## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT

- 2 relating to admission to certain public institutions of higher 3 education.
- BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: 4
- 5 SECTION 1. Section 33.007(b), Education Code, is amended to read as follows: 6
- (b) During the first school year a student is enrolled in a 7 high school or at the high school level in an open-enrollment 8 charter school, and again during a student's senior year, a 9
- counselor shall provide information about higher education to the 10
- 11 student and the student's parent or guardian. The information must
- 12 include information regarding:
- 13 (1)the importance of higher education;
- 14 (2) the advantages of completing the recommended or
- advanced high school program adopted under Section 28.025(a); the disadvantages of taking courses to prepare for 16
- a high school equivalency examination relative to the benefits of 17
- taking courses leading to a high school diploma; 18
- (4) financial aid eligibility; 19
- (5) instruction on how to apply for federal financial 20
- 21 aid;

- (6) the center for financial aid information 22
- 23 established under Section 61.0776;
- (7) the automatic admission of certain 24

- 1 general academic teaching institutions as provided by Section
- $2 \frac{51.803}{}$  and
- (7) [(8)] the eligibility and academic performance
- 4 requirements for the TEXAS Grant as provided by Subchapter M,
- 5 Chapter 56[, as added by Chapter 1590, Acts of the 76th Legislature,
- 6 Regular Session, 1999].
- 7 SECTION 2. The heading to Section 51.805, Education Code,
- 8 is amended to read as follows:
- 9 Sec. 51.805. UNDERGRADUATE [OTHER] ADMISSIONS.
- SECTION 3. Sections 51.805(a) and (b), Education Code, are
- 11 amended to read as follows:
- 12 (a) [A graduating student who does not qualify for admission
- 13 under Section 51.803 or 51.804 may apply to any general academic
- 14 teaching institution.
- 15 [(b) The general academic teaching institution, after
- 16 admitting students under Sections 51.803 and 51.804, shall admit
- 17 other applicants for admission as undergraduate students.] It is
- 18 the intent of the legislature that all institutions of higher
- 19 education pursue academic excellence by considering students'
- 20 academic achievements in decisions related to admissions.
- 21 <u>(b)</u> Because of changing demographic trends, diversity, and
- 22 population increases in the state, each general academic teaching
- 23 institution shall also consider all of, any of, or a combination of
- 24 the following socioeconomic indicators or factors in making
- 25 first-time freshman admissions decisions:
- 26 (1) the applicant's academic record;
- 27 (2) the socioeconomic background of the applicant,

- 1 including the percentage by which the applicant's family is above
- 2 or below any recognized measure of poverty, the applicant's
- 3 household income, and the applicant's parents' level of education;
- 4 (3) whether the applicant would be the first
- 5 generation of the applicant's family to attend or graduate from an
- 6 institution of higher education;
- 7 (4) whether the applicant has bilingual proficiency;
- 8 (5) the financial status of the applicant's school
- 9 district;
- 10 (6) the performance level of the applicant's school as
- 11 determined by the school accountability criteria used by the Texas
- 12 Education Agency;
- 13 (7) the applicant's responsibilities while attending
- 14 school, including whether the applicant has been employed, whether
- 15 the applicant has helped to raise children, or other similar
- 16 factors;
- 17 (8) the applicant's region of residence;
- 18 (9) whether the applicant is a resident of a rural or
- 19 urban area or a resident of a central city or suburban area in the
- 20 state;
- 21 (10) the applicant's performance on standardized
- 22 tests;
- 23 (11) the applicant's performance on standardized tests
- 24 in comparison with that of other students from similar
- 25 socioeconomic backgrounds;
- 26 (12) whether the applicant attended any school while
- 27 the school was under a court-ordered desegregation plan;

- 1 (13) the applicant's involvement in community
- 2 activities;
- 3 (14) the applicant's extracurricular activities;
- 4 (15) the applicant's commitment to a particular field
- 5 of study;
- 6 (16) the applicant's personal interview;
- 7 (17) the applicant's admission to a comparable
- 8 accredited out-of-state institution; and
- 9 (18) any other consideration the institution
- 10 considers necessary to accomplish the institution's stated
- 11 mission.
- 12 SECTION 4. Section 51.806, Education Code, is amended to
- 13 read as follows:
- 14 Sec. 51.806. REPORT TO COORDINATING BOARD. Each general
- 15 academic teaching institution shall provide a report annually to
- 16 the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board describing the
- 17 composition of the entering class of students admitted under this
- 18 subchapter. The report must [shall] include a demographic
- 19 breakdown, including a breakdown by race, ethnicity, and economic
- 20 status, of the students admitted under this subchapter [Sections
- 21 <del>51.803, 51.804, and 51.805</del>].
- SECTION 5. Section 51.842(a), Education Code, is amended to
- 23 read as follows:
- 24 (a) A graduate or professional program of a general academic
- 25 teaching institution or medical or dental unit may consider the
- 26 following factors in making an admissions or scholarship decision
- 27 for admissions into or competitive scholarships for the graduate or

- professional program:
- 2 (1) an applicant's academic record as a high school
- 3 student and undergraduate student;
- 4 (2) the socioeconomic background of the applicant
- 5 while the applicant attended elementary and secondary school and
- 6 was an undergraduate student, including any change in that
- 7 background;
- 8 (3) whether the applicant would be the first
- 9 generation of the applicant's family to attend or graduate from an
- 10 undergraduate program or from a graduate or professional program;
- 11 (4) whether the applicant has multilingual
- 12 proficiency;
- 13 (5) the applicant's responsibilities while attending
- 14 elementary and secondary school and as an undergraduate student,
- including whether the applicant was employed, whether the applicant
- 16 helped to raise children, and other similar factors;
- 17 (6) to achieve geographic diversity, the applicant's
- 18 region of residence at the time of application and, if the applicant
- 19 graduated from a public high school in this state within the
- 20 preceding 20 years, the region in which the applicant's school
- 21 district is located;
- 22 (7) the applicant's involvement in community
- 23 activities;
- 24 (8) the applicant's demonstrated commitment to a
- 25 particular field of study;
- 26 (9) for admission into a professional program, the
- 27 current comparative availability of members of that profession in

- 1 the applicant's region of residence while the applicant attended
- 2 elementary and secondary school;
- 3 [(10) whether the applicant was automatically
- 4 admitted to a general academic teaching institution as an
- 5 undergraduate student under Section 51.803; and
- 6 (10) [(11)] the applicant's personal interview.
- 7 SECTION 6. Sections 28.026, 51.803, 51.804, and 51.8045,
- 8 Education Code, are repealed.
- 9 SECTION 7. The change in law made by this Act applies
- 10 beginning with admissions to a general academic teaching
- 11 institution for the 2006-2007 academic year. Admissions for an
- 12 academic period preceding that academic year are covered by the law
- in effect immediately before the effective date of this Act, and the
- 14 prior law is continued in effect for that purpose.
- SECTION 8. This Act takes effect September 1, 2005.
