## RESOLUTION

1 WHEREAS, With the passing of Lucien Flournoy of Alice on 2 March 27, 2003, at the age of 83, the citizens of Texas lost a 3 respected business and civic leader and friend; and

WHEREAS, Widely known for his success as an independent oilman, Mr. Flournoy was a man just as well known for his philanthropy that especially benefited South Texas; and

7 WHEREAS, Born to life on a farm in Greenwood, Louisiana, soon 8 after his father's untimely passing, he was the youngest of five 9 children and the only son; his mother taught him to run the family's 10 240-acre farm, and taught him practical business skills that stood 11 him in good stead later as he began building his own successful 12 company; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Flournoy studied petroleum engineering at Louisiana State University until his junior year, when he took a letter of recommendation to well-known Corpus Christi oilman, Tom Graham, who gave him a start in the business as a roustabout and rig-builder; the enterprising young man continued to learn the basics as a roughneck and worked his way up, eventually joining Baroid, a leading company in the industry; and

20 WHEREAS, With the advent of World War II, Lucien Flournoy 21 volunteered as a member of the U.S. Army Air Corps, but a broken 22 ankle and rheumatoid arthritis led to an honorable discharge and a 23 return to Texas. In Alice, Mr. Flournoy met his soul mate, Maxine 24 Edmondson, an oilfield pilot and member of the Women's Air Force

Service Pilots who had recently been discharged from the U.S. Army Air Corps; married the next year, the couple enjoyed a 56-year union that was blessed with three daughters; and

4 WHEREAS, In 1947, Mr. Flournoy left his position as a 5 production engineer with Arkansas Fuel Oil Company in Alice and 6 started his own business with modest assets and a drilling rig he He was highly respected by employees and colleagues 7 designed. alike for operating a safe and efficient company and for his 8 9 personal concern for the individuals he employed, a loyalty that was warmly reciprocated. Flournoy Drilling Company was sold in 10 1997, though its founder continued to be involved with Flournoy 11 12 Production Company; and

WHEREAS, Known to many as "Mr. South Texas," Mr. Flournoy was 13 elected to two terms on the Alice City Council, served as mayor from 14 15 1967 to 1971, and was sought as an advisor by numerous elected officials from the courthouse to the White House. He consistently 16 17 used his influence for the betterment of his beloved South Texas in the areas of higher education, health care, juvenile justice, 18 highway infrastructure, and many other issues that enriched the 19 daily lives of the people in the region; and 20

21 WHEREAS, This benevolent man readily shared his good fortune; he was honored by many worthy organizations throughout his life, 22 A&M University--Kingsville, Corpus Christi 23 including Texas 24 Foundation, Youth City, Boys Scouts of America, Alice Chamber of 25 Commerce, National Petroleum Council, Texas Aeronautics Commission, Coastal Bend Kidney Foundation, Council Forum on 26 Alcohol and Drug Abuse, Christus Spohn, Kleberg & Caesar Kleberg 27

Wildlife Institute, South Texas Planned Giving Council of the Coastal Bend Community Foundation, the Women's Shelter of South Texas, American Cancer Society, and Joe B. Evins Jr. Youth Center; in addition, he was awarded an honorary doctorate from Texas A&M University--Kingsville; and

6 WHEREAS, In recognition of his many contributions to the 7 State of Texas, a flag will be flown over the Capitol on Mr. 8 Flournoy's birthday, June 13, 2003, in celebration of his life; and

9 WHEREAS, Although he will be deeply missed, Lucien Flournoy 10 will long be remembered for his kindness and generosity and for his 11 sincere dedication to his family, his employees, and his community; 12 now, therefore, be it

13 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives of the 78th Texas 14 Legislature hereby pay tribute to the life of Lucien Flournoy and 15 extend heartfelt sympathy to his wife, Maxine Flournoy; to his 16 children, Mary Anne Guthrie, Betty Lou Fields, and Helen Pope; to 17 his 11 grandchildren; and to all those who mourn the passing of this 18 beloved man; and, be it further

19 RESOLVED, That an official copy of this resolution be 20 prepared for his family and that when the Texas House of 21 Representatives adjourns this day, it do so in memory of Lucien 22 Flournoy.
