S.B. No. 277

A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT

relating to the continuation and functions of the Texas Board of Professional Engineers and to the regulation of the practice of engineering.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

SECTION 1. Sections 1001.005 and 1001.051, Occupations Code, are amended to read as follows:

Sec. 1001.005. APPLICATION OF SUNSET ACT. The Texas Board of Professional Engineers is subject to Chapter 325, Government Code (Texas Sunset Act). Unless continued in existence as provided by that chapter, the board is abolished and this chapter expires September 1, 2015 ~~[2003]~~.

Sec. 1001.051. LIMITATION ON EXEMPTION. An exemption under this subchapter applies only to a person who does not offer ~~[is not directly or indirectly represented]~~ to the public to perform ~~[be legally qualified to engage in the practice of]~~ engineering services.

SECTION 2. Section 1001.057, Occupations Code, is amended to read as follows:

Sec. 1001.057. EMPLOYEE OF PRIVATE CORPORATION OR BUSINESS ENTITY ~~[OR AFFILIATE]~~. (a) This chapter shall not be construed to apply to the activities of a private corporation or other business entity, or the activities of the full-time employees or other personnel under the direct supervision and control of the business

entity, on or in connection with ~~[A regular full-time employee of a private business entity is exempt from the licensing requirements of this chapter if]:~~

(1) reasonable modifications to existing buildings, facilities, or other fixtures to real property not accessible to the general public and which are owned, leased, or otherwise occupied by the entity ~~[the employee performs services exclusively for the business entity or an affiliate of that entity]; or~~

(2) activities related only to the research, development, design, fabrication, production, assembly, integration, or service of products manufactured by the entity ~~[the employee's services:~~

~~[(A) are on or in connection with property:~~

~~[(i) owned or leased by the business entity or affiliate; or~~

~~[(ii) in which the business entity or affiliate has an interest, estate, or possessory right; or~~

~~[(B) affect exclusively the property, products, or interests of the business entity or affiliate; and~~

~~[(3) the employee does not have the final authority to approve, or the ultimate responsibility for, engineering designs, plans, or specifications relating to the property or products that are to be:~~

~~[(A) incorporated into a fixed work, system, or facility on the property of another; or~~

~~[(B) made available to the public].~~

(b) ~~[This exemption includes the use of a job title or~~

1 ~~personnel classification by the employee if the employee does not~~
2 ~~use:~~

3 ~~[(1) the title or classification in connection with an~~
4 ~~offer to the public to perform engineering services; and~~

5 ~~[(2) a name, title, or word that tends to convey the~~
6 ~~impression that a person not licensed under this chapter is~~
7 ~~offering to the public to perform engineering services.~~

8 ~~[(c)]~~ A person who claims an exemption under this section
9 and who is determined to have directly or indirectly represented
10 the person as legally qualified to engage in the practice of
11 engineering or who is determined to have violated Section 1001.301
12 may not claim an exemption until the 10th anniversary of the date
13 the person made that representation.

14 (c) This exemption does not prohibit:

15 (1) a licensed professional engineer who intends to
16 incorporate manufactured products into a fixed work, system, or
17 facility that is being designed by the licensee on public property
18 or the property of others from requiring the manufacturer to have
19 plans or specifications signed and sealed by a licensed
20 professional engineer; or

21 (2) the board from requiring, by rule, that certain
22 manufactured products delivered to or used by the public must be
23 designed and sealed by a licensed professional engineer, if
24 necessary to protect the public health, safety, and welfare.

25 (d) For purposes of this section, "products manufactured by
26 the entity" also includes computer software, firmware, hardware,
27 semiconductor devices, and the production, exploration, and

1 transportation of oil and gas and related products.

2 SECTION 3. Subsections (b) and (c), Section 1001.058,
3 Occupations Code, are amended to read as follows:

4 (b) ~~[This exemption includes the use of a job title or~~
5 ~~personnel classification by the employee if the employee does not~~
6 ~~use:~~

7 ~~[(1) the title or classification in connection with an~~
8 ~~offer to the public to perform engineering services; and~~

9 ~~[(2) a name, title, or word that tends to convey the~~
10 ~~impression that a person not licensed under this chapter is~~
11 ~~offering to the public to perform engineering services.~~

12 ~~[(c)]~~ A person who claims an exemption under this section
13 and who is determined to have directly or indirectly represented
14 the person as legally qualified to engage in the practice of
15 engineering or who is determined to have violated Section 1001.301
16 may not claim an exemption until the 10th anniversary of the date
17 the person made that representation.

18 SECTION 4. Subsection (b), Section 1001.101, Occupations
19 Code, is amended to read as follows:

20 (b) Appointments to the board shall be made without regard
21 to the race, color, disability ~~[creed]~~, sex, religion, age, or
22 national origin of the appointee.

23 SECTION 5. Subsection (a), Section 1001.102, Occupations
24 Code, is amended to read as follows:

25 (a) A person may not be ~~[is not eligible for appointment as]~~
26 a public member of the board if the person or the person's spouse:

27 (1) is registered, certified, or licensed by a ~~[an~~

1 ~~occupational~~] regulatory agency in the field of engineering;

2 (2) is employed by or participates in the management
3 of a ~~[an agency or]~~ business entity or other organization regulated
4 by or receiving money from the board ~~[related to the field of~~
5 ~~engineering]; [or]~~

6 (3) owns or controls, directly or indirectly, more
7 than a 10 percent ~~[has a financial]~~ interest ~~[other than as a~~
8 ~~consumer]~~ in a business entity or other organization regulated by
9 or receiving money from the board; or

10 (4) uses or receives a substantial amount of tangible
11 goods, services, or money from the board other than compensation or
12 reimbursement authorized by law for board membership, attendance,
13 or expenses ~~[related to the field of engineering].~~

14 SECTION 6. Section 1001.103, Occupations Code, is amended
15 to read as follows:

16 Sec. 1001.103. MEMBERSHIP AND EMPLOYEE RESTRICTIONS.

17 (a) In this section, "Texas trade association" means a cooperative
18 and voluntarily joined statewide association of business or
19 professional competitors in this state designed to assist its
20 members and its industry or profession in dealing with mutual
21 business or professional problems and in promoting their common
22 interest.

23 (a-1) A person may not be a [A] member [or employee] of the
24 board and may not be a board employee employed in a "bona fide
25 executive, administrative, or professional capacity," as that
26 phrase is used for purposes of establishing an exemption to the
27 overtime provisions of the federal Fair Labor Standards Act of 1938

1 (29 U.S.C. Section 201 et seq.), and its subsequent amendments, if:

2 (1) the person is an officer, employee, or paid
3 consultant of a Texas trade association in the field of engineering
4 ~~[industry]~~; or

5 (2) the person's spouse ~~[related within the second~~
6 ~~degree by affinity or consanguinity, as determined under Chapter~~
7 ~~573, Government Code, to a person who]~~ is an officer, manager
8 ~~[employee]~~, or paid consultant of a Texas trade association in the
9 field of engineering ~~[industry]~~.

10 (b) A person may not be ~~[serve as]~~ a member of the board or
11 act as the general counsel to the board if the person is required to
12 register as a lobbyist under Chapter 305, Government Code, because
13 of the person's activities for compensation on behalf of a
14 profession related to the operation of the board.

15 SECTION 7. Section 1001.106, Occupations Code, is amended
16 by amending Subsection (a) and adding Subsection (c) to read as
17 follows:

18 (a) It is a ground for removal from the board that a member:

19 (1) does not have at the time of taking office
20 ~~[appointment]~~ the qualifications required by Sections 1001.101 and
21 ~~[Section]~~ 1001.102;

22 (2) does not maintain during service on the board the
23 qualifications required by Sections 1001.101 and ~~[Section]~~
24 1001.102;

25 (3) is ineligible for membership under Section
26 1001.102 or ~~[violates a prohibition established by Section]~~
27 1001.103; ~~[or]~~

1 (4) cannot, because of illness or disability,
2 discharge the member's duties for a substantial part of the member's
3 term; or

4 (5) is absent from more than half of the regularly
5 scheduled board meetings that the member is eligible to attend
6 during [held-in] a calendar year without an excuse approved by a
7 majority vote of the board[~~, excluding meetings held while the~~
8 person was not a member].

9 (c) If the executive director has knowledge that a potential
10 ground for removal exists, the executive director shall notify the
11 presiding officer of the board of the potential ground. The
12 presiding officer shall then notify the governor and the attorney
13 general that a potential ground for removal exists. If the
14 potential ground for removal involves the presiding officer, the
15 executive director shall notify the next highest ranking officer of
16 the board, who shall then notify the governor and the attorney
17 general that a potential ground for removal exists.

18 SECTION 8. Section 1001.108, Occupations Code, is amended
19 to read as follows:

20 Sec. 1001.108. OFFICERS. The governor shall designate a
21 member of the board as the presiding officer of the board to serve
22 in that capacity at the will of the governor. The board shall elect
23 annually from its members [~~a presiding officer,~~] an assistant
24 presiding officer[~~7~~] and a secretary.

25 SECTION 9. Subchapter C, Chapter 1001, Occupations Code, is
26 amended by adding Section 1001.112 to read as follows:

27 Sec. 1001.112. TRAINING. (a) A person who is appointed to

1 and qualifies for office as a member of the board may not vote,
2 deliberate, or be counted as a member in attendance at a meeting of
3 the board until the person completes a training program that
4 complies with this section.

5 (b) The training program must provide the person with
6 information regarding:

7 (1) this chapter;
8 (2) the programs operated by the board;
9 (3) the role and functions of the board;
10 (4) the rules of the board, with an emphasis on the
11 rules that relate to disciplinary and investigatory authority;
12 (5) the current budget for the board;
13 (6) the results of the most recent formal audit of the
14 board;

15 (7) the requirements of:
16 (A) the open meetings law, Chapter 551,
17 Government Code;
18 (B) the public information law, Chapter 552,
19 Government Code;
20 (C) the administrative procedure law, Chapter
21 2001, Government Code; and

22 (D) other laws relating to public officials,
23 including conflict-of-interest laws; and
24 (8) any applicable ethics policies adopted by the
25 board or the Texas Ethics Commission.

26 (c) A person appointed to the board is entitled to
27 reimbursement, as provided by the General Appropriations Act, for

1 the travel expenses incurred in attending the training program
2 regardless of whether the attendance at the program occurs before
3 or after the person qualifies for office.

4 SECTION 10. Subchapter D, Chapter 1001, Occupations Code,
5 is amended by adding Sections 1001.153 through 1001.156 to read as
6 follows:

7 Sec. 1001.153. DIVISION OF RESPONSIBILITIES. The board
8 shall develop and implement policies that clearly separate the
9 policy-making responsibilities of the board and the management
10 responsibilities of the executive director and the staff of the
11 board.

12 Sec. 1001.154. QUALIFICATIONS AND STANDARDS OF CONDUCT
13 INFORMATION. The executive director or the executive director's
14 designee shall provide to members of the board and to board
15 employees, as often as necessary, information regarding the
16 requirements for office or employment under this chapter, including
17 information regarding a person's responsibilities under applicable
18 laws relating to standards of conduct for state officers or
19 employees.

20 Sec. 1001.155. EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY POLICY;
21 REPORT. (a) The executive director or the executive director's
22 designee shall prepare and maintain a written policy statement that
23 implements a program of equal employment opportunity to ensure that
24 all personnel decisions are made without regard to race, color,
25 disability, sex, religion, age, or national origin.

26 (b) The policy statement must include:

27 (1) personnel policies, including policies relating

to recruitment, evaluation, selection, training, and promotion of personnel, that show the intent of the board to avoid the unlawful employment practices described by Chapter 21, Labor Code; and

(2) an analysis of the extent to which the composition of the board's personnel is in accordance with state and federal law and a description of reasonable methods to achieve compliance with state and federal law.

(c) The policy statement must:

(1) be updated annually;

(2) be reviewed by the Commission on Human Rights for compliance with Subsection (b)(1); and

(3) be filed with the governor's office.

Sec. 1001.156. INFORMATION ON STATE EMPLOYEE INCENTIVE PROGRAM. The executive director or the executive director's designee shall provide to board employees information and training on the benefits and methods of participation in the state employee incentive program under Subchapter B, Chapter 2108, Government Code.

SECTION 11. Section 1001.203, Occupations Code, is amended to read as follows:

Sec. 1001.203. RULES RESTRICTING ADVERTISING OR COMPETITIVE BIDDING. (a) The board by rule shall prescribe standards for compliance with Subchapter A, Chapter 2254, Government Code ~~[may restrict competitive bidding]~~.

(b) Except as provided by Subsection (a), the ~~[The]~~ board may not adopt rules ~~[a rule]~~ restricting advertising or competitive bidding by a license holder ~~[person licensed under this chapter]~~

except to prohibit false, misleading, or deceptive practices ~~by the person~~.

(c) In its rules to prohibit false, misleading, or deceptive practices, the [The] board may not include ~~[in its rules to prohibit false, misleading, or deceptive practices]~~ a rule that:

(1) restricts the ~~[person's]~~ use of any medium for advertising;

(2) restricts the use of a license holder's ~~[person's]~~ personal appearance or ~~[use of the person's]~~ voice in an advertisement;

(3) relates to the size or duration of an advertisement by the license holder ~~[person]~~; or

(4) restricts the license holder's ~~[person's]~~ advertisement under a trade name.

SECTION 12. Subchapter E, Chapter 1001, Occupations Code, is amended by adding Section 1001.2035 to read as follows:

Sec. 1001.2035. RULES ON CONSEQUENCES OF CRIMINAL CONVICTION. The board shall adopt rules and guidelines as necessary to comply with Chapter 53.

SECTION 13. Subsection (a), Section 1001.204, Occupations Code, is amended to read as follows:

(a) The board shall establish the following ~~[reasonable and necessary]~~ fees in amounts reasonable and necessary to cover the costs of administering ~~[for the administration of]~~ this chapter ~~[in amounts not to exceed]~~:

(1) license fee; ~~[.....\$50]~~

(2) annual renewal fee; ~~[.....\$75]~~

- (3) reciprocal license fee; [~~.....\$50~~]
- (4) duplicate license fee; [~~.....\$5~~]
- (5) engineer-in-training certificate fee; [~~.....\$15~~]
- (6) roster of engineers fee; [~~.....\$10~~]
- (7) examination fee; and [~~.....\$200~~]
- (8) registration fee for engineering firm. [~~.....\$100~~]

SECTION 14. Section 1001.210, Occupations Code, is amended to read as follows:

Sec. 1001.210. CONTINUING EDUCATION PROGRAMS. (a) The board shall [~~may~~] recognize, prepare, or administer continuing education programs for its license holders. A license holder must participate in the programs to the extent required by the board to keep the person's license.

(b) The board may not require a license holder to obtain more than 15 hours of continuing education annually. The board shall permit a license holder to certify at the time the license is renewed that the license holder has complied with the board's continuing education requirements.

(c) The board shall permit a license holder to receive continuing education credit for educational, technical, ethical, or professional management activities related to the practice of engineering, including:

(1) successfully completing or auditing a course sponsored by an institution of higher education;

(2) successfully completing a course certified by a professional or trade organization;

(3) attending a seminar, tutorial, short course,

1 correspondence course, videotaped course, or televised course;

2 (4) participating in an in-house course sponsored by a
3 corporation or other business entity;

4 (5) teaching a course described by Subdivisions
5 (1)-(4);

6 (6) publishing an article, paper, or book on the
7 practice of engineering;

8 (7) making or attending a presentation at a meeting of
9 a technical or engineering management society or organization or
10 writing a paper presented at such a meeting;

11 (8) participating in the activities of a professional
12 society or association, including serving on a committee of the
13 organization; and

14 (9) engaging in self-directed study.

15 (d) A license holder may not receive more than five
16 continuing education credit hours annually for engaging in
17 self-directed study ~~[persons regulated by the board under this~~
18 ~~chapter. Participation in the programs is voluntary]~~.

19 SECTION 15. Subchapter E, Chapter 1001, Occupations Code,
20 is amended by adding Sections 1001.214, 1001.215, and 1001.216 to
21 read as follows:

22 Sec. 1001.214. TECHNOLOGY POLICY. The board shall develop
23 and implement a policy requiring the executive director and board
24 employees to research and propose appropriate technological
25 solutions to improve the board's ability to perform its functions.
26 The technological solutions must:

27 (1) ensure that the public is able to find information

about the board on the Internet;

(2) ensure that persons who want to use the board's services are able to:

(A) interact with the board through the Internet;
and

(B) access any service that can be provided effectively through the Internet; and

(3) be cost-effective and developed through the board's planning processes.

Sec. 1001.215. NEGOTIATED RULEMAKING AND ALTERNATIVE DISPUTE RESOLUTION POLICY. (a) The board shall develop and implement a policy to encourage the use of:

(1) negotiated rulemaking procedures under Chapter 2008, Government Code, for the adoption of board rules; and

(2) appropriate alternative dispute resolution procedures under Chapter 2009, Government Code, to assist in the resolution of internal and external disputes under the board's jurisdiction.

(b) The board's procedures relating to alternative dispute resolution must conform, to the extent possible, to any model guidelines issued by the State Office of Administrative Hearings for the use of alternative dispute resolution by state agencies.

(c) The board shall designate a trained person to:

(1) coordinate the implementation of the policy adopted under Subsection (a);

(2) serve as a resource for any training needed to implement the procedures for negotiated rulemaking or alternative

1 dispute resolution; and

2 (3) collect data concerning the effectiveness of those
3 procedures, as implemented by the board.

4 Sec. 1001.216. JOINT ADVISORY COMMITTEE ON THE PRACTICE OF
5 ENGINEERING AND ARCHITECTURE. (a) The Joint Advisory Committee on
6 the Practice of Engineering and Architecture is an advisory
7 committee to the board and to the Texas Board of Architectural
8 Examiners. The advisory committee consists of:

9 (1) three members of the board appointed by the board;
10 and

11 (2) three members of the Texas Board of Architectural
12 Examiners appointed by that board.

13 (b) Members of the advisory committee serve staggered
14 six-year terms with the terms of one member appointed by the board
15 and one member appointed by the Texas Board of Architectural
16 Examiners expiring each odd-numbered year.

17 (c) The advisory committee shall meet at least twice a year.

18 (d) The advisory committee shall work to resolve issues that
19 result from the overlap between activities that constitute the
20 practice of engineering and those that constitute the practice of
21 architecture. The advisory committee shall assist each agency in
22 protecting the public rather than advancing the interests of either
23 agency or the profession it regulates.

24 (e) The advisory committee shall issue advisory opinions to
25 the board and to the Texas Board of Architectural Examiners on
26 matters relating to the practice of engineering and the practice of
27 architecture, including:

1 (1) opinions on whether certain activities constitute
2 the practice of engineering or the practice of architecture;

3 (2) specific disciplinary proceedings initiated by
4 either agency; and

5 (3) the need for persons working on particular
6 projects to be licensed by the board or registered by the Texas
7 Board of Architectural Examiners.

8 (f) If the advisory committee issues an advisory opinion to
9 the board or the Texas Board of Architectural Examiners on a matter,
10 that agency shall notify the committee of the final action taken
11 with regard to the matter. The advisory committee shall consider
12 the action taken by the agency on the matter in any advisory opinion
13 subsequently issued by the committee on a related matter.

14 (g) The board and the Texas Board of Architectural Examiners
15 shall enter into a memorandum of understanding regarding the
16 advisory committee that includes the composition and purpose of the
17 committee.

18 SECTION 16. Section 1001.251, Occupations Code, is amended
19 by adding Subsection (c) to read as follows:

20 (c) The board shall maintain on the board's Internet
21 website:

22 (1) information regarding the procedure for filing a
23 complaint with the board; and

24 (2) a form that a person may use to file a complaint
25 with the board.

26 SECTION 17. Sections 1001.252 and 1001.253, Occupations
27 Code, are amended to read as follows:

1 Sec. 1001.252. GENERAL RULES REGARDING COMPLAINT
2 INVESTIGATION AND DISPOSITION [~~COMPLAINTS~~]. (a) The board shall
3 adopt rules that permit the board to receive and investigate a
4 confidential complaint against a license holder or other person who
5 may have violated this chapter. The board shall maintain the
6 confidentiality of the complaint during the investigation.

7 (b) The board by rule shall specify:

8 (1) the manner by which a person may contact the board
9 for assistance in filing a complaint;

10 (2) the place at which a complaint must be filed;

11 (3) the proper form of a complaint; and

12 (4) the information that must be included in a
13 complaint.

14 (c) The board's procedures must permit a member of the
15 public who desires to file a complaint to:

16 (1) speak to an investigator on the staff of the board
17 if the person desires to do so; or

18 (2) easily and conveniently access the board's
19 complaint process without being required to speak to an
20 investigator on the staff of the board if the person does not desire
21 to speak to an investigator.

22 (d) The board shall consider any written grievance against a
23 license holder or other person filed with the board as a complaint.

24 (e) A complaint must include information sufficient for the
25 board to determine whether it has the authority to resolve the
26 complaint. A complaint that contains sufficient information for
27 the board to commence an investigation is not required to include

1 all of the information necessary for the board to determine the
2 validity of the complaint.

3 (f) On receipt of a complaint, the board shall determine
4 whether the board has the authority to resolve the complaint. If
5 the board does not have the authority to resolve the complaint, the
6 board shall dismiss the complaint. If the board has the authority
7 to resolve the complaint, the board shall initiate a disciplinary
8 proceeding against the person who is the subject of the complaint.

9 (g) The board by rule shall prescribe a method for
10 prioritizing complaints for purposes of complaint investigation.
11 In establishing priorities:

12 (1) a complaint that alleges an action that could
13 potentially harm the public takes precedence over a complaint that
14 does not allege an action that could potentially harm the public;
15 and

16 (2) with regard to complaints that do not allege an
17 action that could potentially harm the public, a complaint filed by
18 a member of the public takes precedence over a complaint filed by
19 the staff of the board.

20 (h) The board's staff is responsible for conducting all
21 phases of complaint investigation, including gathering evidence
22 necessary to determine the validity of the complaint.

23 (i) The board may employ or contract with advisors,
24 consultants, engineers, or other persons to provide technical
25 assistance in investigations and disciplinary proceedings. Except
26 for an action involving fraud, conspiracy, or malice, a person
27 whose services are obtained by the board under this subsection is

1 immune from civil liability and may not be subjected to a suit for
2 damages for any investigation, report, recommendation, statement,
3 evaluation, finding made, or other action taken in the course of
4 performing the person's official duties.

5 (j) The board's staff shall regularly report to the board on
6 each complaint dismissed by board staff, including:

7 (1) the name of the complainant;

8 (2) the name of the person who is the subject of the
9 complaint;

10 (3) the basis of the complaint; and

11 (4) the reason for the dismissal of the complaint.

12 Sec. 1001.253. COMPLAINT INFORMATION. (a) The board
13 shall:

14 (1) assign a number to each complaint filed with the
15 board; and

16 (2) ensure that each phase of the processing of a
17 complaint is appropriately documented.

18 (b) The board shall maintain a ~~[keep an information]~~ file on
19 ~~[about]~~ each written complaint ~~[relating to a license holder]~~ filed
20 with the board. The file must include:

21 (1) the name of the person who filed the complaint;

22 (2) the date the complaint is received by the board;

23 (3) the subject matter of the complaint;

24 (4) the name of each person contacted in relation to
25 the complaint;

26 (5) a summary of the results of the review or
27 investigation of the complaint; and

1 (6) an explanation of the reason the file was closed,
2 if the board closed the file without taking action other than to
3 investigate the complaint.

4 (c) The board shall provide to the person filing the
5 complaint and to each person who is a subject of the complaint a
6 copy of the board's policies and procedures relating to complaint
7 investigation and resolution.

8 (d) The [(b) If a written complaint relating to a license
9 holder is filed with the board, the] board, at least quarterly and
10 until final disposition of the complaint, shall notify the parties
11 to the complaint of the status of the complaint unless the notice
12 would jeopardize an undercover investigation.

13 SECTION 18. Subchapter F, Chapter 1001, Occupations Code,
14 is amended by adding Sections 1001.254 and 1001.255 to read as
15 follows:

16 Sec. 1001.254. STATISTICAL ANALYSIS OF COMPLAINTS.

17 (a) The board shall develop and maintain a complaint tracking
18 system to monitor the processing of complaints filed with the
19 board.

20 (b) The board shall include with the board's annual
21 financial report under Section 2101.011, Government Code, a
22 statistical analysis of the complaints filed with the board during
23 the preceding year, including:

24 (1) the number of complaints filed;

25 (2) a categorization of complaints filed according to
26 the basis of the complaint and the number of complaints in each
27 category;

1 (3) the number of complaints filed by board staff;

18 staff, and the average length of time that the unresolved
19 complaints have been on file.

20 Sec. 1001.255. PUBLIC PARTICIPATION. The board shall
21 develop and implement policies that provide the public with a
22 reasonable opportunity to appear before the board and to speak on
23 any issue under the jurisdiction of the board.

24 SECTION 19. Section 1001.301, Occupations Code, is amended
25 by amending Subsections (b) and (c) and adding Subsections (f) and
26 (g) to read as follows:

27 (b) Except as provided by Subsection (f), a [A] person may

not, unless the person holds a license issued under this chapter, directly or indirectly use or cause to be used as a professional, business, or commercial identification, title, name, representation, claim, asset, or means of advantage or benefit any of, or a variation or abbreviation of, the following terms:

- (1) "engineer";
- (2) "professional engineer";
- (3) "licensed engineer";
- (4) "registered engineer";
- (5) "registered professional engineer";
- (6) "licensed professional engineer"; or
- (7) "engineered."

(c) Except as provided by Subsection (f), a [A] person may not directly or indirectly use or cause to be used an abbreviation, word, symbol, slogan, or sign that tends or is likely to create an impression with the public that the person is qualified or authorized to engage in the practice of engineering unless the person holds a license and is practicing under this chapter.

(f) Notwithstanding the other provisions of this chapter, a regular employee of a business entity who is engaged in engineering activities but is exempt from the licensing requirements of this chapter under Sections 1001.057 or 1001.058 is not prohibited from using the term "engineer" on a business card, cover letter, or other form of correspondence that is made available to the public if the person does not:

- (1) offer to the public to perform engineering services; or

1 (2) use the title in any context outside the scope of
2 the exemption in a manner that represents an ability or willingness
3 to perform engineering services or make an engineering judgment
4 requiring a licensed professional engineer.

5 (g) Subsection (f) does not authorize a person to use a term
6 listed in Subsections (b)(2)-(6) or a variation or abbreviation of
7 one of those terms.

7 board by rule may adopt standards and procedures for issuing a
8 temporary or provisional license under this chapter.

9 (b) The board may issue a provisional license to an
10 applicant currently licensed in another jurisdiction who seeks a
11 license in this state and who:

12 (1) has been licensed in good standing as an engineer
13 for at least two years in another jurisdiction, including a foreign
14 country, that has licensing requirements substantially equivalent
15 to the requirements of this chapter;

17 recognized by the board relating to the practice of engineering;

19 (3) is sponsored by a person licensed by the board

22 (b) The amount of restitution ordered as provided in an
23 agreement resulting from an informal settlement conference may not
24 exceed the amount the consumer paid to the person for a service
25 regulated by this chapter. The board may not require payment of
26 other damages or estimate harm in a restitution order.

27 Sec. 1001.4527. RECUSAL OF BOARD MEMBER. (a) A board

1 member who participated in the investigation of a complaint or in
2 informal settlement negotiations regarding the complaint:

3 (1) may not participate in the discussion of or vote on
4 the matter at a board meeting related to the complaint; and

5 (2) shall state at the meeting why the member is

17 (b) The changes in law made by Sections 1001.102 and
18 1001.103, Occupations Code, as amended by this Act, and Section
19 1001.112, Occupations Code, as added by this Act, in the
20 prohibitions on or qualifications of members of the Texas Board of
21 Professional Engineers do not affect the entitlement of a member
22 serving on the Texas Board of Professional Engineers immediately
23 before September 1, 2003, to continue to serve and function as a
24 member of the Texas Board of Professional Engineers for the
25 remainder of the member's term. Those changes in law apply only to
26 a member appointed on or after September 1, 2003.

27 (c) The change in law made by Section 1001.108, Occupations

1 Code, as amended by this Act, does not affect the entitlement of a
2 person who was serving as presiding officer of the Texas Board of
3 Professional Engineers immediately before September 1, 2003, to
4 continue to serve and function in that capacity for the remainder of
5 the person's term as presiding officer. That change in law applies
6 only to the designation of a presiding officer of the board after
7 that person's term as presiding officer expires.

8 (d) The changes in law made by this Act to Chapter 1001,
9 Occupations Code, relating to the investigation of a complaint
10 apply only to a complaint filed with the Texas Board of Professional
11 Engineers on or after the effective date of this Act. A complaint
12 filed with the board before the effective date of this Act is
13 governed by the law as it existed immediately before that date, and
14 the former law is continued in effect for that purpose.
