SECTION 6. (a) The county judges for Baylor, Cottle, King, and Knox Counties shall transfer any criminal case described by Section 24.152(b), Government Code, as amended by this Act, that is pending in a county court in Baylor, Cottle, King, or Knox County on the effective date of this Act to the district court for the 50th Judicial District.

(b) When a case is transferred from one court to another as provided by Subsection (a) of this section, all processes, writs, bonds, recognizances, or other obligations issued from the transferring court are returnable to the court to which the case is transferred as if originally issued by that court. The obligees in

all bonds and recognizances taken in and for a court from which a
case is transferred, and all witnesses summoned to appear in a court
from which a case is transferred, are required to appear before the
court to which a case is transferred as if originally required to
appear before the court to which the transfer is made.
SECTION 7. This Act takes effect September 1, 2005.
