AN ACT

- 2 relating to teacher retention demonstration projects in public
- 3 schools.
- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
- 5 SECTION 1. Subchapter J, Chapter 21, Education Code, is
- 6 amended by adding Section 21.459 to read as follows:
- 7 Sec. 21.459. TEACHER RETENTION DEMONSTRATION PROJECTS. (a)
- 8 In this section, "charter school" means an open-enrollment charter
- 9 school or a college or university charter school established under
- 10 Subchapter E, Chapter 12.
- 11 (b) From funds appropriated to the agency for purposes of
- 12 this section, the commissioner may provide grants to school
- 13 <u>districts</u> and charter schools to design and implement teacher
- 14 retention demonstration projects that employ innovative,
- 15 research-based practices to identify and retain highly effective
- 16 teachers.
- 17 (c) A school district or charter school may use funds
- 18 <u>received under this section to:</u>
- 19 <u>(1) implement teacher recruitment and selection</u>
- 20 strategies focused on attracting new and experienced teachers who
- 21 have deep content knowledge and a commitment to long-term
- 22 participation in the teaching profession;
- 23 (2) implement alternative certification programs that
- 24 prepare individuals who have deep content knowledge and outstanding

- 1 <u>academic or professional achievement for long-term participation</u>
- 2 in the teaching profession;
- 3 (3) implement induction and mentoring programs that
- 4 incorporate research-based practices, including common planning
- 5 times and collaboration among new and experienced teachers;
- 6 (4) implement campus governance models that engage
- 7 teachers in leading campus management activities, including
- 8 student assessment data analysis, professional development
- 9 planning, instructional coaching, and resource allocation;
- 10 (5) implement differentiated compensation plans that
- 11 address teaching shortages in specific subject areas,
- 12 instructional weaknesses at underperforming campuses, limited
- 13 <u>advanced academic course offerings</u>, or other critical needs
- identified by the district or charter school; or
- 15 (6) to the extent approved by the commissioner,
- 16 implement other research-based strategies designed to improve
- 17 teacher retention rates.
- 18 (d) The commissioner shall develop and implement an
- 19 evaluation plan to identify the teacher retention demonstration
- 20 projects most effective in increasing the retention of effective
- 21 <u>teachers</u>. The evaluation must include an analysis of the
- 22 relationship between specific teacher preparation models and
- 23 <u>teacher effectiveness and retention</u>. The commissioner shall
- 24 disseminate evaluation findings through a statewide communication
- 25 initiative.
- 26 SECTION 2. This Act applies beginning with the 2006-2007
- 27 school year.

SECTION 3. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this Act takes effect on the 91st day after the last day of the legislative session.
