An 2 3 examination advisory committee shall: 4 (1) develop the examinations required by this chapter in accordance with board rules; and 5 (2) perform other tasks assigned by the board. 6 7 SECTION 30. (a) Not later than January 1, 2004, the Texas Board of Professional Land Surveying shall: 8 9 (1) adopt the rules required by Sections 1071.1515 and 10 1071.4035, Occupations Code, as added by this Act; and 11 (2) set the fees required by Section 1071.1526, Occupations Code, as added by this Act. 12 13 (b) Not later than September 1, 2005, the Texas Board of Professional Land Surveying shall: 14 15 (1)adopt the written guidelines required by Section 16 1071.404, Occupations Code, as amended by this Act; and the administrative penalty 17 (2) adopt schedule 18 required by Subsection (c), Section 1071.452, Occupations Code, as added by this Act. 19 SECTION 31. (a) In accordance with Subsection (c), Section 20 311.031, Government Code, which gives effect to a substantive 21 22 amendment enacted by the same legislature that codifies the amended statute, the text of Section 1071.258, Occupations Code, as set out 23 in Section 17 of this Act, gives effect to changes made by Chapter 24 25 594, Acts of the 77th Legislature, Regular Session, 2001. (b) To the extent of any conflict, this Act prevails over 26 27 another Act of the 78th Legislature, Regular Session, 2003,

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1 relating to nonsubstantive additions to and corrections in enacted 2 codes.

3 SECTION 32. (a) A rule adopted by the Texas Board of 4 Professional Land Surveying applicable to Chapter 1071, Occupations Code, that is in effect on the effective date of this 5 6 Act shall remain in effect as a rule of the Texas Board of 7 Professional Land Surveying until superseded by a new rule adopted by the Texas Board of Professional Land Surveying. 8

9 (b) The changes in law made by this Act by Section 1071.053, 10 Occupations Code, as amended by this Act, and Section 1071.059, 11 Occupations Code, as added by this Act, in the prohibitions on or qualifications of members of the Texas Board of Professional Land 12 Surveying do not affect the entitlement of a member serving on the 13 Texas Board of Professional Land Surveying immediately before 14 15 September 1, 2003, to continue to serve and function as a member of 16 the Texas Board of Professional Land Surveying for the remainder of 17 the member's term. Those changes in law apply only to a member 18 appointed on or after September 1, 2003.

The change in law made by this Act to Chapter 1071, 19 (c) Occupations Code, relating to the investigation of a complaint 20 applies only to a complaint filed with the Texas Board of 21 Professional Land Surveying on or after the effective date of this 22 Act. A complaint filed with the board before the effective date of 23 this Act is governed by the law as it existed immediately before 24 25 that date, and the former law is continued in effect for that 26 purpose.

(d) Of the four positions on the Texas Board of Professional

Land Surveying held by registered professional land surveyor 1 2 members, one of the positions is abolished on September 1, 2003. On 3 or before September 1, 2003, the four members who hold those positions shall determine by unanimous agreement or by lot which of 4 5 the four positions is abolished on September 1, 2003, and shall inform the president of the board of that determination. 6 7

SECTION 33. This Act takes effect September 1, 2003.
