S.B. No. 1057

A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT

relating to the determination of incompetency in criminal and juvenile justice cases.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

SECTION 1. Title 1, Code of Criminal Procedure, is amended by adding Chapter 46B to read as follows:

CHAPTER 46B. INCOMPETENCY TO STAND TRIAL

SUBCHAPTER A. GENERAL PROVISIONS

Art. 46B.001. DEFINITIONS. In this chapter:

(1) "Department" means the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation.

(2) "Inpatient mental health facility" has the meaning assigned by Section 571.003, Health and Safety Code.

(3) "Local mental health authority" has the meaning assigned by Section 571.003, Health and Safety Code.

(4) "Local mental retardation authority" has the meaning assigned by Section 531.002, Health and Safety Code.

(5) "Mental health facility" has the meaning assigned by Section 571.003, Health and Safety Code.

(6) "Mental illness" has the meaning assigned by Section 571.003, Health and Safety Code.

(7) "Mental retardation" has the meaning assigned by Section 591.003, Health and Safety Code.

(8) "Residential care facility" has the meaning

1 assigned by Section 591.003, Health and Safety Code.

2 Art. 46B.002. APPLICABILITY. This chapter applies to a
3 defendant charged with a felony or with a misdemeanor punishable by
4 confinement.

5 Art. 46B.003. INCOMPETENCY; PRESUMPTIONS. (a) A person is
6 incompetent to stand trial if the person does not have:

7 (1) sufficient present ability to consult with the
8 person's lawyer with a reasonable degree of rational understanding;
9 or

10 (2) a rational as well as factual understanding of the
11 proceedings against the person.

12 (b) A defendant is presumed competent to stand trial and
13 shall be found competent to stand trial unless proved incompetent
14 by a preponderance of the evidence.

15 Art. 46B.004. RAISING ISSUE OF INCOMPETENCY TO STAND TRIAL.
16 (a) Either party may suggest by motion, or the trial court may
17 suggest on its own motion, that the defendant may be incompetent to
18 stand trial. A motion suggesting that the defendant may be
19 incompetent to stand trial may be supported by affidavits setting
20 out the facts on which the suggestion is made.

21 (b) If evidence suggesting the defendant may be incompetent
22 to stand trial comes to the attention of the court, the court on its
23 own motion shall suggest that the defendant may be incompetent to
24 stand trial.

25 (c) On suggestion that the defendant may be incompetent to
26 stand trial, the court shall determine by informal inquiry whether
27 there is some evidence from any source that would support a finding

1 that the defendant may be incompetent to stand trial.

2 (d) If the court determines there is evidence to support a
3 finding of incompetency, the court, except as provided by Article
4 46B.005(d), shall stay all other proceedings in the case.

5 Art. 46B.005. DETERMINING INCOMPETENCY TO STAND TRIAL.

6 (a) If after an informal inquiry the court determines that
7 evidence exists to support a finding of incompetency, the court
8 shall order an examination under Subchapter B to determine whether
9 the defendant is incompetent to stand trial.

10 (b) Except as provided by Subsection (c), the court shall
11 hold a hearing under Subchapter C before determining whether the
12 defendant is incompetent to stand trial.

13 (c) The court is not required to hold a hearing if:

14 (1) neither party requests a jury trial on the issue of
15 incompetency;

16 (2) neither party opposes a finding of incompetency;
17 and

18 (3) the court does not, on its own motion, determine
19 that a hearing is necessary to determine incompetency.

20 (d) If the issue of the defendant's incompetency to stand
21 trial is raised after the trial begins, the court may determine the
22 issue at any time before sentencing. If the determination is
23 delayed until after the return of a verdict, the court shall make
24 the determination as soon as reasonably possible after the return.
25 If a verdict of not guilty is returned, the court may not determine
26 the issue of incompetency.

27 Art. 46B.006. APPOINTMENT OF AND REPRESENTATION BY COUNSEL.

1 (a) A defendant is entitled to representation by counsel before
2 any court-ordered competency evaluation and during any proceeding
3 at which it is suggested that the defendant may be incompetent to
4 stand trial.

5 (b) If the defendant is indigent and the court has not
6 appointed counsel to represent the defendant, the court shall
7 appoint counsel as necessary to comply with Subsection (a).

8 Art. 46B.007. ADMISSIBILITY OF STATEMENTS AND CERTAIN OTHER
9 EVIDENCE. A statement made by a defendant during an examination or
10 hearing on the defendant's incompetency, the testimony of an expert
11 based on that statement, and evidence obtained as a result of that
12 statement may not be admitted in evidence against the defendant in
13 any criminal proceeding, other than at:

14 (1) a hearing on the defendant's incompetency; or

15 (2) any proceeding at which the defendant first
16 introduces into evidence a statement, testimony, or evidence
17 described by this section.

18 Art. 46B.008. RULES OF EVIDENCE. Notwithstanding Rule 101,
19 Texas Rules of Evidence, the Texas Rules of Evidence apply to a
20 hearing under this chapter whether the hearing is before a jury or
21 before the court.

22 Art. 46B.009. TIME CREDITS. A court sentencing a person
23 convicted of a criminal offense shall credit to the term of the
24 person's sentence the time the person is confined in a mental health
25 facility or residential care facility pending trial.

26 Art. 46B.010. MANDATORY DISMISSAL OF MISDEMEANOR CHARGES.
27 If a court commits a defendant who is charged with a misdemeanor

1 punishable by confinement and the defendant is not tried before the
2 second anniversary of the date on which the order of commitment was
3 entered, the court on the motion of the attorney representing the
4 state shall dismiss the charge.

5 Art. 46B.011. APPEALS. Neither the state nor the defendant
6 is entitled to make an interlocutory appeal relating to a
7 determination of incompetency under Article 46B.005.

8 Art. 46B.012. COMPLIANCE WITH CHAPTER. The failure of a
9 person to comply with this chapter does not provide a defendant with
10 a right to dismissal of charges.

11 SUBCHAPTER B. EXAMINATION

12 Art. 46B.021. APPOINTMENT OF EXPERTS. (a) On a suggestion
13 that the defendant may be incompetent to stand trial, the court may
14 appoint one or more disinterested experts to:

15 (1) examine the defendant and report to the court on
16 the competency or incompetency of the defendant; and

17 (2) testify as to the issue of competency or
18 incompetency of the defendant at any trial or hearing involving
19 that issue.

20 (b) On a determination that evidence exists to support a
21 finding of incompetency to stand trial, the court shall appoint one
22 or more experts to perform the duties described by Subsection (a).

23 (c) An expert involved in the treatment of the defendant may
24 not be appointed to examine the defendant under this article.

25 (d) The movant or other party as directed by the court shall
26 provide to experts appointed under this article information
27 relevant to a determination of the defendant's competency,

1 including copies of the indictment or information, any supporting
2 documents used to establish probable cause in the case, and
3 previous mental health evaluation and treatment records.

4 (e) The court may appoint as experts under this chapter
5 qualified psychiatrists or psychologists employed by the local
6 mental health authority or local mental retardation authority. The
7 local mental health authority or local mental retardation authority
8 is entitled to compensation and reimbursement as provided by
9 Article 46B.027.

10 (f) If a defendant wishes to be examined by an expert of the
11 defendant's own choice, the court on timely request shall provide
12 the expert with reasonable opportunity to examine the defendant.

13 Art. 46B.022. EXPERTS: QUALIFICATIONS. (a) To qualify
14 for appointment under this subchapter as an expert, a psychiatrist
15 or psychologist must:

16 (1) as appropriate, be a physician licensed in this
17 state or be a psychologist licensed in this state who has a doctoral
18 degree in psychology; and

19 (2) have the following certification or experience or
20 training:

21 (A) as appropriate, certification by:

22 (i) the American Board of Psychiatry and
23 Neurology with added or special qualifications in forensic
24 psychiatry; or

25 (ii) the American Board of Professional
26 Psychology in forensic psychology; or

27 (B) experience or training consisting of:

1 (i) at least 24 hours of specialized
2 forensic training relating to incompetency or insanity
3 evaluations;

4 (ii) for an appointment made before January
5 1, 2005, at least five years of experience before January 1, 2004,
6 in performing criminal forensic evaluations for courts; or

7 (iii) for an appointment made on or after
8 January 1, 2005, at least five years of experience before January 1,
9 2004, in performing criminal forensic evaluations for courts and
10 eight or more hours of continuing education relating to forensic
11 evaluations, completed in the 12 months preceding the appointment
12 and documented with the court.

13 (b) In addition to meeting qualifications required by
14 Subsection (a), to be appointed as an expert a psychiatrist or
15 psychologist must have completed six hours of required continuing
16 education in courses in forensic psychiatry or psychology, as
17 appropriate, in either of the reporting periods in the 24 months
18 preceding the appointment.

19 (c) A court may appoint as an expert a psychiatrist or
20 psychologist who does not meet the requirements of Subsections (a)
21 and (b) only if exigent circumstances require the court to base the
22 appointment on professional training or experience of the expert
23 that directly provides the expert with a specialized expertise to
24 examine the defendant that would not ordinarily be possessed by a
25 psychiatrist or psychologist who meets the requirements of
26 Subsections (a) and (b).

27 Art. 46B.023. CUSTODY STATUS. During an examination under

1 this subchapter, except as otherwise ordered by the court, the
2 defendant shall be maintained under the same custody or status as
3 the defendant was maintained under immediately before the
4 examination began.

5 Art. 46B.024. FACTORS CONSIDERED IN EXAMINATION. During an
6 examination under this subchapter and in any report based on that
7 examination, an expert shall consider, in addition to other issues
8 determined relevant by the expert, the following:

9 (1) the capacity of the defendant during criminal
10 proceedings to:

11 (A) rationally understand the charges against
12 the defendant and the potential consequences of the pending
13 criminal proceedings;

14 (B) disclose to counsel pertinent facts, events,
15 and states of mind;

16 (C) engage in a reasoned choice of legal
17 strategies and options;

18 (D) understand the adversarial nature of
19 criminal proceedings;

20 (E) exhibit appropriate courtroom behavior; and

21 (F) testify;

22 (2) whether the defendant has a diagnosable mental
23 illness or is a person with mental retardation;

24 (3) the impact of the mental illness or mental
25 retardation, if existent, on the defendant's capacity to engage
26 with counsel in a reasonable and rational manner; and

27 (4) if the defendant is taking psychoactive or other

1 medication:

2 (A) whether the medication is necessary to
3 maintain the defendant's competency; and

4 (B) the effect, if any, of the medication on the
5 defendant's appearance, demeanor, or ability to participate in the
6 proceedings.

7 Art. 46B.025. EXPERT'S REPORT. (a) An expert's report to
8 the court must state an opinion on a defendant's competency or
9 incompetency to stand trial or explain why the expert is unable to
10 state such an opinion and must also:

11 (1) identify and address specific issues referred to
12 the expert for evaluation;

13 (2) document that the expert explained to the
14 defendant the purpose of the evaluation, the persons to whom a
15 report on the evaluation is provided, and the limits on rules of
16 confidentiality applying to the relationship between the expert and
17 the defendant;

18 (3) in general terms, describe procedures,
19 techniques, and tests used in the examination and the purpose of
20 each procedure, technique, or test; and

21 (4) state the expert's clinical observations,
22 findings, and opinions on each specific issue referred to the
23 expert by the court, and state specifically any issues on which the
24 expert could not provide an opinion.

25 (b) If in the opinion of an expert appointed under Article
26 46B.021 the defendant is incompetent to proceed, the expert shall
27 state in the report:

1 (1) the exact nature of the deficits resulting from
2 the defendant's mental illness or mental retardation, if any, that
3 impact the factors listed in Article 46B.024, contributing to the
4 defendant's incompetency; and

5 (2) prospective treatment options, if any,
6 appropriate for the defendant.

7 (c) An expert's report may not state the expert's opinion on
8 the defendant's sanity at the time of the alleged offense, if in the
9 opinion of the expert the defendant is incompetent to proceed.

10 Art. 46B.026. REPORT DEADLINE. (a) Except as provided by
11 Subsection (b), an expert examining the defendant shall provide the
12 report on the defendant's competency or incompetency to stand trial
13 to the court, the attorney representing the state, and the attorney
14 representing the defendant not later than the 30th day after the
15 date on which the expert was ordered to examine the defendant and
16 prepare the report.

17 (b) For good cause shown, the court may permit an expert to
18 complete the examination and report and provide the report to the
19 court and attorneys at a date later than the date required by
20 Subsection (a).

21 Art. 46B.027. COMPENSATION OF EXPERTS; REIMBURSEMENT OF
22 FACILITIES. (a) For any appointment under this chapter, the
23 county in which the indictment was returned or information was
24 filed shall pay for services described by Articles 46B.021(a)(1)
25 and (2). If those services are provided by an expert who is an
26 employee of the local mental health authority or local mental
27 retardation authority, the county shall pay the authority for the

1 services.

2 (b) The county in which the indictment was returned or
3 information was filed shall reimburse a facility that accepts a
4 defendant for examination under this chapter for expenses incurred
5 that are determined by the department to be reasonably necessary
6 and incidental to the proper examination of the defendant.

7 SUBCHAPTER C. INCOMPETENCY HEARING AND TRIAL

8 Art. 46B.051. HEARING BEFORE JUDGE OR JURY. (a) If a court
9 holds a hearing to determine whether the defendant is incompetent
10 to stand trial, on the request of either party or the motion of the
11 court, a jury shall make the determination.

12 (b) The court shall make the determination of incompetency
13 if a jury determination is not required by Subsection (a).

14 (c) If a jury determination is required by Subsection (a), a
15 jury that has not been selected to determine the guilt or innocence
16 of the defendant must determine the issue of incompetency.

17 Art. 46B.052. JURY VERDICT. (a) If a jury determination
18 of the issue of incompetency to stand trial is required by Article
19 46B.051(a), the court shall require the jury to state in its verdict
20 whether the defendant is incompetent to stand trial.

21 (b) The verdict must be concurred in by each juror.

22 Art. 46B.053. PROCEDURE AFTER FINDING OF COMPETENCY. If at
23 a hearing the court or jury determines that the defendant is
24 competent to stand trial, the court shall continue the trial on the
25 merits. If a jury determines that the defendant is competent and
26 the trial on the merits is to be held before a jury, the court shall
27 continue the trial with another jury selected for that purpose.

1 Art. 46B.054. UNCONTESTED INCOMPETENCY. If the court finds
2 as required by Article 46B.005 that there is evidence to support a
3 finding of incompetency to stand trial and the court and each party
4 agree that the defendant is incompetent to stand trial, the court
5 shall proceed in the same manner as if a jury had been impaneled and
6 had found the defendant incompetent to stand trial.

7 Art. 46B.055. PROCEDURE AFTER FINDING OF INCOMPETENCY. If
8 the defendant is found incompetent to stand trial, the court shall
9 proceed under Subchapter D.

10 SUBCHAPTER D. PROCEDURES ON DETERMINATION OF INCOMPETENCY

11 Art. 46B.071. OPTIONS ON DETERMINATION OF INCOMPETENCY. On
12 a determination that a defendant is incompetent to stand trial, the
13 court shall:

14 (1) commit the defendant to a facility under Article
15 46B.073; or

16 (2) release the defendant on bail under Article
17 46B.072.

18 Art. 46B.072. RELEASE ON BAIL. If the court determines that
19 a defendant found incompetent to stand trial is not a danger to
20 others and may be safely treated on an outpatient basis for the
21 purpose of attaining competency to stand trial, the court may
22 release the defendant on bail or continue the defendant's release
23 on bail, subject to conditions reasonably related to assuring
24 public safety and the effectiveness of the defendant's treatment.

25 Art. 46B.073. COMMITMENT FOR RESTORATION TO COMPETENCY.
26 (a) This article applies only to a defendant not released on bail.

27 (b) The court shall commit a defendant described by

1 Subsection (a) to a mental health facility or residential care
2 facility for a period not to exceed 120 days for further examination
3 and treatment toward the specific objective of attaining competency
4 to stand trial.

5 (c) If the defendant is charged with an offense listed in
6 Article 17.032(a) or the indictment requests an affirmative finding
7 under Section 3g(a)(2), Article 42.12, the court shall enter an
8 order committing the defendant to the maximum security unit of any
9 facility designated by the department, to an agency of the United
10 States operating a mental hospital, or to a Department of Veterans
11 Affairs hospital.

12 (d) If the defendant is not charged with an offense listed
13 in Article 17.032(a) and the indictment does not request an
14 affirmative finding under Section 3g(a)(2), Article 42.12, the
15 court shall enter an order committing the defendant to a mental
16 health facility or residential care facility determined to be
17 appropriate by the local mental health authority or local mental
18 retardation authority.

19 Art. 46B.074. COMPETENT TESTIMONY REQUIRED. A defendant
20 may be committed to a mental health facility or residential care
21 facility under this subchapter only on competent medical or
22 psychiatric testimony.

23 Art. 46B.075. TRANSFER OF DEFENDANT TO FACILITY. A
24 commitment order issued under this subchapter must place the
25 defendant in the custody of the sheriff for transportation to the
26 facility in which the defendant is to be confined.

27 Art. 46B.076. COURT'S ORDER. (a) If the defendant is

1 found incompetent to stand trial, the court shall send a copy of the
2 order to the facility to which the defendant is committed not later
3 than the date the defendant is committed to the facility. The court
4 shall also provide to the facility copies of the following made
5 available to the court during the incompetency hearing:

- 6 (1) reports of each expert;
7 (2) psychiatric, psychological, or social work
8 reports that relate to the mental condition of the defendant;
9 (3) documents provided by the attorney representing
10 the state or the attorney representing the defendant that relate to
11 the defendant's current or past mental condition;
12 (4) copies of the indictment or information and any
13 supporting documents used to establish probable cause in the case;
14 (5) the defendant's criminal history record; and
15 (6) the addresses of the attorney representing the
16 state and the attorney representing the defendant.

17 (b) The court shall order that the transcript of all medical
18 testimony received by the jury or court be promptly prepared by the
19 court reporter and forwarded to the proper facility.

20 Art. 46B.077. INDIVIDUAL TREATMENT PROGRAM. (a) The
21 facility to which the defendant is committed shall:

- 22 (1) develop an individual program of treatment;
23 (2) assess and evaluate whether the defendant will
24 obtain competency in the foreseeable future; and
25 (3) report to the court and to the local mental health
26 authority or to the local mental retardation authority on the
27 defendant's progress toward achieving competency.

1 (b) If the defendant is committed to an inpatient mental
2 health facility or to a residential care facility, the facility
3 shall report to the court at least once during the commitment
4 period. If the defendant is released to a treatment program not
5 provided by an inpatient mental health facility or a residential
6 care facility, the treatment program shall report to the court:

7 (1) not later than the 14th day after the date on which
8 the defendant's treatment begins; and

9 (2) until the defendant is no longer released to the
10 treatment program, at least once during each 30-day period
11 following the date of the report required by Subdivision (1).

12 Art. 46B.078. CHARGES SUBSEQUENTLY DISMISSED. If the
13 charges pending against a defendant are dismissed, the committing
14 court shall send a copy of the order of dismissal to the sheriff of
15 the county in which the committing court is located and to the head
16 of the facility in which the defendant is held. On receipt of the
17 copy of the order, the facility shall discharge the defendant into
18 the care of the sheriff for transportation in the manner described
19 by Article 46B.082.

20 Art. 46B.079. RETURN TO COMMITTING COURT. A defendant
21 committed under this subchapter shall be returned to the committing
22 court as soon as practicable after the earliest of the following
23 dates:

24 (1) the date on which the facility determines that the
25 defendant has attained competency;

26 (2) the date on which the facility determines that the
27 defendant will not attain competency in the foreseeable future; or

1 (3) the date on which the term of commitment expires.

2 Art. 46B.080. NOTICE TO COMMITTING COURT. (a) The head of
3 a facility to which a defendant has been committed under this
4 subchapter, not later than the 14th day before the date on which a
5 commitment order is to expire, shall notify the committing court
6 that the term of the commitment is about to expire.

7 (b) The head of the facility to which a defendant has been
8 committed under this subchapter shall promptly notify the
9 committing court when the head of the facility is of the opinion
10 that:

11 (1) the defendant has attained competency to stand
12 trial; or

13 (2) the defendant will not attain competency in the
14 foreseeable future.

15 (c) If the head of the facility to which the defendant has
16 been committed notifies the court that the commitment order is
17 about to expire, the notice may contain a request for an extension
18 of the commitment order for a period of 60 days and an explanation
19 for the basis of the request.

20 Art. 46B.081. EXTENSION OF COMMITMENT ORDER. (a) On the
21 request of the head of a facility made under Article 46B.080(c), the
22 court may enter an order extending the term of the commitment order
23 for a period of 60 days.

24 (b) The court may enter an order under Subsection (a) only
25 if the court determines that, on the basis of information provided
26 by the head of the facility:

27 (1) the defendant has not attained competency; and

1 (2) an extension of the term of the commitment order
2 will likely enable the facility to restore the defendant to
3 competency.

4 (c) The court may grant only one extension under this
5 article for the term of a defendant's commitment order.

6 Art. 46B.082. TRANSPORTATION OF DEFENDANT. (a) On
7 notification from the committing court under Article 46B.078, the
8 sheriff of the county in which the committing court is located or
9 the sheriff's designee shall transport the defendant to the
10 committing court.

11 (b) If a defendant committed to a maximum security unit of a
12 facility of the department has not been transported from the unit
13 before the 15th day after the date on which the court received
14 notification under Article 46B.080(a), the head of that facility
15 shall cause the defendant to be promptly transported to the
16 committing court and placed in the custody of the sheriff of the
17 county in which the committing court is located. The county in
18 which the committing court is located shall reimburse the
19 department for the mileage and per diem expenses of the personnel
20 required to transport the defendant, calculated in accordance with
21 rates provided in the General Appropriations Act for state
22 employees.

23 Art. 46B.083. REPORT BY FACILITY HEAD. (a) When the head
24 of a facility to which the defendant is committed discharges the
25 defendant and the defendant is returned to the committing court,
26 the head of the facility shall file a final report with the court
27 stating the reason for the discharge under Article 46B.080. The

1 court shall furnish copies of the report to the defense counsel and
2 the prosecuting attorney.

3 (b) If the head of the facility believes that the defendant
4 is a person with mental illness and meets the criteria for
5 court-ordered inpatient mental health services under Subtitle C,
6 Title 7, Health and Safety Code, the head of the facility shall have
7 submitted to the court a certificate of medical examination for
8 mental illness. The head of the facility shall include in the final
9 report a list of the types and dosages of medications with which the
10 defendant was treated for mental illness while in the facility.

11 (c) If the head of the facility is of the opinion that the
12 defendant is a person with mental retardation, the head of the
13 facility shall have submitted to the court an affidavit stating the
14 conclusions reached as a result of the examination.

15 Art. 46B.084. PROCEEDINGS ON RETURN OF DEFENDANT TO COURT.

16 (a) On the return of a defendant to the committing court, the court
17 shall make a determination with regard to the defendant's
18 competency to stand trial. The court may make the determination
19 based solely on the report filed under Article 46B.080(b), unless
20 any party objects in writing or in open court to the findings of the
21 report not later than the 15th day after the date on which the
22 report is served on the parties.

23 (b) If a party objects under Subsection (a), the issue shall
24 be set for a hearing. The hearing is before the court, except that
25 on motion by the defendant, the defense counsel, the prosecuting
26 attorney, or the court, the hearing shall be held before a jury.

27 (c) The hearing shall be held within 30 days following the

1 date of objection unless continued for good cause.

2 (d) If the defendant is found competent to stand trial,
3 criminal proceedings against the defendant may be resumed.

4 (e) If the defendant is found incompetent to stand trial and
5 if all charges pending against the defendant are not dismissed, the
6 court shall proceed under Subchapter E.

7 (f) If the defendant is found incompetent to stand trial and
8 if all charges pending against the defendant are dismissed, the
9 court shall proceed under Subchapter F.

10 Art. 46B.085. RECOMMITMENT PROHIBITED. A defendant
11 committed under this subchapter may not be recommitted under this
12 subchapter in connection with the same offense.

13 Art. 46B.086. COURT-ORDERED MEDICATIONS. (a) This
14 article applies only to a defendant:

15 (1) who after having been determined under this
16 chapter to be incompetent to stand trial is subsequently determined
17 to be competent to stand trial; and

18 (2) for whom a continuity of care plan has been
19 prepared by a facility that requires the defendant to take
20 psychoactive medications.

21 (b) If a defendant described by Subsection (a) refuses to
22 take psychoactive medications as required by the defendant's
23 continuity of care plan, the director of the correctional facility
24 shall notify the court in which the criminal proceedings are
25 pending of that fact not later than the end of the next business day
26 following the refusal. The court shall promptly notify the
27 attorney representing the state and the attorney representing the

defendant of the defendant's refusal. The attorney representing the state may file a written motion to compel medication. The court, after notice and after a hearing that is held as soon as practicable, may authorize the director of a correctional facility to have the medication administered to the defendant, by reasonable force if necessary.

(c) The court may issue an order under this article only if the order is supported by the testimony of two physicians, one of whom is the physician at the correctional facility who is prescribing the medication as a component of the defendant's continuity of care plan and another who is not otherwise involved in proceedings against the defendant. The court may require either or both physicians to examine the defendant and report on the examination to the court.

(d) The court may issue an order under this article if the court finds by clear and convincing evidence that:

(1) the prescribed medication is medically appropriate, is in the best medical interest of the defendant, and does not present side effects that cause harm to the defendant that is greater than the medical benefit to the defendant;

(2) the state has a clear and compelling interest in the defendant maintaining competency to stand trial;

(3) no other less invasive means of maintaining the defendant's competency exists; and

(4) the prescribed medication will not unduly prejudice the defendant's rights or use of defensive theories at trial.

1 (e) A statement made by a defendant to a physician during an
2 examination under Subsection (c) may not be admitted against the
3 defendant in any criminal proceeding, other than at:

4 (1) a hearing on the defendant's incompetency; or
5 (2) any proceeding at which the defendant first
6 introduces into evidence the contents of the statement.

7 SUBCHAPTER E. EXTENDED COMMITMENT: CHARGES PENDING

8 Art. 46B.101. APPLICABILITY. This subchapter applies to a
9 defendant against whom a court is required to proceed under Article
10 46B.084(e).

11 Art. 46B.102. COMMITMENT HEARING: MENTAL ILLNESS. (a) If
12 it appears to the court that the defendant may be a person with
13 mental illness, the court shall hold a hearing to determine whether
14 the defendant should be committed to a mental health facility.

15 (b) Proceedings for commitment of the defendant to a mental
16 health facility are governed by Subtitle C, Title 7, Health and
17 Safety Code, to the extent that Subtitle C applies and does not
18 conflict with this chapter, except that the criminal court shall
19 conduct the proceedings whether or not the criminal court is also
20 the county court.

21 (c) If the court enters an order committing the defendant to
22 a mental health facility, the defendant shall be:

23 (1) treated in conformity with Subtitle C, Title 7,
24 Health and Safety Code, except as otherwise provided by this
25 chapter; and

26 (2) released in conformity with Article 46B.107.

27 Art. 46B.103. COMMITMENT HEARING: MENTAL RETARDATION.

1 (a) If it appears to the court that the defendant may be a person
2 with mental retardation, the court shall hold a hearing to
3 determine whether the defendant is a person with mental
4 retardation.

5 (b) Proceedings for commitment of the defendant to a
6 residential care facility are governed by Subtitle D, Title 7,
7 Health and Safety Code, to the extent that Subtitle D applies and
8 does not conflict with this chapter, except that the criminal court
9 shall conduct the proceedings whether or not the criminal court is
10 also a county court.

11 (c) If the court enters an order committing the defendant to
12 a residential care facility, the defendant shall be:

13 (1) treated and released in accordance with Subtitle
14 D, Title 7, Health and Safety Code, except as otherwise provided by
15 this chapter; and

16 (2) released in conformity with Article 46B.107.

17 (d) In the proceedings conducted under this subchapter:

18 (1) an application for court-ordered temporary or
19 extended mental health services or to have the defendant declared a
20 person with mental retardation may not be required;

21 (2) the provisions of Subtitles C and D, Title 7,
22 Health and Safety Code, relating to notice of hearing do not apply;
23 and

24 (3) appeals from the criminal court proceedings are to
25 the court of appeals as in the proceedings for court-ordered
26 inpatient mental health services under Subtitle C, Title 7, Health
27 and Safety Code, or for commitment to a residential care facility

1 under Subtitle D, Title 7, Health and Safety Code.

2 Art. 46B.104. EXTENDED COMMITMENT PLACEMENT: FINDING OF
3 VIOLENCE. A defendant committed to a facility as a result of
4 proceedings initiated under this chapter shall be committed to the
5 maximum security unit of any facility designated by the department
6 if:

7 (1) the defendant is charged with an offense listed in
8 Article 17.032(a); or

9 (2) the indictment charging the offense requests an
10 affirmative finding under Section 3g(a)(2), Article 42.12.

11 Art. 46B.105. TRANSFER FOLLOWING EXTENDED COMMITMENT
12 PLACEMENT. (a) Unless a defendant is determined to be manifestly
13 dangerous by a department review board, not later than the 60th day
14 after the date the defendant arrives at the maximum security unit,
15 the defendant shall be transferred to:

16 (1) a unit of an inpatient mental health facility
17 other than a maximum security unit;

18 (2) a residential care facility; or

19 (3) a program designated by a local mental health
20 authority or a local mental retardation authority.

21 (b) The commissioner of mental health and mental
22 retardation shall appoint a review board of five members, including
23 one psychiatrist licensed to practice medicine in this state and
24 two persons who work directly with persons with mental illness or
25 mental retardation, to determine whether the defendant is
26 manifestly dangerous and, as a result of the danger the defendant
27 presents, requires continued placement in a maximum security unit.

1 (c) The review board may not make a determination as to the
2 defendant's need for treatment.

3 (d) A finding that the defendant is not manifestly dangerous
4 is not a medical determination that the defendant no longer meets
5 the criteria for involuntary civil commitment under Subtitle C or
6 D, Title 7, Health and Safety Code.

7 (e) If the superintendent of the facility at which the
8 maximum security unit is located disagrees with the determination,
9 the matter shall be referred to the commissioner of mental health
10 and mental retardation. The commissioner shall decide whether the
11 defendant is manifestly dangerous.

12 Art. 46B.106. EXTENDED COMMITMENT PLACEMENT: NO FINDING OF
13 VIOLENCE. (a) A defendant committed to a facility as a result of
14 the proceedings initiated under this chapter, other than a
15 defendant described by Article 46B.104, shall be committed to a
16 facility designated by the local mental health authority or local
17 mental retardation authority to serve the catchment area in which
18 the committing court is located.

19 (b) A facility may not refuse to accept a placement ordered
20 under this article on the grounds that criminal charges against the
21 defendant are pending.

22 Art. 46B.107. RELEASE OF DEFENDANT AFTER COMMITMENT.
23 (a) The release from the department or a facility of a defendant
24 committed under this chapter is subject to disapproval by the
25 committing court if the court or the attorney representing the
26 state has notified the head of the facility to which the defendant
27 has been committed that a criminal charge remains pending against

1 the defendant.

2 (b) If the head of the facility to which a defendant has been
3 committed under this chapter determines that the defendant should
4 be released from the facility, the head of the facility shall notify
5 the committing court and the sheriff of the county from which the
6 defendant was committed in writing of the release not later than the
7 14th day before the date on which the facility intends to release
8 the defendant.

9 (c) The head of the facility shall provide with the notice a
10 written statement that states an opinion as to whether the
11 defendant to be released has attained competency to stand trial.

12 (d) The court may, on motion of the attorney representing
13 the state or on its own motion, hold a hearing to determine whether
14 release is appropriate under the applicable criteria in Subtitle C
15 or D, Title 7, Health and Safety Code.

16 (e) If the court determines that release is not appropriate,
17 the court shall enter an order directing the head of the facility to
18 not release the defendant.

19 (f) If an order is entered under Subsection (e), any
20 subsequent proceeding to release the defendant is subject to this
21 article.

22 Art. 46B.108. REDETERMINATION OF COMPETENCY. (a) If
23 criminal charges against a defendant found incompetent to stand
24 trial have not been dismissed, the trial court at any time may
25 determine whether the defendant has been restored to competency.

26 (b) An inquiry into restoration of competency under this
27 subchapter may be made at the request of the head of the mental

1 health facility or residential care facility to which the defendant
2 has been committed, the defendant, or the attorney representing the
3 state, or may be made on the court's own motion.

4 Art. 46B.109. REQUEST BY HEAD OF FACILITY. (a) The head of
5 a facility to which a defendant has been committed as a result of a
6 finding of incompetency to stand trial may request the court to
7 determine that the defendant has been restored to competency.

8 (b) The head of the facility shall provide with the request
9 a written statement that in the opinion of the head of the facility
10 the defendant is competent to stand trial.

11 Art. 46B.110. MOTION BY DEFENDANT OR ATTORNEY REPRESENTING
12 STATE. (a) The defendant or the attorney representing the state
13 may move that the court determine that the defendant has been
14 restored to competency.

15 (b) A motion for a determination of competency may be
16 accompanied by affidavits supporting the moving party's assertion
17 that the defendant is competent.

18 Art. 46B.111. APPOINTMENT OF EXAMINERS. On the filing of a
19 request or motion to determine that the defendant has been restored
20 to competency or on the court's decision on its own motion to
21 inquire into restoration of competency, the court may appoint
22 disinterested experts to examine the defendant in accordance with
23 Subchapter B.

24 Art. 46B.112. DETERMINATION OF RESTORATION WITH AGREEMENT.
25 On the filing of a request or motion to determine that the defendant
26 has been restored to competency or on the court's decision on its
27 own motion to inquire into restoration of competency, the court

1 shall find the defendant competent to stand trial and proceed in the
2 same manner as if the defendant had been found restored to
3 competency at a hearing if:

4 (1) both parties agree that the defendant is competent
5 to stand trial; and

6 (2) the court concurs.

7 Art. 46B.113. DETERMINATION OF RESTORATION WITHOUT
8 AGREEMENT. (a) The court shall hold a hearing on a request by the
9 head of a facility to which a defendant has been committed as a
10 result of a finding of incompetency to stand trial to determine
11 whether the defendant has been restored to competency.

12 (b) The court may hold a hearing on a motion to determine
13 whether the defendant has been restored to competency or on the
14 court's decision on its own motion to inquire into restoration of
15 competency, and shall hold a hearing if a motion and any supporting
16 material establish good reason to believe the defendant may have
17 been restored to competency.

18 (c) If a court holds a hearing under this article, on the
19 request of either party or the motion of the court a jury shall make
20 the determination.

21 (d) If the head of a facility to which the defendant was
22 committed as a result of a finding of incompetency to stand trial
23 has provided an opinion that the defendant has regained competency,
24 competency is presumed at a hearing under this subchapter and
25 continuing incompetency must be proved by a preponderance of the
26 evidence.

27 (e) If the head of a facility has not provided an opinion

1 described by Subsection (d), incompetency is presumed at a hearing
2 under this subchapter and the defendant's competency must be proved
3 by a preponderance of the evidence.

4 Art. 46B.114. TRANSPORTATION OF DEFENDANT TO COURT. An
5 order setting a hearing to determine whether the defendant has been
6 restored to competency shall direct that the defendant be placed in
7 the custody of the sheriff of the county in which the committing
8 court is located or the sheriff's designee for transportation to
9 the court.

10 Art. 46B.115. SUBSEQUENT REDETERMINATIONS OF COMPETENCY.
11 (a) If the court has made a determination that a defendant has not
12 been restored to competency under this subchapter, a subsequent
13 request or motion for a redetermination of competency filed before
14 the 91st day after the date of that determination must:

15 (1) explain why the person making the request or
16 motion believes another inquiry into restoration is appropriate;
17 and

18 (2) provide support for the belief.

19 (b) The court may hold a hearing on a request or motion under
20 this article only if the court first finds reason to believe the
21 defendant's condition has materially changed since the prior
22 determination that the defendant was not restored to competency.

23 Art. 46B.116. DISPOSITION ON DETERMINATION OF COMPETENCY.
24 If the defendant is found competent to stand trial, the proceedings
25 on the criminal charge may proceed.

26 Art. 46B.117. DISPOSITION ON DETERMINATION OF
27 INCOMPETENCY. (a) If a defendant under order of commitment to a

1 facility is found to not have been restored to competency to stand
2 trial, the court shall remand the defendant pursuant to that order
3 of commitment, and order the defendant placed in the custody of the
4 sheriff or the sheriff's designee for transportation back to the
5 facility.

6 (b) If a defendant not under order of commitment is found to
7 not have been restored to competency to stand trial, the court shall
8 order the defendant's custody status to remain unchanged.

9 SUBCHAPTER F. EXTENDED COMMITMENT: CHARGES DISMISSED

10 Art. 46B.151. COURT DETERMINATION RELATED TO COMMITMENT.

11 (a) If a court is required by Article 46B.084(f) to proceed under
12 this subchapter, the court shall determine whether there is
13 evidence to support a finding that the defendant is either a person
14 with mental illness or a person with mental retardation.

15 (b) If it appears to the court that there is evidence to
16 support a finding of mental illness or mental retardation, the
17 court shall enter an order transferring the defendant to the
18 appropriate court for civil commitment proceedings and stating that
19 all charges pending against the defendant in that court have been
20 dismissed. The court may order the defendant:

21 (1) detained in jail or any other suitable place
22 pending the prompt initiation and prosecution by the attorney for
23 the state or other person designated by the court of appropriate
24 civil proceedings to determine whether the defendant will be
25 committed to a mental health facility or residential care facility;
26 or

27 (2) placed in the care of a responsible person on

1 satisfactory security being given for the defendant's proper care
2 and protection.

3 (c) Notwithstanding Subsection (b), a defendant placed in a
4 facility of the department pending civil hearing under this article
5 may be detained in that facility only with the consent of the head
6 of the facility and pursuant to an order of protective custody
7 issued under Subtitle C, Title 7, Health and Safety Code.

8 (d) If the court does not detain or place the defendant
9 under Subsection (b), the court shall release the defendant.

10 SUBCHAPTER G. PROVISIONS APPLICABLE TO SUBCHAPTERS E AND F

11 Art. 46B.171. TRANSCRIPTS; DOCUMENTATION. The court shall
12 order that:

13 (1) a transcript of all medical testimony received in
14 both the criminal proceedings and the civil commitment proceedings
15 under Subchapter E or F be prepared as soon as possible by the court
16 reporters; and

17 (2) copies of documents listed in Article 46B.076
18 accompany the defendant to the mental health facility or
19 residential care facility.

20 SECTION 2. Subsections (b) and (c), Article 16.22, Code of
21 Criminal Procedure, is amended to read as follows:

22 (b) A written report of the examination shall be submitted
23 to the magistrate within 30 days of the order of examination, and
24 the magistrate shall furnish copies of the report to the defense
25 counsel and the prosecuting attorney. The report shall include a

15 the defendant's competency to stand trial and the insanity defense

20 juvenile court may order a child who is referred to the juvenile
21 court or who is alleged by a petition or found to have engaged in

The criminal court shall, before the 91st day after the date of the transfer, institute proceedings under Chapter 46B [~~Article 46.02~~], Code of Criminal Procedure. If those or any subsequent proceedings result in a determination that the defendant is competent to stand trial, the defendant may not receive a punishment for the delinquent conduct described by Subsection (a)(2) that results in confinement for a period longer than the maximum period of confinement the defendant could have received if the defendant had been adjudicated for the delinquent conduct while still a child and within the jurisdiction of the juvenile court.

SECTION 9. Subsection (b), Section 571.011, Health and Safety Code, is amended to read as follows:

(b) The provisions in this subtitle relating to the discharge, furlough, or transfer of a patient do not apply to a person charged with a criminal offense who is admitted to a mental health facility under Subchapter D or E, Chapter 46B [~~Section 5, Article 46.02~~], Code of Criminal Procedure.

SECTION 10. Subsection (e), Section 574.001, Health and Safety Code, is amended to read as follows:

(e) An order transferring a criminal defendant against whom all charges have been dismissed to the appropriate court for a hearing on court-ordered mental health services in accordance with Subchapter F, Chapter 46B [~~Section 7, Article 46.02~~], Code of Criminal Procedure, serves as an application under this section. The order must state that all charges have been dismissed.

SECTION 11. Subsection (b), Section 574.002, Health and Safety Code, is amended to read as follows:

(b) The application must state whether the application is for temporary or extended mental health services. An application for extended mental health services must state that the person has received court-ordered inpatient mental health services under this subtitle or under Subchapter D or E, Chapter 46B [~~Section 5, Article 46.02~~], Code of Criminal Procedure, for at least 60 consecutive days during the preceding 12 months.

SECTION 12. Subsections (a) and (b), Section 574.035, Health and Safety Code, are amended to read as follows:

(a) The judge may order a proposed patient to receive court-ordered extended inpatient mental health services only if the jury, or the judge if the right to a jury is waived, finds, from clear and convincing evidence, that:

(1) the proposed patient is mentally ill;

(2) as a result of that mental illness the proposed patient:

(A) is likely to cause serious harm to himself;

(B) is likely to cause serious harm to others; or

(C) is:

(i) suffering severe and abnormal mental, emotional, or physical distress;

(ii) experiencing substantial mental or physical deterioration of the proposed patient's ability to function independently, which is exhibited by the proposed patient's inability, except for reasons of indigence, to provide

1 for the proposed patient's basic needs, including food, clothing,
2 health, or safety; and

3 (iii) unable to make a rational and informed
4 decision as to whether or not to submit to treatment;

5 (3) the proposed patient's condition is expected to
6 continue for more than 90 days; and

7 (4) the proposed patient has received court-ordered
8 inpatient mental health services under this subtitle or under
9 Chapter 46B [~~Article 46.02~~], Code of Criminal Procedure, for at
10 least 60 consecutive days during the preceding 12 months.

11 (b) The judge may order a proposed patient to receive
12 court-ordered extended outpatient mental health services only if:

13 (1) the judge finds that appropriate mental health
14 services are available to the patient; and

15 (2) the jury, or the judge if the right to a jury is
16 waived, finds from clear and convincing evidence that:

17 (A) the proposed patient is mentally ill;

18 (B) the nature of the mental illness is severe
19 and persistent;

20 (C) as a result of the mental illness, the
21 proposed patient will, if not treated, continue to:

22 (i) suffer severe and abnormal mental,
23 emotional, or physical distress; and

24 (ii) experience deterioration of the
25 ability to function independently to the extent that the proposed
26 patient will be unable to live safely in the community without
27 court-ordered outpatient mental health services;

(D) the proposed patient has an inability to participate in outpatient treatment services effectively and voluntarily, demonstrated by:

(i) any of the proposed patient's actions occurring within the two-year period which immediately precedes the hearing; or

(ii) specific characteristics of the proposed patient's clinical condition that make impossible a rational and informed decision whether to submit to voluntary outpatient treatment;

(E) the proposed patient's condition is expected to continue for more than 90 days; and

(F) the proposed patient has received court-ordered inpatient mental health services under this subtitle or under Subchapter D or E, Chapter 46B [~~Section 5, Article 46.02~~], Code of Criminal Procedure, for at least 60 consecutive days during the preceding 12 months.

SECTION 13. Section 575.003, Health and Safety Code, is amended to read as follows:

Sec. 575.003. ADMISSION OF ALCOHOLICS AND PERSONS CHARGED WITH CRIMINAL OFFENSE. This subtitle does not affect the admission to a state mental health facility of:

(1) an alcoholic admitted under Chapter 462; or

(2) a person charged with a criminal offense admitted under Subchapter D or E, Chapter 46B [~~Section 5, Article 46.02~~], Code of Criminal Procedure.

SECTION 14. Subsection (a), Section 576.025, Health and

Safety Code, is amended to read as follows:

(a) A person may not administer a psychoactive medication to a patient receiving voluntary or involuntary mental health services who refuses the administration unless:

(1) the patient is having a medication-related emergency;

(2) the patient is younger than 16 years of age and the patient's parent, managing conservator, or guardian consents to the administration on behalf of the patient;

(3) the refusing patient's representative authorized by law to consent on behalf of the patient has consented to the administration;

(4) the administration of the medication regardless of the patient's refusal is authorized by an order issued under Section 574.106; or

(5) the patient is receiving court-ordered mental health services authorized by an order issued under:

(A) Chapter 46B [~~Article 46.02~~] or Article 46.03, Code of Criminal Procedure; or

(B) Chapter 55, Family Code.

SECTION 15. Article 46.02, Code of Criminal Procedure, is repealed.

SECTION 16. The change in law made by this Act applies only to a defendant against whom proceedings have not been initiated under Article 46.02, Code of Criminal Procedure, before the effective date of this Act. The determination of incompetency for a defendant against whom proceedings have been initiated under

1 Article 46.02, Code of Criminal Procedure, before the effective
2 date of this Act is covered by the law in effect when the
3 proceedings were initiated, and the former law is continued in
4 effect for this purpose.

5 SECTION 17. This Act takes effect January 1, 2004.
