## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1 AN ACT

- 2 relating to the powers and duties of the Texas Rehabilitation
- 3 Commission.
- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
- 5 SECTION 1. Section 111.052, Human Resources Code, is
- 6 amended to read as follows:
- 7 Sec. 111.052. GENERAL FUNCTIONS. (a) The commission
- 8 shall, to the extent of resources available and priorities
- 9 established by the board, provide rehabilitation services directly
- 10 or through public or private resources to individuals determined by
- 11 the commission to be eliqible for the services under a vocational
- 12 rehabilitation program[ , an extended rehabilitation services
- 13 program, or other program established to provide rehabilitative
- 14 services.
- 15 (b) In carrying out the purposes of this chapter, the
- 16 commission may:
- 17 (1) cooperate with other departments, agencies,
- 18 political subdivisions, and institutions, both public and private,
- 19 in providing the services authorized by this chapter to eligible
- 20 individuals, in studying the problems involved, and in planning,
- 21 establishing, developing, and providing necessary or desirable
- 22 programs, facilities, and services, including those jointly
- 23 administered with state agencies;
- 24 (2) enter into reciprocal agreements with other

- 2 (3) establish or construct rehabilitation facilities
  3 and workshops, contract with or provide grants to agencies,
  4 organizations, or individuals as necessary to implement this
  5 chapter, make contracts or other arrangements with public and other
  6 nonprofit agencies, organizations, or institutions for the
  7 establishment of workshops and rehabilitation facilities, and
  8 operate facilities for carrying out the purposes of this chapter;
- 9 (4) conduct research and compile statistics relating 10 to the provision of services to or the need for services by disabled 11 individuals;
- (5) provide for the establishment, supervision, management, and control of small business enterprises to be operated by individuals with significant disabilities where their operation will be improved through the management and supervision of the commission;
- 17 (6) contract with schools, hospitals, private 18 industrial firms, and other agencies and with doctors, nurses, 19 technicians, and other persons for training, physical restoration, 20 transportation, and other rehabilitation services; and
- 21 (7) <u>assess the statewide need for services necessary</u>
  22 <u>to prepare students with disabilities for a successful transition</u>
  23 <u>to employment, establish collaborative relationships with each</u>
  24 <u>school district with education service centers to the maximum</u>
  25 <u>extent possible within available resources, and develop strategies</u>
  26 <u>to assist vocational rehabilitation counselors in identifying and</u>
  27 reaching students in need of transition planning [contract with a

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- 1 public or private agency to provide and pay for rehabilitative
- 2 services under the extended rehabilitation services program,
- 3 including alternative sheltered employment or community integrated
- 4 employment for a person participating in the program].
- 5 SECTION 2. Sections 111.002(7), 111.0525(a), and 111.073,
- 6 Human Resources Code, are repealed.
- 7 SECTION 3. This Act takes effect September 1, 2003.
