(a) The board of an 6 electric cooperative that owns and operates a generating facility 7 may employ and commission security personnel to enforce the law of 8 9 this state within the jurisdiction designated by Subsection (c). (b) An officer commissioned under this section may make 10 arrests and has all the powers, privileges, and immunities of a 11 12 peace officer while performing the officer's assigned duties within the jurisdiction designated by Subsection (c). An officer assigned 13 14 to duty and commissioned shall take and file the oath required of peace officers and shall execute and file a good and sufficient bond 15 in the sum of \$1,000, payable to the governor, with two or more good 16 and sufficient sureties, conditioned that the officer will fairly, 17 impartially, and faithfully perform the duties required of the 18 officer by law. The bond may be sued on from time to time in the 19 name of the person injured until the whole amount is recovered. 20 21 (c) The jurisdiction of an officer commissioned under this 22 section is limited to: 23 (1) property owned, leased, managed, or controlled by

2	(2) a perimeter area that extends not farther than one

5	(d) An officer commissioned by an electric cooperative
6	under this section is not entitled to compensation or benefits
7	provided by this state or a political subdivision of this state.
8	(e) The state or a political subdivision of this state is
9	not liable for an act or omission of an officer commissioned under
10	this section during the performance of the officer's assigned
11	duties.
12	(f) An electric cooperative may not commission a person
13	under this section unless the person obtains a peace officer
14	license issued by the Commission on Law Enforcement Officer
15	Standards and Education. The electric cooperative shall pay to the
16	Commission on Law Enforcement Officer Standards and Education on
17	behalf of an employee any fees that are necessary to obtain a

19	(g) A person's commission and any authority to act as an
20	officer under this section are automatically revoked if the
