WHEREAS, Mr. Froh graduated from high school in San Marcos and earned a football scholarship to Rice University under legendary coach Jess Neely; often relegated to the role of benchwarmer, this enthusiastic athlete let his excitement get the better of him on one occasion when he took the liberty of substituting himself into a game; after one play, he was summarily pulled from the game and informed by Coach Neely that he would never again play a down of football at Rice University, though fortunately the incident did little to quench the irrepressible spirit that would endear him to many throughout his life; and

WHEREAS, Continuing his education in his hometown, Mr. Froh earned a business degree from Southwest Texas State University; far from restricting his interests to academics alone, he learned to dance in preparation for his first date with Mary Lou Hubbard, who would become his cherished wife on February 1, 1969; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Froh served as an administrator at the Austin State School and worked for the Texas Highway Department before joining the staff of the Employees Retirement System of Texas in 1982; he went on to excel in the posts of director of member benefits and director of public information during his 17-year tenure with ERS, and in 1992 he was recruited to begin the first
