Section 615.003, Government Code, is amended to 5 read as follows: 6 7 Sec. 615.003. APPLICABILITY. This chapter applies only to eligible survivors of the following individuals: 8 an individual elected, appointed, or employed as a 9 (1)peace officer by the state or a political subdivision of the state 10 11 under Article 2.12, Code of Criminal Procedure, or other law; 12 (2) a paid probation officer appointed by the director 13 of a community supervision and corrections department who has the duties set out in Section 76.002 and the qualifications set out in 14 Section 76.005, or who was appointed in accordance with prior law; 15 (3) a parole officer employed by the pardons and 16 paroles division of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice who 17 has the duties set out in Section 508.001 and the gualifications set 18 out in Section 508.113 or in prior law; 19 (4) a paid jailer; 20 21 (5) a member of an organized police reserve or 22 auxiliary unit who regularly assists peace officers in enforcing 23 criminal laws; 24 (6) a member of the class of employees of the

SECTION 2. The change in law made by this Act to Section 16 17 615.003, Government Code, relating to the death of a member of an organized volunteer fire-fighting unit applies only in relation to 18 a death that occurs on or after the effective date of this Act. 19 Matters regarding eligibility, payment, and benefits under Chapter 20 615, Government Code, in relation to a death that occurs before the 21 effective date of this Act are governed by the law in effect when 22 the death occurs, and the former law is continued in effect for that 23 24 purpose.

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SECTION 3. This Act takes effect September 1, 2003.

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
