A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1	AN ACT
2	relating to the name of Southwest Texas State University.
3	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
4	SECTION 1. The heading of Subchapter C, Chapter 96,
5	Education Code, is amended to read as follows:
6	SUBCHAPTER C. [SOUTHWEST] TEXAS STATE UNIVERSITYSAN MARCOS
7	SECTION 2. Section 96.41, Education Code, is amended to
8	read as follows:
9	Sec. 96.41. [SOUTHWEST] TEXAS STATE UNIVERSITY <u>SAN</u>
10	MARCOS. [Southwest] Texas State UniversitySan Marcos is a
11	coeducational institution of higher education located in the city
12	of San Marcos. It is under the management and control of the Board
13	of Regents, Texas State University System.
14	SECTION 3. The heading of Section 54.511, Education Code,
15	is amended to read as follows:
16	Sec. 54.511. STUDENT FEES FOR BUS SERVICE; [SOUTHWEST]
17	TEXAS STATE UNIVERSITY SAN MARCOS.
18	SECTION 4. Section 54.511(a), Education Code, is amended to
19	read as follows:
20	(a) The board of regents of the Texas State University
21	System may charge each student enrolled at [Southwest] Texas State
22	University <mark></mark> San Marcos a fee initially set at \$10 per semester or \$5
23	per six-week summer term to be used to finance bus service for
24	students attending the institution.

1 SECTION 5. Section 55.1724(a), Education Code, is amended 2 to read as follows:

3 (a) In addition to the other authority granted by this 4 subchapter, the board of regents of the Texas State University System may acquire, purchase, construct, improve, renovate, 5 6 enlarge, or equip property, buildings, structures, facilities, 7 roads, or related infrastructure for the following institutions to be financed by the issuance of bonds in accordance with this 8 9 subchapter and in accordance with a systemwide revenue financing program adopted by the board in aggregate principal amounts not to 10 exceed the following: 11

Angelo State University, \$20 million; 12 (1)13 (2) Lamar University--Beaumont, \$8 million; Lamar Institute of Technology, \$2 million; 14 (3) 15 (4) Lamar State College--Orange, \$3.5 million; 16 (5) Lamar State College--Port Arthur, \$2.75 million; 17 Sam Houston State University, \$7.5 million; (6) (7) [Southwest] Texas State University--San Marcos, 18 \$19.7 million; and 19

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(8) Sul Ross State University, \$17.5 million.

21 SECTION 6. Section 55.1734(a), Education Code, is amended 22 to read as follows:

(a) In addition to the other authority granted by this
subchapter, the board of regents of the Texas State University
System may issue in accordance with this subchapter and in
accordance with a systemwide revenue financing program adopted by
the board bonds for the following institutions not to exceed the

1 following aggregate principal amounts to finance projects
2 specified as follows:

3 (1) Angelo State University, \$16,917,550 to expand and
4 renovate institutional facilities;

5 (2) Lamar University--Beaumont, \$21,792,096 to 6 renovate and repair campus buildings;

7 (3) Lamar Institute of Technology, \$5,301,960 to
8 renovate Gentry Hall and convert it to classroom and laboratory
9 use;

10 (4) Lamar State College--Orange, \$2,125,000 for 11 campus landscaping, renovation of the old library for physical 12 plant purposes, renovation of the Main Building and Electronics 13 Commerce Resource Center, and demolition of the old physical plant 14 building;

15 (5) Lamar State College--Port Arthur, \$7,650,000 to
16 construct a performing arts and classroom building and to expand
17 the Gates Memorial Library and develop an adjacent plaza;

18 (6) Sam Houston State University, \$18 million to
19 renovate and expand the Farrington Building;

20 (7) [Southwest] Texas State University--San Marcos,
21 \$18,436,500 to construct a business building; and

(8) Sul Ross State University, \$15,175,000 to renovate
and expand the range animal science facility and science building
annex and to carry out other building renovations.

25 SECTION 7. Section 61.003(3), Education Code, is amended to 26 read as follows:

27 (3) "General academic teaching institution" means The

University of Texas at Austin; The University of Texas at El Paso; 1 2 The University of Texas of the Permian Basin; The University of 3 Texas at Dallas; The University of Texas at San Antonio; Texas A&M 4 University, Main University; The University of Texas at Arlington; Tarleton State University; Prairie View A&M University; Texas 5 Maritime Academy; Texas Tech University; University of North Texas; 6 7 Lamar University; Lamar State College--Orange; Lamar State College--Port Arthur; Texas A&M University--Kingsville; Texas A&M 8 9 University--Corpus Christi; Texas Woman's University; Texas 10 Southern University; Midwestern State University; University of 11 Houston; University of Texas--Pan American; The University of Texas at Brownsville; Texas A&M University--Commerce; Sam Houston State 12 13 University; [Southwest] Texas State University--San Marcos; West Texas A&M University; Stephen F. SECTION 8. Section 62.021(a), Education Code, is amended to read as follows:

(a) Each fiscal year, an eligible institution is entitled to 21 22 receive an amount allocated in accordance with this section from Section 17(a), Article VII, 23 funds appropriated by Texas The comptroller shall distribute funds allocated 24 Constitution. 25 under this subsection only on presentation of a claim and issuance of a warrant in accordance with Section 403.071, Government Code. 26 27 The comptroller may not issue a warrant from any funds allocated

under this subsection before the delivery of goods or services 1 2 described in Section 17, Article VII, Texas Constitution, except 3 for the payment of principal or interest on bonds or notes or for a 4 payment for a book or other published library material as authorized by Section 2155.386, Government Code. The allocation of 5 funds under this subsection is made in accordance with an equitable 6 7 formula consisting of the following elements: space deficit, facilities condition, institutional complexity, 8 separate 9 allocations for medical units and the Texas State Technical College 10 System, and an additional allocation for Texas Southern University for compliance with the Texas Desegregation Plan. The amounts 11 allocated by the formula are as follows: 12

3 SECTION 9. Section 62.055(b), Education Code, is amended to 4 read as follows:

5 (b) Subsection (a) does not apply to the distribution of 6 money from the Texas excellence fund for the state fiscal biennium 7 ending August 31, 2003. Notwithstanding any other provision of 8 this subchapter, for each fiscal year of the state fiscal biennium 9 ending August 31, 2003, the comptroller shall distribute the money 10 in the fund among the following general academic teaching 11 institutions as follows:

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8 SECTION 10. Section 411.050, Government Code, is amended to 9 read as follows:

Sec. 411.050. CRIME STATISTIC MAPPING. The department, in conjunction with [Southwest] Texas State University<u>--San Marcos</u>, may annually produce maps of the state that include information regarding crime statistics correlated with the various regions of the state.

SECTION 11. (a) The name of Southwest Texas State
University is changed to Texas State University--San Marcos.

17 (b) A reference in law to Southwest Texas State University
18 means Texas State University--San Marcos.

(c) An appropriation for the use and benefit of Southwest
Texas State University is available for the use and benefit of Texas
State University--San Marcos.

22 (d) The board of regents of the Texas State University 23 System and Southwest Texas State University shall ensure that the 24 change of the name made by this Act is implemented with as little 25 unnecessary cost as possible. The university shall, to the maximum 26 extent practicable, use all stationery and other consumable 27 supplies that are printed with the institution's former name and

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2 SECTION 12. This Act takes effect September 1, 2003.
