## RESOLUTION

1	BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the State of
2	Texas, That the following is adopted as the housekeeping resolution
3	for the House of Representatives of the $78th$ [ $77th$ ] Legislature:
4	HOUSEKEEPING RESOLUTION FOR

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2.7		ARTICLE 1. GENERAL PROVISIONS	

- 1 SECTION 1.01. PURPOSE. This resolution is adopted by the
- 2 members of the House of Representatives of the 78th [77th]
- 3 Legislature to provide for the efficient and orderly operation of
- 4 the house under the supervision of the speaker and the Committee on
- 5 House Administration.
- 6 SECTION 1.02. PRECEDENCE. The provisions of this
- 7 resolution take precedence over the provisions of any resolution
- 8 not passed in full compliance with the rules of the house and,
- 9 except as otherwise noted herein, shall be in effect during the full
- 10 term of the 78th [77th] Legislature whether in session or
- 11 adjournment.
- 12 ARTICLE 2. SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE
- 13 SECTION 2.01. SPEAKER'S GENERAL POWERS AND DUTIES. The
- 14 speaker may make any expenditures or transfers and perform any
- 15 function deemed necessary for the effective and efficient operation
- of the house of representatives.
- 17 SECTION 2.02. SPEAKER'S APARTMENT AND OFFICES. (a) The
- 18 speaker's apartment and offices shall be set aside for the use of
- 19 the speaker, his family, and members, as the speaker may designate,
- 20 throughout the speaker's term of office.
- 21 (b) The Committee on House Administration may make the
- 22 necessary expenditures to operate and properly equip and service
- the speaker's apartment and offices and may employ such help as may
- 24 be necessary to properly maintain and care for the apartment and
- 25 offices.
- 26 (c) The speaker and his family may occupy the speaker's
- 27 apartment during the speaker's term of office, utilizing the

- 1 services of employees of the house and others on a temporary basis,
- 2 if and as needed.
- 3 (d) The speaker may obtain through the Committee on House
- 4 Administration the necessary supplies and services to operate the
- 5 speaker's office and may also have paid through that committee
- 6 necessary local and long distance telephone charges.
- 7 SECTION 2.03. INTERSTATE OR FEDERAL-STATE ASSOCIATIONS;
- 8 TRAINING SEMINARS. (a) The speaker may attend any meetings of or
- 9 sponsored by the Council of State Governments and any meetings on
- 10 problems of federal-state relations and interstate relations and
- 11 cooperation, and any other governmental meeting in or outside the
- 12 state.
- 13 (b) The speaker may appoint members of the house, staff
- 14 members, and other employees of the house to accompany him or to
- 15 represent him at these meetings or to attend in-service training
- 16 courses sponsored by the Council of State Governments or the
- 17 National Conference of State Legislatures or similar training
- 18 courses, conferences, or seminars as the speaker may determine.
- 19 (c) Members of the house attending meetings under this
- 20 section while the legislature is in session may be reimbursed for
- 21 actual and necessary expenses. Members of the house attending
- 22 meetings under this section while the legislature is not in session
- 23 and staff members and other employees of the house attending
- 24 meetings at any time under this section may be reimbursed for either
- 25 actual and necessary expenses or receive a per diem not to exceed
- 26 that provided by law for state officials or state employees. In
- 27 addition, members, staff, and other employees attending meetings

- under this section may be reimbursed for mileage or other 1 2 transportation expenses at the same rate as provided by law for 3 state officials or state employees together with registration fees 4 To receive payment under this subsection, sworn 5 expense accounts must be filed with and approved by the chair of the 6 Committee on House Administration or an officer of the house designated in writing by the Committee on House Administration. 7 8 Prior written approval of the chair of the Committee on House 9 Administration to attend any such meetings, conferences, seminars, 10 or training courses is a prerequisite for reimbursement for travel and other related expenses. 11
  - (d) Reimbursement for expenses incurred by a member, staff member, or employee of the house in an appointive capacity resulting from an appointment made by anyone other than the speaker shall be made only in the event that the appointment and expenses to be incurred have been previously approved in writing by the Committee on House Administration.
- 18 (e) The speaker may expend money for memberships in 19 interstate associations of legislators considered necessary to 20 discharge properly the duties and responsibilities of the office of 21 speaker.

## ARTICLE 3. GENERAL POWERS AND DUTIES OF THE

## 23 COMMITTEE ON HOUSE ADMINISTRATION

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SECTION 3.01. CONTRACTS. The Committee on House
Administration shall approve all contracts necessary for the
effective operation of the divisions of the house and its
committees.

- 1 SECTION 3.02. HOUSE AND COMMITTEE OPERATING BUDGETS. The
- 2 Committee on House Administration shall consider and adopt
- 3 operating budgets that cover both session and interim periods for
- 4 the divisions of the house and all committees appointed pursuant to
- 5 the resolution adopting the rules of the house or appointed by the
- 6 speaker pursuant to any other resolution.
- 7 SECTION 3.03. OPERATING POLICIES. The Committee on House
- 8 Administration shall effectuate policies and determine guidelines
- 9 for the operation of the divisions and committees of the house.
- SECTION 3.04. HOUSE POLICY MANUAL. The Committee on House
- 11 Administration shall prepare and distribute to all members, within
- 12 60 days after the convening of the regular session, policy
- 13 statements to include, but not be limited to, policies pertaining
- 14 to members as a class.
- 15 SECTION 3.05. HOUSE PROPERTY, SUPPLIES, ACCOUNTING. The
- 16 Committee on House Administration shall:
- 17 (1) provide and maintain for the use of the speaker,
- 18 members, employees, divisions, and committees of the house such
- 19 stationery, stamps, office equipment, furniture, fixtures,
- 20 supplies, and telephone and other services as may be necessary;
- 21 (2) keep an itemized account of the quantity and cost
- of every kind of material received, and the source from which it was
- 23 received;
- 24 (3) maintain an annual operating account for each
- 25 member, division, and committee authorized by the Committee on
- 26 House Administration to make expenditures and charge each operating
- 27 account with daily expenditures, withdrawals from inventory, and

- 1 interdepartmental services;
- 2 (4) furnish a monthly statement for the expenditures
- 3 of each member, division, and committee of the house; and
- 4 (5) adopt any rules, regulations, and policies
- 5 necessary to effectively provide and account for the
- 6 above-mentioned services.
- 7 SECTION 3.06. USE OF HOUSE CHAMBER AND FACILITIES;
- 8 ASSIGNMENT OF DESKS, OFFICES, AND PARKING SPACES. (a) The
- 9 Committee on House Administration shall:
- 10 (1) be in charge of and provide for the protection,
- 11 maintenance, and use of the hall of the house, all committee rooms,
- 12 offices of members and house departments, the speaker's office and
- 13 apartment, and other space under the jurisdiction of the house;
- 14 (2) make permanent assignments of desks and offices to
- 15 members of the house;
- 16 (3) adopt and enforce a plan for the parking of motor
- 17 vehicles on the portion of the Capitol grounds under house
- 18 jurisdiction;
- 19 (4) be in charge of and provide for the protection,
- 20 maintenance, and use of the furniture, fixtures, equipment, and
- 21 records of the house;
- 22 (5) purchase, remodel, repair, restore, or replace any
- 23 furniture, fixtures, equipment, and other furnishings to maintain
- the dignity and appearance of space occupied by the house; and
- 25 (6) determine the hours the hall of the house shall be
- 26 open to visitors.
- (b) Any member who is not a member-elect of the 79th [78th]

- 1 Legislature shall vacate his or her office space before January 1,
- 2 2005  $[\frac{2003}{]}$ . If the office is not vacated on that date, the
- 3 Committee on House Administration shall immediately remove the
- 4 member's personal effects and store them in an appropriate place in
- order that the member-elect to whom the office space is assigned may
- 6 move in.
- 7 SECTION 3.07. RECORDS OF THE HOUSE; PRINTING; JOURNALS;
- 8 COPIES OF LEGISLATIVE DOCUMENTS. (a) The Committee on House
- 9 Administration shall:
- 10 (1) have completed and preserved the official records
- 11 of the house;
- 12 (2) have charge of and approve the operation and
- 13 maintenance of the printing and duplicating facilities of the
- 14 house, provided, however, that the use of the house printing and
- duplicating facilities is restricted to agencies of the legislative
- 16 branch and any other operation thereof is strictly prohibited
- 17 unless previously authorized in writing by the Committee on House
- 18 Administration or an officer of the house designated in writing by
- 19 the speaker;
- 20 (3) determine the number of copies of the daily House
- 21 Journal to be printed and have jurisdiction over the mailing and
- 22 distribution of the daily journal; and
- 23 (4) determine the number of copies of the House
- 24 Journal that will be furnished to each member for distribution by
- 25 the member.
- 26 (b) The employee in charge of the printing facilities must
- 27 keep at least one copy of all items printed or duplicated and a copy

- 1 of the work order authorizing such printing.
- 2 (c) Copies of bills, resolutions, and attachments thereto
- 3 shall be made available free of charge to members of the house who
- 4 call at the bill distribution office and request them, and the cost
- 5 of these copies shall be paid from funds appropriated for that
- 6 purpose by the legislature. If the Committee on House
- 7 Administration finds gross abuse of this privilege, it may
- 8 establish a policy regarding such distribution.
- 9 SECTION 3.08. HONORARY CERTIFICATES. The Committee on
- 10 House Administration shall provide for the use of members
- 11 appropriate certificates to commend, congratulate, and
- 12 memorialize. Such certificates shall be printed with a signature
- 13 line for the name of the presenting member and adequate space for
- 14 insertion of the name of the individual or organization to be
- 15 honored.
- 16 SECTION 3.09. COMPOSITE PHOTOGRAPH. (a) The Committee on
- 17 House Administration shall select a suitable photographer to take
- 18 individual photographs of each member. The photographer shall
- 19 prepare a composite photograph of the members of the house composed
- of the individual photographs of each member arranged on a panel, of
- 21 the same size as used in previous sessions, in such manner as to
- 22 approximate the location of each member's desk on the house floor.
- 23 The member's name and the county of residence shall be printed under
- the member's photograph, and the composite shall be framed and hung
- in the hall of the house during the regular session.
- 26 (b) The photographs for the composite panel shall be
- 27 provided without cost to the members, and the expense of the

- 1 composite panel shall be paid from the expense fund of the house.
- 2 (c) The Committee on House Administration shall establish,
- 3 with concurrence of the photographer, a price to charge members for
- 4 any prints of photographs they wish to purchase.
- 5 ARTICLE 4. EMPLOYEES AND EMPLOYMENT POLICIES
- 6 SECTION 4.01. DEFINITION. Unless expressly provided
- 7 otherwise, in this article "employee" means any person compensated
- 8 from funds appropriated to the house. The term includes persons for
- 9 whom the employing authority is the speaker, the Committee on House
- 10 Administration, an individual member, or a committee.
- 11 SECTION 4.02. OFFICERS AND SUPERVISORY ADMINISTRATIVE
- 12 EMPLOYEES OF THE HOUSE. (a) The officers of the house and the
- 13 employees of the house responsible for supervising the departments
- 14 and divisions that support the operation of the house shall be
- 15 appointed by and serve at the pleasure of the speaker.
- 16 (b) The speaker shall have the right to discharge any
- 17 officer or supervisory administrative employee when the best
- 18 interest of the house of representatives would be served by so
- 19 doing.
- 20 (c) The authority to appoint and discharge officers and
- 21 supervisory administrative employees may be delegated to the
- 22 Committee on House Administration to the extent and for the length
- 23 of time the speaker determines.
- 24 (d) In the event of the absence, resignation, or death of
- 25 any officer or supervisory administrative employee the speaker may
- designate a person to take charge of and attend to all the duties of
- 27 the office affected until the officer returns or until a successor

- 1 is chosen.
- 2 SECTION 4.03. OTHER CENTRAL HOUSE PERSONNEL. (a) The
- 3 Committee on House Administration shall employ all personnel
- 4 necessary for the operation of the house other than:
- 5 (1) those appointed under Section 4.02; or
- 6 (2) employees of an individual member or committee.
- 7 (b) For purposes of this article, the Committee on House
- 8 Administration is the employing authority for all house employees
- 9 other than those for whom the employing authority is the speaker, an
- 10 individual member, or a committee.
- 11 SECTION 4.04. EMPLOYEES OF INDIVIDUAL MEMBER. A member may
- 12 employ, with funds from the member's operating budget, such staff
- 13 as the member deems necessary.
- 14 SECTION 4.05. COMMITTEE STAFF; AUTHORITY TO REQUEST
- 15 ASSISTANCE. (a) The Committee on House Administration shall
- 16 provide funds for the adequate staffing of all committees appointed
- 17 by the speaker.
- 18 (b) Select committees, interim study committees, standing
- 19 committees, or subcommittees appointed pursuant to the resolution
- 20 adopting the rules of the house or appointed by the speaker pursuant
- 21 to any other resolution may employ any person, firm, or
- 22 corporation, subject to budget limitations. Those committees or
- 23 subcommittees may ask the assistance of any of the employees,
- 24 agencies, departments, or branches of the state government.
- 25 SECTION 4.06. WORK SCHEDULE; HOURS OF HOUSE
- OPERATIONS. (a) An employee shall be on duty on the days and hours
- 27 determined by the employing authority.

- 1 (b) All offices of the departments and divisions that
- 2 support the operations of the house shall be open on days and hours
- 3 determined by the Committee on House Administration or the speaker
- 4 and other hours that the house or its committees are in session.
- 5 SECTION 4.07. COMPENSATION. (a) Officers and supervisory
- 6 administrative employees of the house shall receive the
- 7 compensation that the speaker or Committee on House Administration
- 8 determines.
- 9 (b) The Committee on House Administration shall fix the
- 10 compensation of house personnel employed under Section 4.03. A
- 11 person employed under that section who is absent without leave
- 12 shall not receive compensation for the time missed.
- 13 (c) The salaries of employees of individual members,
- 14 committees, and the house shall begin when they are instructed to
- 15 start work by their respective employing authority.
- 16 (d) An employee of an individual member, a committee
- 17 employee, or any person, firm, or corporation employed by a
- 18 committee or subcommittee may not be paid a salary in excess of
- 19  $\$3,640 \ [\$3,500]$  for any one month.
- 20 SECTION 4.08. DUTIES. An employee shall perform all duties
- 21 directed by the employing authority.
- 22 SECTION 4.09. APPEARANCE BEFORE COMMITTEES. An employee
- 23 may appear before a standing or select committee on a measure when
- 24 granted permission by majority vote of the committee.
- 25 SECTION 4.10. CHAMBER ACCESS. (a) An employee may not
- 26 enter the house chamber when the house is in session except when
- 27 performing official duties and specifically authorized by the

- 1 Committee on House Administration.
- 2 (b) An employee may not enter the area on the floor of the
- 3 house enclosed by the railing when the house is in session except
- 4 when specifically authorized by the Committee on House
- 5 Administration.
- 6 SECTION 4.11. VOTING. An employee may not cast a vote for a
- 7 member on the voting machine or otherwise.
- 8 SECTION 4.12. VOTING RECORDS. An employee may not compile
- 9 or release any information concerning the voting record of any
- 10 member of the house for any session of the legislature except when a
- 11 member requests information about that member's personal voting
- 12 record or when the information is for the journal or other official
- 13 records.
- 14 SECTION 4.13. CAMPAIGN FOR SPEAKER. An employee may not
- 15 campaign or assist in the campaign of any candidate for speaker.
- 16 SECTION 4.14. POLITICAL INFLUENCE. An employee may not
- 17 attempt to, or aid anyone in an attempt to, influence any member of
- 18 the house in favor of or against any measure pending before the
- 19 legislature, either directly or indirectly, except when answering
- 20 questions or giving information at the request of a member of the
- 21 house.
- 22 SECTION 4.15. OUTSIDE EMPLOYMENT, EXTRA COMPENSATION, OR
- 23 GIFTS. An employee may not receive, directly or indirectly, any
- 24 compensation, by gift or otherwise, from any other source, unless
- 25 specifically authorized by the employing authority.
- 26 SECTION 4.16. DISCHARGE. (a) An employee is subject to
- 27 immediate discharge by the employing authority for violation of any

- 1 section of this article or any other applicable rule.
- 2 (b) The Committee on House Administration shall dispense
- 3 with the services of any person employed under Section 4.03 who is
- 4 not needed or who is guilty of misconduct.
- 5 (c) An individual member or chair of a committee employing
- 6 an employee who violates any applicable section of this article or
- 7 any rule shall be advised of the violation by the Committee on House
- 8 Administration, and the employing authority shall take appropriate
- 9 action with regard to the employee in question.
- 10 (d) The Committee on House Administration may conduct an
- 11 investigation into allegations of gross misconduct and may
- 12 discharge or otherwise discipline an employee of an individual
- 13 member or committee if the committee finds that the employee has
- 14 engaged in gross misconduct.
- 15 SECTION 4.17. DURATION OF EMPLOYMENT. The period of
- 16 employment of all employees shall be determined by the employing
- 17 authority, except that employees of all committees and of
- 18 individual members who are not members-elect of the next
- 19 legislature shall be terminated not later than noon on the day of
- 20 the convening of the next regular session.
- 21 SECTION 4.18. EMPLOYMENT BY MORE THAN ONE MEMBER OR
- 22 COMMITTEE. (a) Members [Subject to approval of the Committee on
- 23 House Administration, members | may join in the employment of a
- 24 research assistant or assistants to be paid jointly from their
- operating budgets. Unless expressly authorized by the provisions
- of this resolution, the members who join together to sponsor such
- 27 research shall not constitute a committee, task force, or group to

- 1 operate in any official or quasi-official manner not specifically
- 2 authorized under the Rules of the House of Representatives.
- 3 (b) No person, firm, or corporation may be employed by more
- 4 than two committees or subcommittees.
- 5 SECTION 4.19. POSITION TITLES AND CLASSIFICATIONS. The
- 6 job title for each position shall be determined by the employing
- 7 authority. The employing authority and the house business office
- 8 shall classify each job title for accounting purposes according to
- 9 <u>the following position</u> [Position] classifications [for all member
- 10 employees, committee employees, and research employees shall be as
- 11 **follows**], unless otherwise determined by the Committee on House
- 12 Administration:
- 13 (a) Member Employees
- 14 1. Administrative Assistant
- 15 2. Legislative Aide
- 3. Administrative Secretary
- 4. Secretary
- 18 5. Clerk
- 19 (b) Committee Employees
- 20 1. Committee Counsel
- 21 2. Chief Committee Clerk
- 22 3. Committee Clerk
- 23 4. Committee Secretary
- 24 (c) Research Employees
- 25 1. Research Director
- 26 2. Research Assistant
- 27 3. Research Secretary

## ARTICLE 5. ACCOUNTING 1

- SECTION 5.01. FUNDING OF OFFICE OPERATIONS. (a) 2 Each member of the house shall be allocated funds for staff, office 3 4
- supplies, office equipment, postage, printing, telephone, travel,
- and such other reasonable and necessary office expenses as may be 5
- 6 determined by the Committee on House Administration.
- The manner in which funds are allocated, and the amounts 7 8 thereof, are as provided by this article.
- SECTION 5.02. OPERATING ACCOUNTS. (a) 9 Each member who
- served in the 77th [76th] Legislature shall have the following 10
- operating accounts for the <a href="#">78th</a> [77th] Legislature: 11
- (1) a Fiscal Year Three [One] Operating Account 12
- (September 1, 2002 [2000], through August 31, 2003 [2001]); 13
- (2) a Fiscal Year Four  $[\frac{TWO}{}]$ 14 Operating Account
- 15 (September 1, 2003 [2001], through August 31, 2004 [2002]); and
- (3) a Fiscal Year Five [Three] Operating Account 16
- (September 1, 2004 [ $\frac{2002}{}$ ], through January 11, 2005 [ $\frac{14}{}$ ,  $\frac{2003}{}$ ]). 17
- Each member who did not serve in the <u>77th</u> [<del>76th</del>] 18
- Legislature shall have the following operating accounts for the 19
- 78th [<del>77th</del>] Legislature: 20
- Three [One] Operating Account 21 (1) a Fiscal Year
- (January 14, 2003 [9, 2001], through August 31, 2003 [2001]); 22
- (2) a Fiscal Year Four [Two] Operating Account 23
- 24 (September 1, 2003 [<del>2001</del>], through August 31, 2004 [<del>2002</del>]); and
- 25 (3) a Fiscal Year Five [Three] Operating Account
- (September 1, 2004 [ $\frac{2002}{}$ ], through January 11, 2005 [ $\frac{14}{}$ ,  $\frac{2003}{}$ ]). 26
- For each member who served in the 77th 27 (c)

- 1 Legislature, it shall not be necessary to close the member's Fiscal
- 2 Year Three [One] Operating Account when the 78th [77th] Legislature
- 3 convenes.
- 4 SECTION 5.03. CREDIT FOR NEWLY ELECTED MEMBERS. Each
- 5 member who did not serve in the 77th [76th] Legislature may have
- 6 credited to the member's Fiscal Year <u>Three</u> [One] Operating Account
- 7 the amount of \$2,000.
- 8 SECTION 5.04. MONTHLY CREDIT. (a) Each member's operating
- 9 account shall be credited with \$10,750 for each month.
- 10 (b) The Committee on House Administration may provide to the
- 11 dean and the speaker pro tempore of the house additional funds as
- may be determined to be necessary for the duties of those offices to
- 13 be fulfilled.
- 14 SECTION 5.05. ACCOUNT CLOSING AND AUDIT. (a) Each
- 15 member's Fiscal Year  $\underline{\text{Three}}$  [One] Operating Account shall be closed
- as of August 31, 2003 [2001], and a final audit shall be conducted
- 17 as soon thereafter as possible.
- 18 (b) Each member may carry forward and have credited to the
- 19 member's Fiscal Year Four [Two] Operating Account the unexpended
- 20 balance of the member's Fiscal Year Three [One] Operating Account,
- 21 not to exceed \$10,000.
- (c) Each member's Fiscal Year  $\underline{Four}$  [ $\underline{Two}$ ] Operating Account
- 23 shall be closed as of August 31, 2004 [2002], and a final audit
- shall be conducted as soon thereafter as possible.
- 25 (d) Each member may carry forward and have credited to the
- 26 member's Fiscal Year Five [Three] Operating Account the unexpended
- 27 balance of the member's Fiscal Year Four [Two] Operating Account,

- 1 not to exceed \$10,000.
- 2 SECTION 5.06. EXPENDITURES CHARGED WHEN ENCUMBERED. All
- 3 expenditures shall be charged to the period in which they are
- 4 encumbered.
- 5 SECTION 5.07. TRAVEL TO AUSTIN DURING SESSION NOT CHARGED
- 6 TO OPERATING ACCOUNT. While the legislature is in session, the
- 7 travel expenses of members for one trip each week between Austin and
- 8 their districts and return shall not be charged against the
- 9 members' operating accounts but shall be paid from funds
- 10 appropriated for that purpose by the legislature.
- 11 SECTION 5.08. TRAVEL OUTSIDE TEXAS. A member is entitled
- to be reimbursed for actual and necessary expenses incurred while
- 13 traveling outside Texas in the performance of legislative duties
- 14 and responsibilities. If the reimbursement is for travel inside
- 15 the conterminous United States, reimbursement is limited to twice
- the amount that would be reimbursed state employees for the same
- 17 travel under the comptroller's State of Texas Travel Allowance
- 18 Guide.
- 19 SECTION 5.09. APPROVAL OF EXPENDITURES. (a) No allowance
- 20 included in this resolution shall be expended except for actual
- 21 salaries or actual expenses of the house, its members, departments,
- 22 committees, and employees and for such other expenses as are
- 23 authorized by the Committee on House Administration.
- 24 (b) The Committee on House Administration may not authorize
- 25 any expenditures of funds for personal or political campaign
- 26 reasons.
- (c) All expenditures authorized by this resolution shall be

- 1 paid from funds appropriated for the use of the house of
- 2 representatives by vouchers or other forms approved by the speaker
- 3 of the house and the Committee on House Administration.
- 4 ARTICLE 6. CAUCUSES

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SECTION 6.01. In this article, "caucus" means 5 DEFINITION. 6 an organization that is composed exclusively of members of the 7 legislature, that elects or appoints officers and recognizes 8 identified legislators as members of the organization, and that 9 exists for research and other support of policy development and interests that the membership holds in common. An organization 10 whose only nonlegislator members are the lieutenant governor or 11

the governor remains a "caucus" for purposes of this section.

- SECTION 6.02. USE OF HOUSE FUNDS, EMPLOYEES, EQUIPMENT, AND FACILITIES. (a) Except as expressly authorized by this section, funds appropriated to the house may not be expended in support of a caucus, employees compensated from funds appropriated to the house may not perform caucus activities, and state-owned equipment and facilities may not be used in the performance of caucus activities.
- (b) A person who is a caucus employee may not also be an employee of an individual member or a committee and may not be compensated for any purpose from funds appropriated to the house of representatives.
- 23 (c) An individual member of the house may authorize the use 24 of state equipment assigned to the member's office and the 25 performance of caucus activities by an employee of the member only 26 if:
- 27 (1) the member determines that the activities support

- 1 the member's official duties;
- 2 (2) the caucus does not endorse or support a candidate
- 3 for public office;
- 4 (3) the caucus complies with the open meetings law
- 5 (Chapter 551, Government Code) and public information [open
- 6 records] law (Chapter 552, Government Code) as a governmental body;
- 7 and
- 8 (4) the caucus does not accept contributions from
- 9 nonmembers that are required by law to be reported to the Texas
- 10 Ethics Commission.
- 11 (d) A caucus may use the meeting rooms of the Capitol and
- 12 Capitol extension to conduct meetings of the caucus membership or
- 13 to host public forums on matters of interest to the caucus.
- (e) An individual member may not house, in the state office
- space assigned to the member, caucus employees or equipment owned
- 16 by a caucus. A member may retain in the member's office a
- 17 telephone, facsimile machine, or computer owned by the caucus for
- 18 purposes of the member's communication with the caucus or caucus
- 19 employees.
- 20 (f) This section does not prohibit a member of the house
- from employing a person who at the same time is receiving a stipend
- from a caucus, or a nonprofit corporation affiliated with a caucus,
- 23 <u>if:</u>
- 24 (1) the employment is in connection with an internship
- 25 program associated with an institution of higher education for
- 26 which the person receiving the stipend is receiving course credit;
- 27 (2) the person is employed by the house member for not

- 1 more than six months; and
- 2 (3) the person has not previously participated in an
- 3 <u>internship program for which a caucus or nonprofit corporation</u>
- 4 affiliated with a caucus has provided a stipend.
- 5 SECTION 6.03. CONTRIBUTIONS. (a) A person acting on
- 6 behalf of a caucus may not knowingly accept a contribution in
- 7 violation of Section 253.0341, Election Code.
- 8 (b) A person acting on behalf of a caucus may not knowingly
- 9 accept, and shall refuse a contribution that is received, in the
- 10 Capitol.
- 11 SECTION 6.04. MEMBERSHIP AND OFFICER LISTS. Each caucus
- 12 shall provide to the chief clerk, on a regular basis, a list of its
- 13 current membership and officers.
- 14 ARTICLE 7. HOUSE RESEARCH ORGANIZATION
- 15 SECTION 7.01. ESTABLISHMENT. The Committee on House
- 16 Administration shall provide operating funds for a house research
- organization that will be an administrative department of the house
- and may for that purpose adopt policies and procedures relating to
- 19 the administrative operation of that organization.
- 20 SECTION 7.02. STEERING COMMITTEE. The functions and
- 21 duties performed by the house research organization shall be
- 22 governed by a 15-member steering committee composed of house
- 23 members serving staggered four-year terms, who are subject to
- 24 approval of the house membership.
- 25 SECTION 7.03. BUDGET. The house research organization
- shall have an operating account and in compliance with the terms of
- 27 its establishment shall operate under a budget approved by the

- 1 steering committee and the Committee on House Administration.
- 2 ARTICLE 8. SPECIAL PROVISIONS FOR INTERIM
- 3 SECTION 8.01. INTERIM COMMITTEE ACTIVITIES. (a) Pursuant
- 4 to the Legislative Reorganization Act of 1961 (Subchapter B,
- 5 Chapter 301, Government Code), standing committees of the house
- 6 established by the rules of the house may hold meetings while the
- 7 legislature is not in session.
- 8 (b) The speaker may grant authority to select committees,
- 9 interim study committees, subcommittees, or standing committees of
- 10 the house to hold meetings while the legislature is not in session
- 11 as the speaker considers necessary and desirable to conduct the
- 12 business of the house and to assist the speaker in conducting the
- 13 business of the house, under a pattern of operation and
- 14 restrictions determined by the rules of the house.
- 15 (c) The committee members and employees may either be
- 16 reimbursed for actual and necessary expenses or receive a per diem
- 17 not to exceed that provided by law for state officials or state
- 18 employees, along with mileage or other transportation expenses at
- 19 the same rate as provided by law for state officials or state
- 20 employees when conducting such business and attending those
- 21 meetings when approved by the Committee on House Administration.
- 22 SECTION 8.02. POWERS AND DUTIES OF COMMITTEE ON HOUSE
- 23 ADMINISTRATION DURING INTERIM. (a) When the legislature is not in
- 24 session, the Committee on House Administration may act as provided
- 25 by this section.
- 26 (b) The committee may call meetings for the transaction of
- 27 necessary business, and the committee members shall be reimbursed

for expenses incurred by them when attending such meetings or when
in performance of their duties as members of the Committee on House
Administration, the reimbursement to be either actual and necessary
expenses or a per diem not to exceed that provided by law for state
officials or state employees, along with mileage or other
transportation expenses at the same rate as provided by law for

state officials or state employees.

- (c) The committee may reimburse authorized members and employees for expenses incurred by them when traveling in the performance of their legislative duties and responsibilities within their respective districts or within any county in which any part of their districts lie or from their districts to the State Capitol, the reimbursement to be either actual and necessary expenses or a per diem not to exceed that provided by law for state officials or state employees, along with mileage or other transportation expenses at the same rate as provided by law for state officials or state employees.
- (d) The committee may pay for all other reasonable and necessary expenses, including operation of each member's district office, incurred by the members of the house of representatives. The expenses shall be paid from funds appropriated for that purpose by the 78th [77th] Legislature, or any other funds appropriated for the use of the house of representatives, on vouchers or other forms approved by the chair of the Committee on House Administration, in accordance with regulations governing such expenditures.
- 26 (e) The committee may assign or reassign parking places in 27 the best interest of the house under such terms and conditions as

1 the committee deems necessary.
