1 AN ACT 2 relating to Celebrate Freedom Week and to certain instruction in 3 social studies classes in public schools. BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: 4 SECTION 1. Section 29.903, Education Code, as added by 5 6 Chapter 451, Acts of the 77th Legislature, Regular Session, 2001, is renumbered as Section 29.907, Education Code, and amended to 7 read as follows: 8 Sec. 29.907 [29.903]. CELEBRATE FREEDOM WEEK. (a) 9 То educate students about the sacrifices made for freedom in the 10 11 founding of this country and the values on which this country was 12 founded, the [last full] week [of classes] in which November 11 falls [September] is designated as Celebrate Freedom Week in public 13 14 schools. For purposes of this subsection, Sunday is considered the first day of the week. 15 [Celebrate Freedom Week may include appropriate 16 (b) instruction, as determined by each school district, in each social 17 18 studies class. Instruction should include study of the intent, meaning, and importance of the Declaration of Independence and the 19 United States Constitution, including the Bill of Rights, in their 20 21 historical context. The study of the Declaration of Independence 22 should include the relationship of the ideas expressed in that 23 document to subsequent American history, including but not limited to the relationship of its ideas to the rich diversity of our people 24

as a nation of immigrants, the American Revolution, the formulation 1 of the United States Constitution, and the abolitionist movement, 2 which led to the Emancipation Proclamation and the women's suffrage 3 4 movement. During Celebrate Freedom Week, a school district may 5 require students in grade levels 3 through 12 to study the text 6 quoted below: [WE hold these Truths to be self-evident, that all Men are 7 8 created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain 9 unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the

10 Pursuit of Happiness--That to secure these Rights, Governments are 11 instituted among Men, deriving their just Powers from the Consent 12 of the Governed]

The agency, in cooperation with other state agencies who voluntarily participate, may promote Celebrate Freedom Week through a coordinated program. Nothing in this <u>subsection</u> [<u>subchapter</u>] shall give any other state agency the authority to develop a program that provides instruction unless funds are specifically appropriated to that agency for that purpose.

SECTION 2. (a) Not later than December 31, 2003, the State 19 Board of Education shall adopt rules requiring each social studies 20 class to include, during Celebrate Freedom Week as provided under 21 Section 29.907, Education Code, or during another full school week 22 as determined by the board of trustees of a school district, 23 24 appropriate instruction concerning the intent, meaning, and 25 importance of the Declaration of Independence and the United States Constitution, including the Bill of Rights, in their historical 26 contexts. The rules must provide for the study of the Declaration 27

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of Independence to include the study of the relationship of the ideas expressed in that document to subsequent American history, including the relationship of its ideas to the rich diversity of our people as a nation of immigrants, the American Revolution, the formulation of the United States Constitution, and the abolitionist movement, which led to the Emancipation Proclamation and the women's suffrage movement.

8 (b) In adopting rules under Subsection (a) of this section, 9 the State Board of Education shall provide for each school 10 district:

(1) to require that, during Celebrate Freedom Week or other week of instruction prescribed under Subsection (a) of this section, students in grade levels 3 through 12 study and recite the text quoted below:

WE hold these Truths to be self-evident, that all Men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the Pursuit of Happiness--That to secure these Rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just Powers from the Consent of the Governed."; and

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(2) to excuse from the recitation a student:

(A) whose parent or guardian submits to thedistrict a written request that the student be excused;

(B) who, as determined by the district, has a
conscientious objection to the recitation; or

(C) who is the child of a representative of aforeign government to whom the United States government extends

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1 diplomatic immunity.

2 SECTION 3. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives 3 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as 4 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this 5 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this 6 Act takes effect September 1, 2003.
