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A BILL TO BE ENTITLED 1 AN ACT relating to the Office of Rural and Border Affairs 2 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: SECTION 1. The heading of Chapter 487, Government Code, is 4 5 amended to read as follows: CHAPTER 487. OFFICE OF RURAL AND BORDER COMMUNITY AFFAIRS 6 SECTION 2. Section 487.001 is amended to read as follows: 7 Sec. 487.001. Definitions. 8 (1) "Executive committee" means 9 the executive committee of the Office of Rural and Border Community Affairs. 10 (2) "Office" means the Office of Rural and Border 11 12 Community Affairs. 13 SECTION 3. Section 487.002, Government Code, is amended to read as follows: 14 Sec. 487.002 SUNSET PROVISION. The Office of Rural and 15 Border Community Affairs is subject to Chapter 325 (Texas Sunset 16 Act). Unless continued in existence as provided by that chapter, 17 the office is abolished and this chapter expires September 1, 2007. 18 SECTION 4. Section 487.021 (c) is amended to read as 19 follows: 20 21 (c) The governor, the lieutenant governor, and the speaker 22 of the house of representatives shall each appoint at least two members who possess a strong understanding of and commitment to 23 rural or border interests based on the individual's personal 24

history, including residency, occupation, and business or civic
 activities.

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3 SECTION 5. Section 487.051, Government Code is amended to 4 read as follows:

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487.051. Powers and Duties. The office shall:

6 (1) develop a rural <u>and border</u> policy for the state in 7 consultation with local leaders representing all facets of rural 8 <u>and border</u> community life, academic and industry experts, and state 9 elected and appointed officials with interests in rural <u>and border</u> 10 communities;

(2) work with other state agencies and officials to improve the results and the cost-effectiveness of state programs affecting rural <u>and border</u> communities through coordination of efforts;

15 (3) develop programs to improve the leadership 16 capacity of rural <u>and border</u> community leaders;

(4) monitor developments that have a substantial effect on rural <u>and border</u> Texas communities, especially actions of state government, and compile an annual report describing and evaluating the condition of rural communities;

(5) administer the federal community development
 block grant nonentitlement program;

23 (6) administer programs supporting rural health care
24 as provided by Subchapters D-H;

(7) perform research to determine the most beneficial and cost-effective ways to improve the welfare of rural <u>and border</u> communities;

H.B. No. 3297 ensure that the office qualifies as the state's 1 (8) office of rural health for the purpose of receiving grants from the 2 Office of Rural Health Policy of the United States Department of 3 4 Health and Human Services under 42 U.S.C. Section 254r; and 5 (9) manage the state's Medicare rural hospital flexibility program under 42 U.S.C. Section 1395i-4. 6 SECTION 6. 7 Section 487.054, Government Code, is amended to read as follows: 8 487.054. Annual Meeting on Rural and Border Issues (a) 9 At least once each year, the following agency heads shall meet to 10 discuss rural and border issues: 11 (1) the commissioner of agriculture; 12 (2) the executive director of the Public Utility 13 Commission of Texas; 14 15 (3) the director of the Texas Agricultural Extension 16 Service; 17 (4) the presiding officer of the Telecommunications Infrastructure Fund Board; 18 the executive director of the Texas Department of 19 (5) Housing and Community Affairs; 20 (6) the commissioner of health; 21 (7) the executive administrator of the Texas Water 22 23 Development Board; 24 (8) the executive director of the Parks and Wildlife 25 Department; the commissioner of human services; 26 (9) 27 (10)the commissioner of higher education;

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(11)the comptroller; and

2 (12) the executive director of the Texas Department of 3 Transportation.

4 (b) The executive committee shall call the annual meeting. 5 The executive committee shall set the time and date of the meeting 6 after consulting with the agency heads listed in Subsection (a).

7 SECTION 7. Section 487.056, Government Code, is amended to read as follows: 8

9 487.056. Report to Legislature. Not later than January 1 of each odd-numbered year, the office shall submit a biennial report 10 to the legislature regarding the activities of the office and any 11 findings and recommendations relating to rural and border issues. 12

SECTION 8. Subtitle E, Title 2, Health and Safety Code, is 13 amended by adding Chapter 112 to read as follows: 14

Chapter 112. Border Foundation 16 Sec. 112.001. CREATION OF FOUNDATION. (a) The Office of 17 Border Health under the Texas Department of Health shall establish the Border Foundation as a nonprofit corporation that complies with 18 19 the Texas Non-Profit Corporation Act (Article 1396-1.01 et seq., Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes), except as otherwise provided by 20 21 this chapter, and qualifies as an organization exempt from federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3), Internal Revenue Code of 1986, 22 as amended. 23

24 (b) The Office of Border Health shall ensure that the Border 25 Foundation operates independently of any state agency or political 26 subdivision of the state.

27 Sec. 112.002. POWERS AND DUTIES. (a) The Border Foundation

H.B. No. 3297 shall raise money from foundations, governmental entities, and 1 2 other sources to finance health programs in the Texas counties that 3 make-up the Texas-Mexico Border. 4 (b) The Border Foundation shall have the powers that are 5 necessary and convenient to carry out its duties. 6 (c) The Border Foundation shall develop and implement 7 policies and procedures that clearly separate the responsibilities 8 and activities of the foundation from the Office of Border Health. 9 The Border Foundation shall cooperate with the Rural (d) Foundation to coordinate projects in counties that are both rural 10 and on the Texas-Mexico Border. 11 Sec. 112.003. BOARD OF DIRECTORS. (a) 12 The Border Foundation is governed by a board of five directors appointed by the 13 14 executive committee of the Office of Border Health from individuals 15 recommended by the executive director of the Office of Border 16 Health. 17 (b) Members of the board of directors of the Border Foundation serve for staggered terms of six years, with as near as 18 19 possible to one-third of the members' terms expiring February 1 of each odd-numbered year. 20 21 (c) Appointments to the board of directors of the Border Foundation shall be made without regard to the race, color, 22 disability, sex, religion, age, or national origin of the 23 24 appointees. 25 (d) The board of directors of the Border Foundation shall ensure that the foundation remains eligible for an exemption from 26 federal income tax under Section 501(a), Internal Revenue Code of 27

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1	1986, as amended, by being listed as an exempt organization under
2	Section 501(c)(3) of that code, as amended.
3	Sec. 112.004. RESTRICTIONS ON BOARD APPOINTMENT,
4	MEMBERSHIP, AND EMPLOYMENT. (a) In this section, "Texas trade
5	association" means a cooperative and voluntarily joined
6	association of business or professional competitors in this state
7	designed to assist its members and its industry or profession in
8	dealing with mutual business or professional problems and in
9	promoting their own interest.
10	(b) A person may not be a member of the board of directors of
11	the Border Foundation and may not be a foundation employee employed
12	in a "bona fide executive, administrative, or professional
13	capacity," as that phrase is used for purposes of establishing an
14	exemption to the overtime provisions of the federal Fair Labor
15	Standards Act of 1938 (29 U.S.C. Section 201 et seq.), as amended,
16	<u>if:</u>
17	(1) the person is an officer, employee, or paid
18	consultant of a Texas trade association in the field of health care;
19	or
20	(2) the person's spouse is an officer, manager, or paid
21	consultant of a Texas trade association in the field of health care.
22	(c) A person may not be a member of the board of directors of
23	the Border Foundation or act as the general counsel to the board of
24	directors or the foundation if the person is required to register as
25	a lobbyist under Chapter 305, Government Code, because of the
26	person's activities for compensation on behalf of a profession
27	related to the operation of the foundation.

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1	Sec. 112.005. REMOVAL OF A BOARD MEMBER. (a) It is a ground
2	for removal from the board of directors of the Border Foundation
3	that a member:
4	(1) is ineligible for membership under Section
5	<u>112.004;</u>
6	(2) cannot, because of illness or disability,
7	discharge the member's duties for a substantial part of the member's
8	term; or
9	(3) is absent from more than half of the regularly
10	scheduled board meetings that the member is eligible to attend
11	during a calendar year without an excuse approved by a majority vote
12	of the board of directors.
13	(b) The validity of an action of the board of directors of
14	the Border Foundation is not affected by the fact that it is taken
15	when a ground for removal of a board member exists.
16	(c) If the executive director of the Office of Border Health
17	has knowledge that a potential ground for removal exists, the
18	executive director shall notify the presiding officer of the board
19	of directors of the Border Foundation of the potential ground. The
20	presiding officer shall then notify the governor and the attorney
21	general that a potential ground for removal exists. If the
22	potential ground for removal involves the presiding officer, the
23	executive director shall notify the next highest ranking officer of
24	the board of directors, who shall then notify the governor and the
25	attorney general that a potential ground for removal exists.
26	Sec. 112.006. VACANCY. A vacancy on the board of directors
27	of the Border Foundation shall be filled for the remainder of the

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unexpired term in the same manner as the original appointment.
Sec. 112.007. OFFICERS. The board of directors of the
Border Foundation shall elect from among its members a presiding
officer, an assistant presiding officer, and other officers the
board considers necessary. The presiding officer and assistant
presiding officer serve for a period of one year and may be
reelected.
Sec. 112.008. MEETINGS. The board of directors of the
Border Foundation may meet as often as necessary, but shall meet at
least twice a year.
Sec. 112.009. TAX EXEMPTION. All income, property, and
other assets of the Border Foundation are exempt from taxation by
the state and political subdivisions of the state.
Sec. 112.010. MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING. The Border
Foundation and the Office of Border Health shall enter into a
memorandum of understanding that:
(1) requires the board of directors and staff of the
foundation to report to the executive director and executive
committee of the Office of Border Health;
(2) allows the Office of Border Health to provide
staff functions to the foundation;
(3) allows the Office of Border Health to expend funds
on the foundation; and
(4) outlines the financial contributions to be made to
the foundation from funds obtained from grants and other sources.
Sec. 112.011. RECORDS (a) The Border Foundation shall
maintain financial records and reports independently from those of

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1	the Office of Border Health.
2	(b) The Border Foundation shall comply with all filing
3	requirements of the secretary of state and the Internal Revenue
4	Service.
5	Sec. 112.012. REPORT TO OFFICE OF BORDER Health. Not later
6	than the 60th day after the last day of the fiscal year, the Border
7	Foundation shall submit to the Office of Border Health a report
8	itemizing all income and expenditures and describing all activities
9	of the foundation during the preceding fiscal year.
10	SECTION 9. (a) The Office of Border Health shall create
11	the Border Foundation not later than June 1, 2004.
12	(b) In making the initial appointments to the board of
13	directors of the Border Foundation, the executive committee of the
14	Office of Border Health shall designate two members for terms
15	expiring February 1, 2005, two members for terms expiring February

1, 2007, and one member for a term expiring February 1, 2009. 16

SECTION 10. This Act takes effect September 1, 2003. 17
