- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
- 5 SECTION 1. Section 39.023(b), Education Code, is amended to
- 7 (b) The agency shall develop or adopt appropriate criterion-referenced assessment instruments to be administered to 8 each student in a special education program under Subchapter A, 9 Chapter 29, who receives modified instruction in the essential 10 knowledge and skills identified under Section 28.002 for the 11 12 <u>assessed subject</u> but for whom <u>an</u> [the] assessment <u>instrument</u> 13 [instruments] adopted under Subsection (a), even with allowable 14 modifications, would not provide an appropriate measure of student achievement, as determined by the student's admission, review, and 15 dismissal committee. The assessment instruments required under 16 this subsection must assess essential knowledge and skills and 17 growth in the subjects of reading, mathematics, and writing. A 18 student's admission, review, and dismissal committee shall 19 determine whether any allowable modification is necessary in 20 21 administering to the student an assessment instrument required 22 under this subsection. The assessment instruments required under this subsection shall be administered on the same schedule as the 23 assessment instruments administered under Subsection (a). 24

- 1 SECTION 2. Section 39.051(b), Education Code, as amended by
- 2 Chapters 8, 725, 834, and 1420, Acts of the 77th Legislature,
- 3 Regular Session, 2001, is reenacted and amended to read as follows:
- 4 (b) Performance on the indicators adopted under this
- 5 section shall be compared to state-established standards. The
- 6 degree of change from one school year to the next in performance on
- 7 each indicator adopted under this section shall also be considered.
- 8 The indicators must be based on information that is disaggregated
- 9 by race, ethnicity, gender, and socioeconomic status and must
- 10 include:
- 11 (1) the results of assessment instruments required
- under Sections 39.023(a), (c), and (l), aggregated by grade level
- 13 and subject area;
- 14 (2) dropout rates, including dropout rates and
- district completion rates for grade levels 9 through 12;
- 16 (3) student attendance rates;
- 17 (4) the percentage of graduating students who attain
- 18 scores on the secondary exit-level assessment instruments required
- 19 under Subchapter B that are equivalent to a passing score on the
- 20 test instrument required under Section 51.306;
- 21 (5) the percentage of graduating students who meet the
- 22 course requirements established for the recommended high school
- 23 program by State Board of Education rule;
- 24 (6) the results of the Scholastic Assessment Test
- 25 (SAT), the American College Test (ACT), articulated postsecondary
- 26 degree programs described by Section 61.852, and certified
- workforce training programs described by Chapter 311, Labor Code;

- (7) the percentage of students, aggregated by grade 1 level, provided accelerated instruction under Section 28.0211(c), 2 the results of assessments administered under that section, the 3 percentage of students promoted through the grade placement 4 committee process under Section 28.0211, the subject of the 5 6 assessment instrument on which each student failed to perform 7 satisfactorily, and the performance of those students in the school 8 year following that promotion on the assessment instruments 9 required under Section 39.023;
- 10 (8) for students who have failed to perform 11 satisfactorily on an assessment instrument required under Section 12 39.023(a) or (c), the numerical progress of those students on 13 subsequent assessment instruments required under those sections, 14 aggregated by grade level and subject area;
- [(9) the percentage of students taking end-of-course assessment instruments adopted under Section 39.023(d);
- (9) the percentage of students exempted, by exemption category, from the assessment program generally applicable under this chapter [subchapter]; [and]
- 20 <u>(10)</u> [(11)] the percentage of students of limited 21 English proficiency exempted from the administration of an 22 assessment instrument under Sections 39.027(a)(3) and (4); and
- 23 (11) the percentage of students in a special education 24 program under Subchapter A, Chapter 29, assessed through assessment 25 instruments developed or adopted under Section 39.023(b).
- SECTION 3. Section 39.075(a), Education Code, is amended to read as follows:

- 1 (a) The commissioner shall authorize special accreditation
- 2 investigations to be conducted:
- 3 (1) when excessive numbers of absences of students
- 4 eligible to be tested on state assessment instruments are
- 5 determined;
- 6 (2) when excessive numbers of allowable exemptions
- 7 from the required state assessment are determined;
- 8 (3) in response to complaints submitted to the agency
- 9 with respect to alleged violations of civil rights or other
- 10 requirements imposed on the state by federal law or court order;
- 11 (4) in response to established compliance reviews of
- 12 the district's financial accounting practices and state and federal
- 13 program requirements;
- 14 (5) when extraordinary numbers of student placements
- 15 in alternative education programs, other than placements under
- 16 Sections 37.006 and 37.007, are determined;
- 17 (6) in response to an allegation involving a conflict
- 18 between members of the board of trustees or between the board and
- 19 the district administration if it appears that the conflict
- 20 involves a violation of a role or duty of the board members or the
- 21 administration clearly defined by this code;
- 22 <u>(7) when excessive numbers of students in special</u>
- 23 <u>education programs under Subchapter A, Chapter 29, are assessed</u>
- 24 through assessment instruments developed or adopted under Section
- 25 39.023(b); or
- 26 (8) (8) (7) as the commissioner otherwise determines
- 27 necessary.

- 1 SECTION 4. Sections 1 and 2 apply beginning with the 2 2003-2004 school year. Section 3 applies beginning with the
- 3 2004-2005 school year.
- 4 SECTION 5. Section 3 takes effect September 1, 2004.
- 5 Sections 1 and 2 take effect immediately if this Act receives a vote
- of two-thirds of all members elected to each house, as provided by
- 7 Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this Act does not
- 8 receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, Sections 1 and 2
- 9 take effect September 1, 2003.
