5	SECTION 1. Section 801.361, Occupations Code, is amended to
6	read as follows:
7	Sec. 801.361. DISPOSAL OF ANIMAL REMAINS. (a) In this
8	section, "medical waste" includes animal waste, blood, gloves,
9	sleeves, newspapers, and plastic bags, but does not include sharps.
10	(b) A veterinarian may dispose of the remains of an animal
11	and medical waste associated with the animal by burial or burning
12	if:
13	(1) the burial or burning occurs on property owned by
14	the veterinarian; and
15	(2) at least one of the following requirements is met:
16	(A) a veterinarian-client-patient relationship
17	existed between the veterinarian, the owner or other caretaker of
18	the animal, and the animal before the animal's death;
19	(B) the veterinarian diagnosed, treated,
20	boarded, or otherwise cared for the animal before its death; or
21	(C) the veterinarian performed euthanasia or an
22	autopsy on the animal [the veterinarian does not charge for the
23	burning or burial].
24	(c) $\left[\frac{1}{2}\right]$ Notwithstanding any other law, the Texas $\left[\frac{1}{2}\right]$
