A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT

relating to the continuation and functions of the Texas State Board of Public Accountancy; providing penalties.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

SECTION 1. Section 901.006, Occupations Code, is amended to read as follows:

Sec. 901.006. APPLICATION OF SUNSET ACT. The Texas State Board of Public Accountancy is subject to Chapter 325, Government Code (Texas Sunset Act). Unless continued in existence as provided by that chapter, the board is abolished and this chapter expires September 1, 2015 [~~2003~~].

SECTION 2. Section 901.053, Occupations Code, is amended to read as follows:

Sec. 901.053. MEMBERSHIP AND EMPLOYEE RESTRICTIONS. (a) In this section, "Texas trade association" means a [~~nonprofit,~~] cooperative[~~7~~] and voluntarily joined statewide association of business or professional competitors in this state designed to assist its members and its industry or profession in dealing with mutual business or professional problems and in promoting their common interest.

(b) A person may not be a member of the board and may not be a board employee employed in a "bona fide executive, administrative, or professional capacity," as that phrase is used for purposes of establishing an exemption to the overtime provisions of the federal

1 Fair Labor Standards Act of 1938 (29 U.S.C. Section 201 et seq.),  
2 and its subsequent amendments, if:

3 (1) the person is acting in the capacity of an [An]  
4 officer, executive board or executive committee member, employee,  
5 or paid consultant of a Texas trade association in the field of  
6 public accountancy; or

7 (2) the person's [may not be a member of the board and  
8 may not be an employee of the board who is exempt from the state's  
9 position classification plan or is compensated at or above the  
10 amount prescribed by the General Appropriations Act for step 1,  
11 salary group A17, of the position classification salary schedule.

12 [~~(c) A person who is the~~] spouse is acting in the capacity of  
13 an officer, executive board or executive committee member, manager,  
14 or paid consultant of a Texas trade association in the field of  
15 public accountancy [~~may not be an employee of the board who is~~  
16 ~~exempt from the state's position classification plan or is~~  
17 ~~compensated at or above the amount prescribed by the General~~  
18 ~~Appropriations Act for step 1, salary group A17, of the position~~  
19 ~~classification salary schedule].~~

20 (c) [~~(d)~~] A person may not be [serve as] a member of the  
21 board or act as the general counsel to the board if the person is  
22 required to register as a lobbyist under Chapter 305, Government  
23 Code, because of the person's activities for compensation on behalf  
24 of a profession related to the operation of the board.

25 [~~(e) A member or employee of the board may not be related~~  
26 ~~within the second degree by consanguinity or affinity, as~~  
27 ~~determined under Chapter 573, Government Code, to a person who is an~~

1 ~~officer, employee, or paid consultant of a trade association of~~  
2 ~~persons governed by this chapter.]~~

3 SECTION 3. Sections 901.056(a) and (c), Occupations Code,  
4 are amended to read as follows:

5 (a) It is a ground for removal from the board that a member:

6 (1) does not have at the time of taking office [~~the~~  
7 ~~appointment~~] the qualifications required by Section 901.051;

8 (2) does not maintain during service on the board the  
9 qualifications required by Section 901.051 [~~or 901.052~~];

10 (3) is ineligible for membership under [~~violates a~~  
11 ~~prohibition established by~~] Section 901.052 or 901.053;

12 (4) cannot, because of illness or disability,  
13 discharge the member's duties for a substantial part of the member's  
14 term; or

15 (5) is absent from more than half of the regularly  
16 scheduled board meetings [~~of the board and a committee of the board~~]  
17 that the member is eligible to attend during a calendar year without  
18 an excuse approved [~~unless the absence is excused~~] by a majority  
19 vote of the board.

20 (c) If the executive director has knowledge that a potential  
21 ground for removal [~~of a board member~~] exists, the executive  
22 director shall notify the presiding officer [~~executive committee~~]  
23 of the board of the potential ground. The presiding officer shall  
24 then notify the governor and the attorney general that a potential  
25 ground for removal exists. If the potential ground for removal  
26 involves the presiding officer, the executive director shall notify  
27 the next highest ranking officer of the board, who shall then notify

1 the governor and the attorney general that a potential ground for  
2 removal exists.

3 SECTION 4. Subchapter B, Chapter 901, Occupations Code, is  
4 amended by adding Section 901.059 to read as follows:

5 Sec. 901.059. TRAINING. (a) A person who is appointed to  
6 and qualifies for office as a member of the board may not vote,  
7 deliberate, or be counted as a member in attendance at a meeting of  
8 the board until the person completes a training program that  
9 complies with this section.

10 (b) The training program must provide the person with  
11 information regarding:

- 12 (1) this chapter;
- 13 (2) the programs operated by the board;
- 14 (3) the role and functions of the board;
- 15 (4) the rules of the board, with an emphasis on the  
16 rules that relate to disciplinary and investigatory authority;
- 17 (5) the current budget for the board;
- 18 (6) the results of the most recent formal audit of the  
19 board;
- 20 (7) the requirements of:
  - 21 (A) the open meetings law, Chapter 551,  
22 Government Code;
  - 23 (B) the public information law, Chapter 552,  
24 Government Code;
  - 25 (C) the administrative procedure law, Chapter  
26 2001, Government Code; and
  - 27 (D) other laws relating to public officials,

1 including conflict-of-interest laws; and

2 (8) any applicable ethics policies adopted by the  
3 board or the Texas Ethics Commission.

4 (c) A person appointed to the board is entitled to  
5 reimbursement, as provided by the General Appropriations Act, for  
6 the travel expenses incurred in attending the training program  
7 regardless of whether the attendance at the program occurs before  
8 or after the person qualifies for office.

9 SECTION 5. Section 901.102, Occupations Code, is amended to  
10 read as follows:

11 Sec. 901.102. DIVISION OF RESPONSIBILITIES. The board  
12 shall develop and implement policies that clearly separate [~~define~~]  
13 the policy-making [~~respective~~] responsibilities of the board and  
14 the management responsibilities of the executive director and the  
15 staff of the board.

16 SECTION 6. Section 901.105, Occupations Code, is amended to  
17 read as follows:

18 Sec. 901.105. EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY POLICY; REPORT.  
19 (a) The executive director or the executive director's designee  
20 shall prepare and maintain a written policy statement that  
21 implements a program [~~to ensure implementation~~] of [~~an~~] equal  
22 employment opportunity to ensure that [~~program under which~~] all  
23 personnel decisions [~~transactions~~] are made without regard to race,  
24 color, disability, sex, religion, age, or national origin.

25 (b) The policy statement must include:

26 (1) personnel policies, including policies relating  
27 to recruitment, evaluation, selection, [~~appointment,~~] training,

1 and promotion of personnel, that show the intent of the board to  
2 avoid the unlawful employment practices described by Chapter 21,  
3 Labor Code; and

4 (2) an [a-comprehensive] analysis of the extent to  
5 which the composition of the board's personnel is in accordance  
6 with [board workforce that meets] federal and state law and a  
7 description of reasonable methods to achieve compliance with  
8 federal and state law [guidelines;

9 ~~[(3) procedures by which a determination can be made~~  
10 ~~of significant underuse in the board workforce of all persons for~~  
11 ~~whom federal or state guidelines encourage a more equitable~~  
12 ~~balance; and~~

13 ~~[(4) reasonable methods to appropriately address~~  
14 ~~those areas of underuse].~~

15 (c) The [(b)-A] policy statement [prepared under Subsection  
16 ~~(a)] must:~~

17 (1) ~~[cover an annual period;~~

18 ~~[(2)] be updated [at least] annually;~~

19 (2) [and (3)] be reviewed by the Commission on Human  
20 Rights for compliance with Subsection (b)(1); and

21 (3) be filed with the governor's office [governor.

22 ~~[(c) The governor shall deliver a biennial report to the~~  
23 ~~legislature based on the information received under Subsection (b).~~  
24 ~~The report may be made separately or as a part of other biennial~~  
25 ~~reports made to the legislature].~~

26 SECTION 7. Subchapter C, Chapter 901, Occupations Code, is  
27 amended by adding Section 901.106 to read as follows:

1       Sec. 901.106. INFORMATION ON STATE EMPLOYEE INCENTIVE  
2 PROGRAM. The executive director or the executive director's  
3 designee shall provide to board employees information and training  
4 on the benefits and methods of participation in the state employee  
5 incentive program under Subchapter B, Chapter 2108, Government  
6 Code.

7       SECTION 8. Subchapter D, Chapter 901, Occupations Code, is  
8 amended by adding Section 901.1525 to read as follows:

9       Sec. 901.1525. APPOINTMENT OF BOARD COMMITTEES. (a) The  
10 board may appoint policy-making and working committees to assist  
11 the board in performing its responsibilities under this chapter.  
12 The board's policy-making committees shall assist the board in  
13 establishing policies, drafting rules, setting budgets,  
14 representing the board, and performing other oversight duties  
15 necessary to administer this chapter. The board's working  
16 committees shall assist the board in carrying out the board's  
17 functions, including reviewing enforcement cases and other  
18 licensing matters. In establishing committees, the board shall  
19 maintain the distinction between the types of committees authorized  
20 by this section.

21       (b) A person may not serve on a policy-making committee  
22 unless the person is a board member. A working committee may  
23 consist of members who are members of the board and members who are  
24 not board members. A member of a working committee who is not a  
25 board member may participate as a full voting member of the  
26 committee.

27       (c) A person may not be a non-board member of a committee if:

1           (1) the person is acting in the capacity of an officer,  
2 executive board or executive committee member, employee, or paid  
3 consultant of a Texas trade association in the field of public  
4 accountancy;

5           (2) the person's spouse is acting in the capacity of an  
6 officer, executive board or executive committee member, manager, or  
7 paid consultant of a Texas trade association in the field of public  
8 accountancy; or

9           (3) the person is required to register as a lobbyist  
10 under Chapter 305, Government Code, because of the person's  
11 activities for compensation on behalf of a profession related to  
12 the operation of the board.

13           (d) For purposes of Subsection (c), "Texas trade  
14 association" has the meaning assigned by Section 901.053.

15           (e) A committee member who is not a member of the board is  
16 subject to the same financial disclosure requirements that apply to  
17 a member of the board.

18           (f) A committee member who is not a member of the board may  
19 not serve on the committee if the member:

20                   (1) violates Subsection (c);

21                   (2) cannot, because of illness or disability,  
22 discharge the member's duties for a substantial time;

23                   (3) is absent from more than half of the regularly  
24 scheduled meetings of the committee that the member is eligible to  
25 attend during a calendar year unless the absence is excused by a  
26 majority vote of the committee; or

27                   (4) does not comply with Subsection (e).



1       (g) The board shall adopt rules that provide that a  
2 committee member shall refrain from participating in the discussion  
3 of and may not vote on an issue before a committee in which the  
4 member has a personal or financial interest. A committee member who  
5 is not permitted to vote on a matter described by this subsection  
6 shall state at the time of the vote the reason why the member is not  
7 voting on the matter.

8       SECTION 9. Section 901.153, Occupations Code, is amended by  
9 amending Subsection (a) and adding Subsections (d) and (e) to read  
10 as follows:

11       (a) The board may appoint enforcement committees [~~from its~~  
12 ~~membership~~]. An enforcement committee operates as a board working  
13 committee. The membership of each enforcement committee must  
14 include at least one public member of the board.

15       (d) In appointing the members of an enforcement committee,  
16 the board must determine whether a prospective committee member who  
17 is a license holder under this chapter has been the subject of any  
18 disciplinary action under this chapter. A license holder who has  
19 been found in violation of this chapter may not serve on an  
20 enforcement committee.

21       (e) A board member who serves on an enforcement committee  
22 that participates in the investigation of a specific complaint may  
23 not participate in any subsequent disciplinary proceeding of the  
24 board that pertains to the complaint and may not vote on the final  
25 disposition of the case. The board shall adopt rules necessary to  
26 implement the requirements of this subsection.

27       SECTION 10. Subchapter D, Chapter 901, Occupations Code, is

1 amended by adding Section 901.1565 to read as follows:

2 Sec. 901.1565. RULES ON CONSEQUENCES OF CRIMINAL  
3 CONVICTION. (a) The board shall adopt rules necessary to comply  
4 with Chapter 53.

5 (b) In its rules under this section, the board shall list  
6 the specific misdemeanor offenses for which a conviction would  
7 constitute grounds for the board to take action under Section  
8 53.021. With regard to a misdemeanor conviction in another state,  
9 the board shall develop a process for determining whether the  
10 conviction is for an offense listed in the rules required by this  
11 subsection.

12 SECTION 11. Section 901.160, Occupations Code, is amended  
13 by adding Subsection (e) to read as follows:

14 (e) The board may disclose information that is confidential  
15 under this section to another governmental, regulatory, or law  
16 enforcement agency engaged in an enforcement action. The board by  
17 rule shall adopt guidelines to assist the board in exercising its  
18 authority to share information under this subsection. Subsections  
19 (a) and (c) do not apply to information disclosed under this  
20 subsection.

21 SECTION 12. Subchapter D, Chapter 901, Occupations Code, is  
22 amended by adding Section 901.166 to read as follows:

23 Sec. 901.166. AUTHORITY TO ISSUE SUBPOENA, ADMINISTER OATH,  
24 AND RECEIVE EVIDENCE. (a) The board may issue a subpoena to compel  
25 the attendance of a relevant witness or the production, for  
26 inspection and copying, of relevant documents, records, and other  
27 evidence, maintained by electronic or other means, that is in this

1 state.

2 (b) The board may administer oaths and take testimony and  
3 other evidence regarding any matter under the board's jurisdiction.

4 (c) If a person fails to comply with a subpoena, the board,  
5 acting through the attorney general, may file suit to enforce the  
6 subpoena in a district court in Travis County or in a county in  
7 which a hearing conducted by the board may be held.

8 (d) On finding that good cause exists for issuing the  
9 subpoena, the court shall order the person to comply with the  
10 subpoena. The court may punish a person who fails to obey the court  
11 order.

12 (e) The board shall pay a reasonable fee for photocopies  
13 subpoenaed under this section in an amount not to exceed the amount  
14 the board may charge for copies of its own records.

15 (f) The reimbursement of the expenses of a witness whose  
16 attendance is compelled under this section is governed by Section  
17 2001.103, Government Code.

18 SECTION 13. Subchapter D, Chapter 901, Occupations Code, is  
19 amended by adding Section 901.167 to read as follows:

20 Sec. 901.167. NEGOTIATED RULEMAKING AND ALTERNATIVE  
21 DISPUTE RESOLUTION POLICY. (a) The board shall develop and  
22 implement a policy to encourage the use of:

23 (1) negotiated rulemaking procedures under Chapter  
24 2008, Government Code, for the adoption of board rules; and

25 (2) appropriate alternative dispute resolution  
26 procedures under Chapter 2009, Government Code, to assist in the  
27 resolution of internal and external disputes under the board's

1 jurisdiction.

2 (b) The board's procedures relating to alternative dispute  
3 resolution must conform, to the extent possible, to any model  
4 guidelines issued by the State Office of Administrative Hearings  
5 for the use of alternative dispute resolution by state agencies.

6 (c) The board shall designate a trained person to:

7 (1) coordinate the implementation of the policy  
8 adopted under Subsection (a);

9 (2) serve as a resource for any training necessary for  
10 implementation of the negotiated rulemaking or alternative dispute  
11 resolution procedures; and

12 (3) collect data on the effectiveness of the  
13 procedures implemented by the board.

14 SECTION 14. Subchapter D, Chapter 901, Occupations Code, is  
15 amended by adding Section 901.168 to read as follows:

16 Sec. 901.168. TECHNOLOGY POLICY. The board shall develop  
17 and implement a policy requiring the executive director and board  
18 employees to research and propose appropriate technological  
19 solutions to improve the board's ability to perform its functions.  
20 The technological solutions must:

21 (1) ensure that the public is able to easily find  
22 information about the board on the Internet;

23 (2) ensure that persons who want to use the board's  
24 services are able to:

25 (A) interact with the board through the Internet;

26 and

27 (B) access any service that can be provided

1 effectively through the Internet; and

2 (3) be cost-effective and developed through the  
3 board's planning processes.

4 SECTION 15. Section 901.203, Occupations Code, is amended  
5 to read as follows:

6 Sec. 901.203. COMPLAINT INFORMATION. (a) The board shall  
7 maintain a ~~[an information]~~ file on ~~[about]~~ each written complaint  
8 filed with the board. The file must include:

9 (1) the name of the person who filed the complaint;

10 (2) the date the complaint is received by the board;

11 (3) the subject matter of the complaint;

12 (4) the name of each person contacted in relation to  
13 the complaint;

14 (5) a summary of the results of the review or  
15 investigation of the complaint; and

16 (6) an explanation of the reason the file was closed,  
17 if the board closed the file without taking action other than to  
18 investigate the complaint.

19 (b) The board shall provide to the person filing the  
20 complaint and to each person who is a subject of the complaint a  
21 copy of the board's policies and procedures relating to complaint  
22 investigation and resolution ~~[board for a period not to exceed the~~  
23 ~~10th anniversary of the date of the complaint's final disposition].~~

24 (c) The board, at least quarterly until final disposition of  
25 the ~~[(b) If a written]~~ complaint, shall notify ~~[is filed with]~~ the  
26 ~~[board relating to a]~~ person filing ~~[regulated under this chapter,~~  
27 ~~the board shall notify the parties to]~~ the complaint and each person

1 who is a subject of the complaint of [~~each change in~~] the status of  
2 the investigation [~~complaint, including the final disposition,~~]  
3 unless the notice would jeopardize an undercover investigation.

4 SECTION 16. Section 901.304(a), Occupations Code, as  
5 amended by Chapters 381 and 1497, Acts of the 77th Legislature,  
6 Regular Session, 2001, is reenacted and amended to read as follows:

7 (a) For each examination or reexamination, the board by rule  
8 shall apportion an amount of the total examination fee among the  
9 parts of the examination that an applicant is eligible to take on a  
10 particular examination date. For each examination or  
11 reexamination, the board shall set [~~collect~~] a fee [~~set~~] by board  
12 rule not to exceed the cost of administering the examination.  
13 Notwithstanding Section 2113.203, Government Code, the board may  
14 delegate the collection of an examination fee to the person who  
15 conducts the examination.

16 SECTION 17. Section 901.403, Occupations Code, is amended  
17 to read as follows:

18 Sec. 901.403. APPLICATION FOR AND RENEWAL OF LICENSE. (a)  
19 The board shall specify:

- 20 (1) the form of the application for a license;
- 21 (2) the term of a license; and
- 22 (3) the requirements for renewal of a license.

23 (b) The board by rule may adopt a system under which  
24 licenses expire on various dates during the year. For the year in  
25 which the license expiration date is changed, the board shall  
26 prorate license fees on a monthly basis so that each license holder  
27 pays only that portion of the license fee that is allocable to the

1 number of months during which the license is valid. On renewal of  
2 the license on the new expiration date, the total license renewal  
3 fee is payable.

4 SECTION 18. Section 901.404(a), Occupations Code, is  
5 amended to read as follows:

6 (a) Not later than the 30th [~~31st~~] day before the expiration  
7 date of a person's license, the board shall send written notice of  
8 the impending license expiration to the person at the person's last  
9 known address according to the board's records.

10 SECTION 19. Section 901.405, Occupations Code, is amended  
11 to read as follows:

12 Sec. 901.405. PROCEDURE FOR RENEWAL. (a) A person who is  
13 otherwise eligible to renew a license may renew an unexpired  
14 license by paying the required renewal fee to the board before the  
15 expiration date of the license. A person whose license has expired  
16 may not engage in activities that require a license until the  
17 license has been renewed.

18 (b) A person whose license has been expired for 90 days or  
19 less may renew the license by paying to the board a [~~the required~~]  
20 renewal fee [~~and a late fee~~] that is equal to 1-1/2 times [~~half of~~]  
21 the normally required renewal [~~amount of the initial examination~~]  
22 fee [~~for the license~~].

23 (c) A person whose [~~If a person's~~] license has been expired  
24 for more than 90 days but less than one year [~~, the person~~] may renew  
25 the license by paying to the board a [~~all unpaid~~] renewal [~~fees and~~  
26 ~~a late~~] fee that is equal to two times the normally required renewal  
27 [~~the amount of the initial examination~~] fee [~~for the license~~].

1       (d) A person whose license has been expired for at least one  
2 year but less than two years may renew the license by paying to the  
3 board a renewal fee that is equal to three times the normally  
4 required renewal fee.

5       (e) A person whose license has been expired for two years or  
6 more may not renew the license. The person may obtain a new license  
7 by complying with the requirements and procedures, including the  
8 examination requirements, for obtaining an original license.

9       (f) A person who was licensed in this state, moved to  
10 another state, and is currently licensed and has been in practice in  
11 the other state for the two years preceding the date of application  
12 may obtain a new license without reexamination. The person must pay  
13 to the board a fee that is equal to two times the normally required  
14 renewal fee for the license.

15       SECTION 20. Section 901.501(a), Occupations Code, is  
16 amended to read as follows:

17       (a) On a determination that a ground for discipline exists  
18 under Section 901.502, after notice and hearing as provided by  
19 Section 901.509, the board may:

20               (1) revoke a certificate, firm license, or practice  
21 privilege issued under this chapter;

22               (2) suspend under any terms a certificate, firm  
23 license, practice privilege, or license issued under this chapter  
24 for a period not to exceed five years;

25               (3) refuse to renew a license;

26               (4) place a license holder on probation;

27               (5) reprimand a license holder;



1 (6) limit the scope of a license holder's practice;

2 (7) require a license holder to complete a peer review  
3 program conducted in the manner prescribed by the board;

4 (8) require a license holder to complete a continuing  
5 education program specified by the board;

6 (9) impose on a license holder the direct  
7 administrative costs incurred by the board in taking action under  
8 Subdivisions (1) through (8); ~~or~~

9 (10) require a license holder to pay restitution as  
10 provided by Section 901.6015;

11 (11) impose an administrative penalty under  
12 Subchapter L; or

13 (12) impose any combination of the sanctions provided  
14 by this subsection.

15 SECTION 21. Section 901.503(c), Occupations Code, is  
16 amended to read as follows:

17 (c) The board shall provide for the refund of the  
18 examination fee paid ~~[submitted]~~ by a person whose application for  
19 examination is denied under this section.

20 SECTION 22. Subchapter K, Chapter 901, Occupations Code, is  
21 amended by adding Section 901.5045 to read as follows:

22 Sec. 901.5045. EMERGENCY SUSPENSION. (a) On determining  
23 that a license holder is engaged in or about to engage in an act of  
24 fraud or a violation of this chapter and that the license holder's  
25 continued practice constitutes an immediate threat to the public  
26 welfare, the board may issue an order suspending the license  
27 holder's license without notice or a hearing. The board shall

1 immediately serve notice of the suspension on the license holder.

2 (b) The notice required by Subsection (a) must:

3 (1) be personally served on the license holder or be  
4 sent by registered or certified mail, return receipt requested, to  
5 the license holder's last known address according the board's  
6 records;

7 (2) state the grounds for the suspension; and

8 (3) inform the license holder of the right to a hearing  
9 on the suspension order.

10 (c) A license holder whose license is suspended under this  
11 section is entitled to request a hearing on the suspension not later  
12 than the 30th day after the date of receipt of notice of the  
13 suspension. Not later than the fifth day after the date a hearing  
14 is requested, the board shall issue a notice of hearing as provided  
15 by Section 901.509.

16 (d) The hearing shall be held not later than the fifth day  
17 after the date notice of hearing is issued, unless the parties agree  
18 to a later date. A hearing on a suspension order under this section  
19 is subject to Chapter 2001, Government Code. If the hearing is  
20 before an administrative law judge, after the hearing, the  
21 administrative law judge shall recommend to the board whether to  
22 uphold, vacate, or modify the suspension order.

23 (e) A suspension order issued under this section remains in  
24 effect until further action is taken by the board. If the  
25 administrative law judge's recommendation under Subsection (d) is  
26 to vacate the order, the board shall determine whether to vacate the  
27 order not later than the second day after the date of the

1 recommendation.

2 SECTION 23. Section 901.552, Occupations Code, is amended  
3 by amending Subsection (a) and adding Subsection (c) to read as  
4 follows:

5 (a) The amount of an administrative penalty may not exceed  
6 \$100,000 [~~\$1,000~~] for each violation.

7 (c) The board by rule shall adopt a schedule for purposes of  
8 this subchapter that prescribes ranges in the amounts of  
9 administrative penalties to be imposed for specified types of  
10 conduct and circumstances.

21 (b) The changes in law made by this Act by Section 901.053,  
22 Occupations Code, as amended by this Act, and Section 901.059,  
23 Occupations Code, as added by this Act, in the prohibitions on or  
24 qualifications of members of the Texas State Board of Public  
25 Accountancy do not affect the entitlement of a member serving on the  
26 board immediately before September 1, 2003, to continue to serve

16 administrative or judicial proceeding arising from a report or

18 the effective date of this Act. The immunity or liability of a  
19 person who makes a report, assists in an investigation, testifies,  
20 or otherwise participates in a proceeding before the effective date  
21 of this Act is governed by the law in effect at the time those

24 SECTION 32. (a) The change in law made by this Act to  
25 Section 901.602, Occupations Code, applies only to an offense

1 of this Act if any element of the offense occurs before that date.

2 (b) An offense committed before the effective date of this  
3 Act is covered by the law in effect when the offense was committed,  
4 and the former law is continued in effect for that purpose.
