## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1 AN ACT

- 2 relating to a bill of rights for the poor.
- 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
- 4 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE. This Act shall be known as the Bill
- 5 of Rights for the Poor.
- 6 SECTION 2. GENERAL POLICY AND PURPOSE. (a) It is the
- 7 policy of this state that:
- 8 (1) all forms of human oppression be dismantled; and
- 9 (2) all people, especially the poor, have the right to
- 10 pursue life, liberty, and happiness without institutional
- 11 barriers.
- 12 (b) The legislature finds that racism, sexism, classism,
- 13 imperialism, and discrimination against disabled people must be
- 14 addressed and eliminated if the poor are to escape impoverishment.
- 15 SECTION 3. ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITY. (a) The legislature
- 16 finds that the poor have a right to a public policy agenda that
- invests in human beings.
- 18 (b) The legislature intends that:
- 19 (1) "communities of opportunity" be created for the
- 20 purpose of eliminating all forms of economic predators that
- 21 preclude economic development in areas of this state in which there
- 22 has been historic neglect and economic apartheid;
- 23 (2) federal, state, and local resources be made
- 24 available to community-based groups and other persons that create

- 1 economic opportunity in communities of opportunity; and
- 2 (3) partnerships between corporate and
- 3 community-based groups that open doors of opportunity and invest in
- 4 the poor should be encouraged and rewarded.
- 5 (c) The legislature recognizes that creation of communities
- of opportunity will necessitate a comprehensive economic policy on
- 7 the national, state, and local levels that places the interests of
- 8 people in need over the interest of corporate greed.
- 9 (d) The legislature declares that it is necessary to
- 10 regulate corporations to:
- 11 (1) end the transfer of jobs out of this state and the
- 12 country;
- 13 (2) prohibit the closing of plants and business
- 14 headquarters without a public hearing; and
- 15 (3) ensure compensation for those who suffer job loss.
- SECTION 4. RIGHTS OF CHILDREN. (a) The legislature finds
- 17 that:
- 18 (1) one in every six children in the United States is a
- 19 victim of poverty; and
- 20 (2) one in every three children of color is growing up
- 21 in poverty.
- 22 (b) It is the intent of the legislature that each child in
- 23 this state have access to quality health care, education, and
- 24 housing and live in a safe community.
- 25 SECTION 5. CIVIL AND CRIMINAL JUSTICE; LAW ENFORCEMENT.
- 26 (a) It is the policy of this state that all people have a right to
- 27 equal protection under the law, and, to that end, the poor must be

- 1 protected from injustice in the legal system.
- 2 (b) The legislature finds that the poor are often warehoused
- 3 in the nation's prison industrial complex, which has become the
- 4 21st century's version of slavery. It is the policy of this state
- 5 that the poor be guaranteed competent representation and equal
- 6 justice and be assured of justice in civil and criminal courts of
- 7 this state.
- 8 (c) The legislature recognizes that the poor must be
- 9 protected from state-sponsored terrorism in the form of police
- 10 brutality and that the poor have a right to be protected and served,
- 11 as opposed to being abused and exploited. Therefore, it is the
- 12 intent of the legislature that:
- 13 (1) unequivocal civilian control exist over
- 14 neighborhoods;
- 15 (2) citizen review boards with the power to discipline
- 16 police abuse and misconduct be established; and
- 17 (3) a partnership for the elimination of crime and
- 18 violence in impoverished communities be established between the
- 19 police and community-based groups.
- 20 SECTION 6. EMPLOYMENT AND INCOME. The legislature finds
- 21 and declares that the poor have the right to full employment and a
- 22 guaranteed income that enables them to rise above the poverty
- 23 level. Therefore, the legislature pledges to:
- 24 (1) support investment in community-based and
- 25 cooperating partnerships that generate jobs; and
- 26 (2) make a concentrated effort to bring jobs and
- opportunity to areas of concentrated unemployment in this state.

- 1 SECTION 7. RACIAL AND SEXUAL EQUALITY. (a) It is the
- 2 policy of this state that:
- 3 (1) the poor not be victimized by inequality of
- 4 opportunity; and
- 5 (2) women be legally protected from:
- 6 (A) sexual harassment and abuse in the workplace;
- 7 and
- 8 (B) domestic violence.
- 9 (b) The legislature intends that equal pay for women and
- 10 people of color should exist in this state.
- 11 SECTION 8. ENVIRONMENTAL EQUALITY. (a) The legislature
- 12 finds that:
- 13 (1) an unhealthy economic community has repercussions
- on the physical and mental health of that community's residents;
- 15 and
- 16 (2) thousands of African Americans, Latinos, and
- 17 Anglos are dying needlessly and prematurely as toxic chemicals are
- 18 released into the air and the drinking water of impoverished
- 19 communities.
- 20 (b) The legislature recognizes that the poor must be
- 21 protected from environmental racism that disproportionately
- 22 targets impoverished communities with toxic waste sites and other
- 23 elements that adversely affect the atmosphere and health of persons
- 24 in those communities.
- 25 (c) It is the intent of the legislature that:
- 26 (1) toxic waste sites be cleaned up immediately; and
- 27 (2) environmentally unsafe facilities in impoverished

- 1 communities that have been victimized by environmental racism be
- 2 cleaned up, removed, or replaced.
- 3 SECTION 9. SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT. (a) The legislature
- 4 finds that the health of the poor is often compromised by:
- 5 (1) the proliferation of drugs that are allowed into
- 6 impoverished communities; and
- 7 (2) a lack of substance abuse treatment.
- 8 (b) It is the policy of this state that the poor have a right
- 9 to substance abuse treatment and that substance abuse treatment,
- 10 rather than incarceration, be the first response to substance
- 11 abuse.
- 12 SECTION 10. HEALTH CARE SERVICES. (a) The legislature
- 13 finds that the poor have a right to quality health care that is
- 14 affordable.
- 15 (b) The legislature recognizes that:
- 16 (1) the health of the nation is compromised when
- 17 pockets of poverty breed ill health; and
- 18 (2) this state can no longer afford to ignore the
- 19 economic maladies that end the lives of individuals who have no
- 20 access to health care.
- 21 (c) It is the intent of the legislature to make available
- 22 affordable quality health care services and affordable hospitals in
- 23 neglected and impoverished communities.
- 24 SECTION 11. FOREIGN POLICY. The legislature declares that:
- 25 (1) oppressed people all over the world should be
- liberated and empowered; and
- 27 (2) the foreign policy of the United States should be

- 1 based on justice and freedom and should ensure the elimination of
- 2 economic exploitation of impoverished people throughout the world.
- 3 SECTION 12. This Act takes effect immediately if it
- 4 receives a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each
- 5 house, as provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution.
- 6 If this Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate
- 7 effect, this Act takes effect on the 91st day after the last day of
- 8 the legislative session.
