## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1 AN ACT

- 2 relating to the powers and duties of the Office of Rural and Border
- 3 Community Affairs and creating a foundation to finance border
- 4 health programs.
- 5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
- 6 SECTION 1. The chapter heading for Chapter 487, Government
- 7 Code, is amended to read as follows:
- 8 CHAPTER 487. OFFICE OF RURAL AND BORDER COMMUNITY AFFAIRS
- 9 SECTION 2. Section 487.001, Government Code, is amended to
- 10 read as follows:
- 11 Sec. 487.001. DEFINITIONS. In this chapter:
- 12 (1) "Executive committee" means the executive
- 13 committee of the Office of Rural and Border Community Affairs.
- 14 (2) "Office" means the Office of Rural and Border
- 15 Community Affairs.
- SECTION 3. Section 487.002, Government Code, is amended to
- 17 read as follows:
- 18 Sec. 487.002. SUNSET PROVISION. The Office of Rural and
- 19 Border Community Affairs is subject to Chapter 325 (Texas Sunset
- 20 Act). Unless continued in existence as provided by that chapter,
- 21 the office is abolished and this chapter expires September 1, 2007.
- SECTION 4. Section 487.021(c), Government Code, is amended
- 23 to read as follows:
- (c) The governor, the lieutenant governor, and the speaker

- 1 of the house of representatives shall each appoint at least two
- 2 members who possess a strong understanding of and commitment to
- 3 rural or border interests based on the individual's personal
- 4 history, including residency, occupation, and business or civic
- 5 activities.
- 6 SECTION 5. Section 487.022(b), Government Code, is amended
- 7 to read as follows:
- 8 (b) A person may not be a member of the executive committee
- 9 and may not be an office employee employed in a "bona fide
- 10 executive, administrative, or professional capacity," as that
- 11 phrase is used for purposes of establishing an exemption to the
- 12 overtime provisions of the federal Fair Labor Standards Act of 1938
- 13 (29 U.S.C. Section 201 et seq.) and its subsequent amendments, if:
- 14 (1) the person is an officer, employee, or paid
- 15 consultant of a Texas trade association in the field of rural or
- 16 border affairs; or
- 17 (2) the person's spouse is an officer, manager, or paid
- 18 consultant of a Texas trade association in the field of rural or
- 19 border affairs.
- SECTION 6. Section 487.051, Government Code, is amended to
- 21 read as follows:
- 22 Sec. 487.051. POWERS AND DUTIES. The office shall:
- 23 (1) develop a rural and border policy for the state in
- 24 consultation with local leaders representing all facets of rural
- 25 and border community life, academic and industry experts, and
- 26 state elected and appointed officials with interests in rural and
- 27 border communities;

- 1 (2) work with other state agencies and officials to
- 2 improve the results and the cost-effectiveness of state programs
- 3 affecting rural and border communities through coordination of
- 4 efforts;
- 5 (3) develop programs to improve the leadership
- 6 capacity of rural <u>and border</u> community leaders;
- 7 (4) monitor developments that have a substantial
- 8 effect on rural and border Texas communities, especially actions
- 9 of state government, and compile an annual report describing and
- 10 evaluating the condition of rural communities;
- 11 (5) administer the federal community development
- 12 block grant nonentitlement program;
- 13 (6) administer programs supporting rural health care
- 14 as provided by Subchapters D-H;
- 15 (7) perform research to determine the most beneficial
- and cost-effective ways to improve the welfare of rural and border
- 17 communities;
- 18 (8) ensure that the office qualifies as the state's
- 19 office of rural health for the purpose of receiving grants from the
- 20 Office of Rural Health Policy of the United States Department of
- 21 Health and Human Services under 42 U.S.C. Section 254r; and
- 22 (9) manage the state's Medicare rural hospital
- 23 flexibility program under 42 U.S.C. Section 1395i-4.
- SECTION 7. The section heading for Section 487.054,
- 25 Government Code, is amended to read as follows:
- Sec. 487.054. ANNUAL MEETING ON RURAL AND BORDER ISSUES.
- 27 SECTION 8. Section 487.054(a), Government Code, is amended

- 1 to read as follows:
- 2 (a) At least once each year, the following agency heads
- 3 shall meet to discuss rural and border issues:
- 4 (1) the commissioner of agriculture;
- 5 (2) the executive director of the Public Utility
- 6 Commission of Texas;
- 7 (3) the director of the Texas Agricultural Extension
- 8 Service;
- 9 (4) the presiding officer of the Telecommunications
- 10 Infrastructure Fund Board;
- 11 (5) the executive director of the Texas Department of
- 12 Housing and Community Affairs;
- 13 (6) the commissioner of health;
- 14 (7) the executive administrator of the Texas Water
- 15 Development Board;
- 16 (8) the executive director of the Parks and Wildlife
- 17 Department;
- 18 (9) the commissioner of human services;
- 19 (10) the commissioner of higher education;
- 20 (11) the comptroller; and
- 21 (12) the executive director of the Texas Department of
- 22 Transportation.
- SECTION 9. Section 487.056, Government Code, is amended to
- 24 read as follows:
- Sec. 487.056. REPORT TO LEGISLATURE. Not later than
- 26 January 1 of each odd-numbered year, the office shall submit a
- 27 biennial report to the legislature regarding the activities of the

- 1 office and any findings and recommendations relating to rural <u>and</u>
- 2 border issues.
- 3 SECTION 10. Subtitle E, Title 2, Health and Safety Code, is
- 4 amended by adding Chapter 112 to read as follows:
- 5 CHAPTER 112. BORDER FOUNDATION
- 6 Sec. 112.001. CREATION OF FOUNDATION. (a) The Office of
- 7 Border Health of the Texas Department of Health shall establish the
- 8 Border Foundation as a nonprofit corporation that complies with the
- 9 Texas Non-Profit Corporation Act (Article 1396-1.01 et seq.,
- 10 Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes), except as otherwise provided by
- this chapter, and qualifies as an organization exempt from federal
- income tax under Section 501(c)(3), Internal Revenue Code of 1986,
- as amended.
- 14 (b) The Office of Border Health shall ensure that the Border
- 15 Foundation operates independently of any state agency or political
- 16 <u>subdivision of the state.</u>
- 17 Sec. 112.002. POWERS AND DUTIES. (a) The Border Foundation
- 18 shall raise money from foundations, governmental entities, and
- 19 other sources to finance health programs in the Texas counties that
- 20 border Mexico.
- (b) The Border Foundation shall have the powers that are
- 22 necessary and convenient to carry out its duties.
- (c) The Border Foundation shall develop and implement
- 24 policies and procedures that clearly separate the responsibilities
- and activities of the foundation from the Office of Border Health.
- 26 (d) The Border Foundation shall cooperate with the Rural
- 27 Foundation to coordinate projects in counties that are both rural

- 1 and border Mexico.
- 2 Sec. 112.003. BOARD OF DIRECTORS. (a) The Border
- 3 Foundation is governed by a board of five directors appointed by the
- 4 board from individuals recommended by the director of the Office of
- 5 Border Health.
- 6 (b) Members of the board of directors of the Border
- 7 Foundation serve for staggered terms of six years, with as near as
- 8 possible to one-third of the members' terms expiring February 1 of
- 9 each odd-numbered year.
- 10 <u>(c) Appointments to the board of directors of the Border</u>
- 11 Foundation shall be made without regard to the race, color,
- 12 disability, sex, religion, age, or national origin of the
- 13 appointees.
- 14 (d) The board of directors of the Border Foundation shall
- 15 ensure that the foundation remains eligible for an exemption from
- 16 <u>federal income tax under Section 501(a)</u>, <u>Internal Revenue Code of</u>
- 17 1986, as amended, by being listed as an exempt organization under
- 18 Section 501(c)(3) of that code, as amended.
- 19 Sec. 112.004. RESTRICTIONS ON BOARD APPOINTMENT,
- 20 <u>MEMBERSHIP</u>, AND EMPLOYMENT. (a) In this section, "Texas trade
- 21 <u>association</u>" means a cooperative and voluntarily joined
- 22 association of business or professional competitors in this state
- 23 <u>designed to assist its members and its industry or profession in</u>
- 24 dealing with mutual business or professional problems and in
- 25 promoting their own interest.
- 26 (b) A person may not be a member of the board of directors of
- the Border Foundation and may not be a foundation employee employed

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- 1 <u>in a "bona fide executive, administrative, or professional</u>
- 2 capacity," as that phrase is used for purposes of establishing an
- 3 exemption to the overtime provisions of the federal Fair Labor
- 4 Standards Act of 1938 (29 U.S.C. Section 201 et seq.), as amended,
- 5 if:
- 6 (1) the person is an officer, employee, or paid
- 7 consultant of a Texas trade association in the field of health care;
- 8 or
- 9 (2) the person's spouse is an officer, manager, or paid
- 10 consultant of a Texas trade association in the field of health care.
- 11 (c) A person may not be a member of the board of directors of
- 12 the Border Foundation or act as the general counsel to the board of
- directors or the foundation if the person is required to register as
- 14 a lobbyist under Chapter 305, Government Code, because of the
- 15 person's activities for compensation on behalf of a profession
- 16 <u>related to the operation of the foundation.</u>
- Sec. 112.005. REMOVAL OF BOARD MEMBER. (a) It is a ground
- 18 for removal from the board of directors of the Border Foundation
- 19 that a member:
- 20 (1) is ineligible for membership under Section
- 21 112.004;
- 22 (2) cannot, because of illness or disability,
- 23 <u>discharge the member's duties for a substantial part of the member's</u>
- 24 term; or
- 25 (3) is absent from more than half of the regularly
- 26 scheduled board meetings that the member is eligible to attend
- 27 during a calendar year without an excuse approved by a majority vote

- 1 of the board of directors.
- 2 (b) The validity of an action of the board of directors of
- 3 the Border Foundation is not affected by the fact that it is taken
- 4 when a ground for removal of a board member exists.
- 5 (c) If the director of the Office of Border Health has
- 6 knowledge that a potential ground for removal exists, the director
- 7 shall notify the presiding officer of the board of directors of the
- 8 Border Foundation of the potential ground. The presiding officer
- 9 shall then notify the governor and the attorney general that a
- 10 potential ground for removal exists. If the potential ground for
- 11 removal involves the presiding officer, the director shall notify
- 12 the next highest ranking officer of the board of directors, who
- 13 shall then notify the governor and the attorney general that a
- 14 potential ground for removal exists.
- Sec. 112.006. VACANCY. A vacancy on the board of directors
- of the Border Foundation shall be filled for the remainder of the
- 17 unexpired term in the same manner as the original appointment.
- 18 Sec. 112.007. OFFICERS. The board of directors of the
- 19 Border Foundation shall elect from among its members a presiding
- officer, an assistant presiding officer, and other officers the
- 21 board considers necessary. The presiding officer and assistant
- 22 presiding officer serve for a period of one year and may be
- 23 reelected.
- Sec. 112.008. MEETINGS. The board of directors of the
- 25 Border Foundation may meet as often as necessary, but shall meet at
- least twice a year.
- Sec. 112.009. TAX EXEMPTION. All income, property, and

- other assets of the Border Foundation are exempt from taxation by
- 2 the state and political subdivisions of the state.
- 3 Sec. 112.010. MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING. The Border
- 4 Foundation and the Office of Border Health shall enter into a
- 5 memorandum of understanding that:
- 6 (1) requires the board of directors and staff of the
- 7 foundation to report to the director of the Office of Border Health;
- 8 (2) allows the Office of Border Health to provide
- 9 staff functions to the foundation;
- 10 <u>(3) allows the Office of Border Health to expend funds</u>
- 11 on the foundation; and
- 12 (4) outlines the financial contributions to be made to
- 13 the foundation from funds obtained from grants and other sources.
- Sec. 112.011. RECORDS. (a) The Border Foundation shall
- 15 maintain financial records and reports independently from those of
- 16 the Office of Border Health.
- 17 (b) The Border Foundation shall comply with all filing
- 18 requirements of the secretary of state and the Internal Revenue
- 19 Service.
- Sec. 112.012. REPORT TO OFFICE OF BORDER HEALTH. Not later
- 21 than the 60th day after the last day of the fiscal year, the Border
- 22 Foundation shall submit to the Office of Border Health a report
- 23 itemizing all income and expenditures and describing all activities
- of the foundation during the preceding fiscal year.
- 25 SECTION 11. Sections 51.918(a) and (c), Education Code, are
- 26 amended to read as follows:
- 27 (a) The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board, the

- 1 Office of Rural and Border Community Affairs, medical schools,
- 2 nursing schools, and schools of allied health sciences shall
- 3 cooperate to improve and expand programs for rural areas.
- 4 (c) The Office of Rural <u>and Border</u> Community Affairs shall
- 5 develop relief service programs for rural physicians and allied
- 6 health personnel to facilitate ready access to continuing medical
- 7 education as well as to provide practice coverage for purposes
- 8 other than continuing medical education.
- 9 SECTION 12. Section 58.007, Education Code, is amended to
- 10 read as follows:
- 11 Sec. 58.007. ADVISORY COMMITTEE. (1) The Primary Care
- 12 Residency Advisory Committee is created and shall consist of 12
- 13 members as follows:
- 14 (A) seven members shall be licensed physicians,
- one appointed by each of the following:
- 16 (i) the Texas Medical Association;
- 17 (ii) the Texas Osteopathic Medical
- 18 Association;
- 19 (iii) the Texas Academy of Family
- 20 Physicians;
- 21 (iv) the Texas Society of the American
- 22 College of Osteopathic Family Physicians;
- 23 (v) the Texas Society of Internal Medicine;
- 24 (vi) the Texas Pediatric Society; and
- 25 (vii) the Texas Association of
- 26 Obstetricians and Gynecologists;
- 27 (B) one member shall be appointed by the Office

- 1 of Rural <u>and Border</u> Community Affairs;
- 2 (C) one member shall be appointed by the Bureau
- 3 of Community Oriented Primary Care at the Texas Department of
- 4 Health; and
- 5 (D) three members shall be members of the public,
- 6 one appointed by each of the following:
- 7 (i) the governor;
- 8 (ii) the lieutenant governor; and
- 9 (iii) the speaker of the house of
- 10 representatives.
- 11 SECTION 13. Section 403.1065(c), Government Code, is
- 12 amended to read as follows:
- 13 (c) The available earnings of the fund may be appropriated
- 14 to the Office of Rural and Border Community Affairs for the purposes
- of Subchapter H, Chapter 487.
- 16 SECTION 14. Section 2306.806, Government Code, is amended
- 17 to read as follows:
- 18 Sec. 2306.806. APPROVAL OF OFFICE OF RURAL AND BORDER
- 19 COMMUNITY AFFAIRS. The department must obtain the approval of the
- 20 executive director of the Office of Rural and Border Community
- 21 Affairs to guarantee loans as described by Section 2306.805(c).
- 22 SECTION 15. Section 86.011, Health and Safety Code, is
- 23 amended to read as follows:
- Sec. 86.011. BREAST CANCER SCREENING. (a) The Office of
- 25 Rural and Border Community Affairs may provide for breast cancer
- 26 screening in counties with a population of 50,000 or less.
- 27 (b) The Office of Rural and Border Community Affairs may

- 1 provide the breast cancer screening through contracts with public
- 2 or private entities to provide mobile units and on-site screening
- 3 services.
- 4 (c) The Office of Rural and Border Community Affairs shall
- 5 coordinate the breast cancer screening with programs administered
- 6 by the Texas Cancer Council.
- 7 SECTION 16. Sections 204.104(b) and (c), Occupations Code,
- 8 are amended to read as follows:
- 9 (b) The Office of Rural and Border Community Affairs shall
- 10 establish policies for and adopt rules to administer the loan
- 11 program.
- 12 (c) The physician assistant board shall authorize and the
- 13 medical board shall transfer annually the funds designated under
- 14 Subsection (a) to the Office of Rural and Border Community Affairs
- 15 to administer the loan program.
- 16 SECTION 17. (a) The Office of Border Health of the Texas
- 17 Department of Health shall create the Border Foundation not later
- 18 than June 1, 2004.
- 19 (b) In making the initial appointments to the board of
- 20 directors of the Border Foundation under Chapter 112, Health and
- 21 Safety Code, as added by this Act, the Texas Board of Health shall
- 22 designate two members for terms expiring February 1, 2005, two
- 23 members for terms expiring February 1, 2007, and one member for a
- term expiring February 1, 2009.
- 25 SECTION 18. This Act takes effect September 1, 2003.
