1 WHEREAS, State Medicaid spending currently accounts for 2 approximately twenty-two percent of total state spending; and

3 WHEREAS, Under the Federal Medical Assistance Percentage,

4 the federal share of state Medicaid spending provided to the State

of Texas has decreased by 4.2 percent over the past ten years; and

6 WHEREAS, Average monthly Medicaid caseloads in the State of

Texas are projected to increase to 2,885,583 by fiscal year 2005

from 2,376,193 in fiscal year 2003; and

9 WHEREAS, Prescription drug costs are a major factor driving

Medicaid expenditures, and annual Medicaid prescription levels in

the State of Texas are projected to rise to 40,257,515 by fiscal

12 year 2005, from 33,859,094 in fiscal year 2003; and

13 WHEREAS, The Congressional Budget Office projects that

14 Medicaid spending under the current system will more than double by

Secretary of Health and Human Services broad authority to waive

certain laws relating to Medicaid or SCHIP for the purpose of

conducting pilot, experimental or demonstration projects which are

- 4 with a consumer directed care model under a Section 1115
- 5 demonstration waiver; and
- 6 WHEREAS, In early 2002, both houses of the legislature of the
- 7 State of Florida voted unanimously to continue with a consumer
- 8 directed care approach; now, therefore, be it
- 9 RESOLVED, That the 78th Legislature of the State of Texas
- 10 hereby respectfully urge the Secretary of the United States
- 11 Department of Health and Human Services to authorize any section
- 12 1115 demonstration waivers, and any other related waivers,
- 13 requested by State of Texas for the purposes of implementing a
