Protection Council is composed of the governor's chief of staff or
20	the designee of the chief of staff and one representative of each of
21	the following entities, appointed by the single statewide elected
22	or appointed governing officer or administrative head of the
23	entity:
24	(1) office of the secretary of state;
25	(2) Department of Agriculture;
26	(3) office of the attorney general;
27	(4) General Land Office;

1	(5) Texas Animal Health Commission;
2	(6) state fire marshal's office;
3	(7) Texas Commission on Volunteerism and Community
4	Service;
5	(8) Commission on State Emergency Communications;
6	(9) Public Utility Commission of Texas;
7	(10) Texas Department of Health;
8	(11) Texas Department of Human Services;
9	(12) Department of Information Resources;
10	(13) Department of Public Safety of the State of
11	Texas;
12	(14) division of emergency management of the office of
13	the governor;
14	(15) Texas Department of Transportation;
15	(16) Texas Education Agency;
16	(17) Texas National Guard;
17	(18) Texas Commission on Environmental Quality;
18	(19) Parks and Wildlife Department; and
19	(20) Railroad Commission of Texas.
20	(b) To be eligible for appointment as a member of the
21	council, a person must be directly involved in the policies,
22	programs, or funding activities of the appointing agency, office,
23	or division that are relevant to homeland security or
24	infrastructure protection.
25	(c) A member of the council serves at the will of the
26	governor. At the request of the governor, an appointing authority
27	under this section shall appoint a different member.

(d) An officer or employee of a state or local agency who 1 2 serves as a member of the council or a special advisory committee under this subchapter shall perform the duties required by the 3 4 council or special advisory committee as an additional duty of the 5 member's office or employment. 6 Sec. 421.022. REIMBURSEMENT OF EXPENSES. A member of the 7 council may not receive additional compensation for service on the council but is entitled to reimbursement of reasonable expenses 8 incurred in direct performance of official duties, including travel 9 expenses incurred by the member while conducting the business of 10 the council, subject to any applicable limitation on reimbursement 11 12 provided by general law or the General Appropriations Act. Sec. 421.023. ADMINISTRATION. (a) The council is an 13 advisory entity administered by the office of the governor. 14 15 (b) The governor may adopt rules as necessary for the 16 operation of the council. 17 (c) The governor shall designate the presiding officer of the council. 18 The council shall meet at the call of the governor and 19 (d) shall meet at least once each quarter in a calendar year. 20 21 (e) The council is not subject to Chapter 2110. 22 Sec. 421.024. DUTIES. The council shall advise the 23 governor on: 24 (1) the development and coordination of a statewide 25 critical infrastructure protection strategy; (2) the implementation of the governor's homeland 26 27 security strategy by state and local agencies and provide specific

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1	suggestions for helping those agencies implement the strategy; and
2	(3) other matters related to the planning,
3	development, coordination, and implementation of initiatives to
4	promote the governor's homeland security strategy.
5	Sec. 421.025. SPECIAL ADVISORY COMMITTEES. (a) The
6	governor may appoint one or more special advisory committees
7	composed of representatives from state or local agencies or
8	nongovernmental entities not represented on the council.
9	(b) The governor shall determine the number of members and
10	qualifications for membership on a special advisory committee under
11	this section.
12	(c) A special advisory committee under this section shall
13	assist the council in performing its duties.
14	(d) A special advisory committee under this section is
15	subject to Chapter 2110, except that Section 2110.002 does not
16	apply.
17	Sec. 421.026. REPORT. The council shall annually submit to
18	the governor a report stating:
19	(1) the council's progress in developing and
20	coordinating a statewide critical infrastructure protection
21	strategy;
22	(2) the status and funding of state programs designed
23	to detect and deter homeland security emergencies, including the
24	status and funding of counterterrorism efforts;
25	(3) recommendations on actions to reduce threats to
26	homeland security, including threats related to terrorism; and
27	(4) recommendations for improving the alert,

1	response, and recovery capabilities of state and local agencies.

3	SUBCHAPTER C. CIVIL LIABILITY FOR ACTS OR OMISSIONS
4	Sec. 421.061. CIVIL LIABILITY. (a) An officer or employee
5	of a state or local agency performing a homeland security activity
6	or a volunteer performing a homeland security activity at the
7	request or under the direction of an officer or employee of a state
8	or local agency is considered for purposes of Section 431.085 to be
9	a member of the state military forces ordered into active service of
10	the state by proper authority and is considered to be discharging a
11	duty in that capacity if:
12	(1) the officer, employee, or volunteer is performing
13	the homeland security activity under procedures prescribed or
14	circumstances described for the purpose of this section in the
15	governor's homeland security strategy;
16	(2) in the case of a volunteer, the volunteer is acting
17	within the course and scope of the request or direction of the
18	officer or employee of the state or local agency; and
19	(3) in the case of an officer or employee of a state or
20	local agency, the officer or employee is acting within the course
21	and scope of the person's authority.
22	(b) A person described by Subsection (a) is not immune from
23	civil liability under Section 431.085 for damages resulting from
24	the performance of a homeland security activity if, under the
25	circumstances, the person's performance of the homeland security
26	activity was wilfully or wantonly negligent or done with conscious
27	indifference or reckless disregard for the safety of persons this

1	chapter is intended to protect.
2	(c) This section does not make a person a member of the state
3	military forces for any other purpose, including for purposes of
4	the application of the Uniform Code of Military Justice.
5	(d) This section does not affect the application of Section
6	431.085 on its own terms to a person who is a member of the state
7	military forces ordered into active service of the state by proper
8	authority under other law.
9	Sec. 421.062. LIABILITY UNDER INTERLOCAL CONTRACT. (a) In
10	this section, "interlocal contract" has the meaning assigned by
11	Section 791.003.
12	(b) A state or local agency that furnishes a service related
13	to a homeland security activity under an interlocal contract is
14	immune from civil liability for any act or omission resulting in
15	death, damage, or injury while acting under the interlocal contract
16	<u>if:</u>
17	(1) the interlocal contract expressly states that the
18	furnishing state or local agency is not responsible for any civil
19	liability that arises from the furnishing of a service under the
20	contract; and
21	(2) the state or local agency committed the act or
22	omission while acting in good faith and in the course and scope of
23	its functions to provide a service related to a homeland security
24	activity.

26	SUBCHAPTER D. COOPERATION AND ASSISTANCE; FUNDING
27	Sec. 421.071. COOPERATION AND ASSISTANCE. A state or local

C.S.H.B. No. 9 agency that performs a homeland security activity or a 1 2 nongovernmental entity that contracts with a state or local agency 3 to perform a homeland security activity shall cooperate with and 4 assist the office of the governor, the Critical Infrastructure Protection Council, the Texas Infrastructure Protection 5 6 Communications Center, and the National Infrastructure Protection 7 Center in the performance of their duties under this chapter and 8 other state or federal law. 9 Sec. 421.072. FUNDING. (a) The office of the governor 10 shall: (1) allocate available federal and state grants and 11 other funding related to homeland security to state and local 12 agencies that perform homeland security activities; 13 14 (2) periodically review the grants and other funding 15 for appropriateness and compliance; and 16 (3) designate a single state agency to administer all 17 grants and other funding to the state related to homeland security. (b) State and local agencies that perform homeland security 18 activities shall inform the office of the governor about any 19 actions taken relating to requests for revenue, grants, or other 20 21 funding for homeland security activities or initiatives. 22 (c) A state or local agency that receives a grant or other funding related to homeland security must provide an annual report 23 24 to the office of the governor detailing the agency's compliance 25 with the state homeland security strategy. 26 [Sections 421.073-421.080 reserved for expansion] SUBCHAPTER E. TEXAS INFRASTRUCTURE PROTECTION 27

C.S.H.B. No. 9 1 COMMUNICATIONS CENTER 2 Sec. 421.081. FACILITIES AND ADMINISTRATIVE SUPPORT. The Department of Public Safety of the State of Texas shall provide 3 4 facilities and administrative support for the Texas Infrastructure 5 Protection Communications Center. 6 Sec. 421.082. POWERS AND DUTIES. (a) The center shall 7 serve as the state's primary entity for the planning, coordination, and integration of government communications capabilities to help 8 9 implement the governor's homeland security strategy and ensure an effective response in the event of a homeland security emergency. 10 (b) The center's duties include: 11 12 promotion of emergency preparedness; (2) receipt and analysis of information, assessment of 13 threats, and issuance of public warnings related to homeland 14 15 security emergencies; and 16 (3) authorization and facilitation of cooperative 17 efforts related to emergency response and recovery efforts in the event of a homeland security emergency. 18 19 (c) In performing its duties under this section, the center shall aim to: 20 21 (1) reduce the vulnerability of at-risk or targeted 22 entities to homeland security emergencies; and (2) prevent or minimize damage, injury, loss of life, 23 24 and loss of property in the event of a homeland security emergency. The center shall perform its duties under circumstances 25 (d) 26 prescribed by and as directed by the governor's homeland security 27 strategy.

1 SECTION 2. Section 431.051, Government Code, is amended to 2 read as follows:

3 Sec. 431.051. SUPPLEMENTAL <u>VOLUNTEER MILITARY FORCES</u> 4 [MILITIA]. To provide <u>mission-ready volunteer military forces</u> 5 [militia strength] for use by the state <u>in homeland security and</u> 6 <u>community service activities</u> as a supplement to the Texas National 7 Guard, the Texas State Guard exists as part of the state militia 8 under the Second Amendment to the United States Constitution and a 9 defense force under 32 U.S.C. Section 109.

10 SECTION 3. Section 431.052(b), Government Code, is amended 11 to read as follows:

12 (b) To volunteer for service in the Texas State Guard a 13 person must:

14 (1) be a [state] citizen <u>of the United States and a</u> 15 <u>resident of this state for at least 180 days;</u>

be at least 17 years of age;

16

17 (3) meet qualifications that the governor prescribes;18 and

19 (4) be acceptable to and approved by the governor or20 adjutant general under the governor's direction.

21 SECTION 4. Subchapter C, Chapter 662, Government Code, is 22 amended by adding Section 662.050 to read as follows:

23 <u>Sec. 662.050. TEXAS FIRST RESPONDERS DAY. (a) September 11</u> 24 <u>is Texas First Responders Day in honor of the bravery, courage, and</u> 25 <u>determination of Texas men and women who assist others in</u> 26 <u>emergencies.</u>

27 (b) Texas First Responders Day shall be regularly observed

## by appropriate ceremonies in the public schools and other places to honor Texas first responders.

3 SECTION 5. (a) The governor shall develop a statewide 4 homeland security strategy as required by Section 421.002, 5 Government Code, as added by this Act, not later than September 1, 6 2004.

(b) The head of each entity listed in Section 421.021,
Government Code, as added by this Act, shall appoint a
representative to the Critical Infrastructure Protection Council,
as required by that section, not later than December 1, 2003.

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SECTION 6. This Act takes effect September 1, 2003.
