A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1	AN ACT

- 2 relating to peace officers commissioned and employed to perform
- 3 duties at correctional facilities.
- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
- 5 SECTION 1. Chapter 361, Local Government Code, is amended
- 6 by adding Subchapter H to read as follows:

7 SUBCHAPTER H. CORRECTIONAL PEACE OFFICERS

- 8 Sec. 361.121. CORRECTIONAL PEACE OFFICERS. (a) A sheriff
- 9 or the head of a municipal law enforcement agency may commission and
- 10 employ correctional peace officers to make arrests, prevent or
- abate the commission of offenses, and perform other assigned duties
- 12 at correctional facilities operated by the county or municipality,
- 13 <u>as appropriate</u>.
- 14 (b) A peace officer commissioned under this section must
- 15 maintain a peace officer license issued under Chapter 1701,
- 16 Occupations Code.
- 17 SECTION 2. Article 2.12, Code of Criminal Procedure, as
- amended by Chapters 235, 474, and 930, Acts of the 78th Legislature,
- 19 Regular Session, 2003, is reenacted and amended to read as follows:
- 20 Art. 2.12. WHO ARE PEACE OFFICERS. The following are peace
- 21 officers:
- 22 (1) sheriffs, their deputies, and those reserve
- 23 deputies who hold a permanent peace officer license issued under
- 24 Chapter 1701, Occupations Code;

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- 1 (2) constables, deputy constables, and those reserve
- 2 deputy constables who hold a permanent peace officer license issued
- 3 under Chapter 1701, Occupations Code;
- 4 (3) marshals or police officers of an incorporated
- 5 city, town, or village, and those reserve municipal police officers
- 6 who hold a permanent peace officer license issued under Chapter
- 7 1701, Occupations Code;
- 8 (4) rangers and officers commissioned by the Public
- 9 Safety Commission and the Director of the Department of Public
- 10 Safety;
- 11 (5) investigators of the district attorneys', criminal
- 12 district attorneys', and county attorneys' offices;
- 13 (6) law enforcement agents of the Texas Alcoholic
- 14 Beverage Commission;
- 15 (7) each member of an arson investigating unit
- 16 commissioned by a city, a county, or the state;
- 17 (8) officers commissioned under Section 37.081,
- 18 Education Code, or Subchapter E, Chapter 51, Education Code;
- 19 (9) officers commissioned by the General Services
- 20 Commission;
- 21 (10) law enforcement officers commissioned by the
- 22 Parks and Wildlife Commission;
- 23 (11) airport police officers commissioned by a city
- with a population of more than 1.18 million that operates an airport
- 25 that serves commercial air carriers;
- 26 (12) airport security personnel commissioned as peace
- 27 officers by the governing body of any political subdivision of this

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- 1 state, other than a city described by Subdivision (11), that
- 2 operates an airport that serves commercial air carriers;
- 3 (13) municipal park and recreational patrolmen and
- 4 security officers;
- 5 (14) security officers and investigators commissioned
- 6 as peace officers by the comptroller;
- 7 (15) officers commissioned by a water control and
- 8 improvement district under Section 49.216, Water Code;
- 9 (16) officers commissioned by a board of trustees
- 10 under Chapter 54, Transportation Code;
- 11 (17) investigators commissioned by the Texas State
- 12 Board of Medical Examiners;
- 13 (18) officers commissioned by the board of managers of
- 14 the Dallas County Hospital District, the Tarrant County Hospital
- 15 District, or the Bexar County Hospital District under Section
- 16 281.057, Health and Safety Code;
- 17 (19) county park rangers commissioned under
- 18 Subchapter E, Chapter 351, Local Government Code;
- 19 (20) investigators employed by the Texas Racing
- 20 Commission;
- 21 (21) officers commissioned under Chapter 554,
- 22 Occupations Code;
- 23 (22) officers commissioned by the governing body of a
- 24 metropolitan rapid transit authority under Section 451.108,
- 25 Transportation Code, or by a regional transportation authority
- under Section 452.110, Transportation Code;
- 27 (23) investigators commissioned by the attorney

- 1 general under Section 402.009, Government Code;
- 2 (24) security officers and investigators commissioned
- 3 as peace officers under Chapter 466, Government Code;
- 4 (25) an officer employed by the Texas Department of
- 5 Health under Section 431.2471, Health and Safety Code;
- 6 (26) officers appointed by an appellate court under
- 7 Subchapter F, Chapter 53, Government Code;
- 8 (27) officers commissioned by the state fire marshal
- 9 under Chapter 417, Government Code;
- 10 (28) an investigator commissioned by the commissioner
- of insurance under Article 1.10D, Insurance Code;
- 12 (29) apprehension specialists commissioned by the
- 13 Texas Youth Commission as officers under Section 61.0931, Human
- 14 Resources Code;
- 15 (30) officers appointed by the executive director of
- 16 the Texas Department of Criminal Justice under Section 493.019,
- 17 Government Code;
- 18 (31) investigators commissioned by the Commission on
- 19 Law Enforcement Officer Standards and Education under Section
- 20 1701.160, Occupations Code;
- 21 (32) commission investigators commissioned by the
- 22 Texas Commission on Private Security under Section 1702.061(f),
- 23 Occupations Code;
- 24 (33) the fire marshal $[\tau]$ and any officers, inspectors,
- or investigators commissioned by an emergency services district [to
- 26 assist that fire marshal, under [Subchapter F,] Chapter 775,
- 27 Health and Safety Code; [and]

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- 1 (34) officers commissioned by the State Board of
- 2 Dental Examiners under Section 254.013, Occupations Code, subject
- 3 to the limitations imposed by that section; and
- 4 (35) correctional peace officers commissioned by a
- 5 sheriff or the head of a municipal law enforcement agency under
- 6 Section 361.121, Local Government Code.
- 7 SECTION 3. This Act takes effect September 1, 2005.
