5 WHEREAS, To qualify for this prestigious honor, a school must have more than 50 percent of its student population recognized as 6 low-income, have an "exemplary" accountability rating from the 7 state, and have an exemption rate on the Texas Assessment of 8 Academic Skills (TAAS) test that is below the state average for 9 special education and non-English-speaking students; other 10 11 important benchmarks include students' daily performance, TAAS 12 exam results, and the quality of the school's student-support staff; and 13

WHEREAS, The High School for Health Professions is a magnet school; it requires students to follow state-mandated curriculum and graduation requirements as well as to take additional math and science courses in the field of health; this rigorous course plan has produced outstanding results, demonstrated in the students' 99-percent passing rate for the spring 2001 TAAS test; and
