A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1	AN ACT
2	relating to the promotion of and funding for heritage tourism and
3	economic development near the Texas-Mexico border.
4	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
5	SECTION 1. Chapter 481, Government Code, is amended by
6	adding Subchapter M to read as follows:
7	SUBCHAPTER M. BORDERLANDS HERITAGE TOURISM COUNCIL
8	Sec. 481.181. DEFINITIONS. In this subchapter:
9	(1) "Council" means the Borderlands Heritage Tourism
10	Council.
11	(2) "Heritage tourism" means tourism primarily based
12	on a destination's history, landscape, trail systems, culture,
13	parks, or natural preserves.
14	(3) "Historic property" means a district, site,
15	building, structure, or object that is included on or meets the
16	criteria for inclusion on the National Register of Historic Places
17	or that is otherwise recognized by this state or a political
18	subdivision of this state as having historical, prehistorical, or
19	archaeological significance to the heritage of this state.
20	(4) "Natural or historical asset" means a locale,
21	collection, itinerary, vista, landscape, cultural phenomenon,
22	geological formation, byway, trail, waterway, or other property
23	that is or that might become of unique, unusual, or pronounced
24	interest to a resident or tourist of the area near the asset.

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1	Sec. 481.182. ESTABLISHMENT. The department shall
2	establish and administer the Borderlands Heritage Tourism Council.
3	Sec. 481.183. COUNCIL MEMBERS. The council consists of:
4	(1) one representative of the governor, appointed by
5	the governor;
6	(2) one representative of the lieutenant governor,
7	appointed by the lieutenant governor;
8	(3) one representative of the secretary of state,
9	appointed by the secretary of state;
10	(4) one representative of the tourism division of the
11	department, appointed by the governing board of the department;
12	(5) one member of the public, appointed by the
13	governor after consultation with the speaker of the house of
14	representatives;
15	(6) one representative of the Texas Historical
16	Commission, appointed by the Texas Historical Commission;
17	(7) one representative of the Parks and Wildlife
18	Department, appointed by the Parks and Wildlife Commission;
19	(8) one representative of the Texas Department of
20	Transportation, appointed by the Texas Transportation Commission;
21	and
22	(9) one representative from each regional planning
23	commission established under Chapter 391, Local Government Code, by
24	a municipality or county located in the border region, appointed by
25	the governor after consultation with each regional planning
26	commission.
27	Sec. 481.184. COUNCIL DUTIES. The council shall:

C.S.H.B. No. 2976 (1) provide leadership in preserving historic 1 2 property and developing the potential for heritage tourism of the border region through cooperative agreements with local 3 4 governments, Native American governments, and federal agencies 5 consistent with Executive Order 13287, as published in the March 5, 6 2003, Federal Register; (2) develop cooperative agreements with agencies of 7 the United Mexican States, or agencies of states of the United 8 9 Mexican States that border Texas, to: (A) advance the protection, enhancement, and 10 contemporary use of historic property and natural or historical 11 12 assets pertaining to the common heritage of the border region; and (B) develop mutually beneficial tourism 13 14 development strategies; 15 (3) develop strategies to encourage the use of the Internet to promote tourism in this state; 16 17 (4) designate as a borderlands heritage corridor the counties of the Texas-Mexico border region, as that term is defined 18 by Section 2056.002(e), and develop itineraries and maps to guide 19 tourists to the Texas-Mexico border region's historic property and 20 21 natural or historical assets; 22 (5) assist locally based border heritage guides and artisans cooperatives in establishing training and certification 23 24 programs for Borderlands Heritage Tourism guides and artisans; 25 (6) facilitate public-private partnerships to invest 26 in the use, reuse, and rehabilitation of historic properties or natural or historical assets; 27

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1	(7) on the recommendation of a local government,
2	identify specific opportunities for the preservation of natural or
3	historical assets and for the development of heritage tourism, in
4	conjunction with a state-sponsored trails system and the heritage
5	sites and itineraries identified by the council;
6	(8) develop and coordinate local public-private
7	partnerships to facilitate heritage tourism in the borderlands
8	heritage corridor identified under Subdivision (4);
9	(9) develop and publish a working list of existing
10	public and private funds available for historic property and
11	natural or historical asset preservation projects;
12	(10) study the feasibility of working with state
13	agencies, universities, and colleges and with private corporations
14	to identify cash and in-kind resources that can be offered as
15	matching contributions for projects overseen by the council; and
16	(11) provide technical assistance to local
17	governments in rural areas of the border region in:
18	(A) information technology training;
19	(B) Internet website construction and
20	management; and
21	(C) public relations consistent with available
22	funds.
23	Sec. 481.185. INTERFERENCE WITH PROPERTY RIGHTS
24	PROHIBITED. The council may not interfere with rights of owners of
25	private property.

20	Sec. 481.186. CERTAIN ACTION OR DISCLOSURE NOT REQUIRED.

action or disclose any information that would conflict with or 1 2 compromise national or state homeland security goals, policies, 3 programs, or legally sanctioned activities. 4 Sec. 481.187. REVENUE RESTRICTIONS. This subchapter does 5 not authorize the encumbrance of revenue generated by a municipal 6 or county hotel occupancy tax. Sec. 481.188. MEETINGS WITH LOCAL GOVERNMENTS. Each year, 7 8 the council shall hold at least five public meetings in the border 9 region for local governments and local stakeholders in heritage tourism of the border region to hear reports from the state officers 10 and agencies with representatives serving on the council. At each 11 meeting, the state officers and agencies shall reveal specific 12 plans and projects to be undertaken within the local governments 13 14 and receive specific recommendations from the local governments and 15 tourism industry representatives. SECTION 2. Subchapter F, Chapter 502, Transportation Code, 16 17 is amended by adding Section 502.300 to read as follows: Sec. 502.300. PRESERVE AMERICA'S BORDERLAND 18 LICENSE PLATES. (a) The department may issue specially designed license 19 plates for passenger cars and light trucks to support the 20 21 activities of the Borderlands Heritage Tourism Council. 22 (b) If the department issues license plates under this section, the department shall design the license plates in 23 24 consultation with the Borderlands Heritage Tourism Council.

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25 (c) If the department issues license plates under this 26 section, the department shall issue the license plates to a person 27 who:

(1) applies to the county tax assessor-collector of 1 2 the county in which the person resides on a form provided by the 3 department; and 4 (2) pays a fee of \$50 for an original issuance of license plates under this section or \$40 for a renewal of issuance 5 6 of license plates under this section, in addition to the fee prescribed by Section 502.161 or 502.162, and, if personalized 7 prestige license plates are issued, in addition to the fee 8 9 prescribed by Section 502.251. The fee for replacement of a lost, stolen, or mutilated 10 (d) plate issued under this section is \$35, in addition to the fee 11 12 prescribed by Section 502.184(a). (e) Of each fee collected under this section, \$8 may be used 13 14 to defray the cost of administering this section by the department. 15 The department shall deposit the remainder of each fee collected 16 under this section to the credit of an account in the state 17 treasury. Money in the account may be used only by the Texas Department of Economic Development for projects overseen by the 18 Borderlands Heritage Tourism Council. The Texas Department of 19 Economic Development shall establish reporting and other 20 21 mechanisms necessary to ensure that the money is spent for purposes for which it is dedicated. 22 (f) If the owner of a vehicle registered under this section 23 24 disposes of the vehicle during the registration year, the owner shall return the special license plates to the department. 25 SECTION 3. The Texas Department of Transportation shall 26 work with federal and local authorities that have an interest in 27

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port of entry issues to develop recommendations for the legislature 1 to assert the state's interest in historical and traditional border 2 3 crossings, so that the crossings may be preserved and may provide a 4 regulated link for the movement of people between the communities on both sides of the Texas-Mexico border. The Texas Department of 5 6 Transportation shall deliver these recommendations to the legislature not later than December 1, 2004. 7

8 SECTION 4. The Texas Department of Economic Development 9 shall establish the Borderlands Heritage Tourism Council under 10 Subchapter M, Chapter 481, Government Code, as added by this Act, on 11 or before September 1, 2003.

12 SECTION 5. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives 13 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as 14 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this 15 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this 16 Act takes effect September 1, 2003.
