## RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, The High School for Health Professions in Mercedes was one of only four schools in Texas to receive a 2001-2002 Title I Distinguished School Award from the U.S. Department of Education; and

WHEREAS, To qualify for this prestigious honor, a school must have more than 50 percent of its student population recognized as low-income, have an "exemplary" accountability rating from the state, and have an exemption rate on the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) test that is below the state average for special education and non-English-speaking students; other important benchmarks include students' daily performance, TAAS exam results, and the quality of the school's student-support staff; and

WHEREAS, The High School for Health Professions is a magnet school; it requires students to follow state-mandated curriculum and graduation requirements as well as to take additional math and science courses in the field of health; this rigorous course plan has produced outstanding results, demonstrated in the students' 99-percent passing rate for the spring 2001 TAAS test; and

WHEREAS, With such an exemplary track record for educating the young people of the Rio Grande Valley, the High School for Health Professions is a paragon in the field of public education and is a source of pride to the citizens of South Texas and the Lone Star State; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives of the 78th Texas Legislature hereby congratulate the faculty, staff, and students of the High School for Health Professions in Mercedes for being named a National Title I Distinguished School by the U.S. Department of Education; and, be it further

RESOLVED, That an official copy of this resolution be prepared for prominent display at the High School for Health Professions as an expression of high regard by the Texas House of Representatives.
