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## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED 1 AN ACT 2 relating to authorizing the issuance of revenue bonds or other obligations to fund capital projects at public institutions of 3 higher education. 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: 5 SECTION 1. THE TEXAS A&M UNIVERSITY SYSTEM; ADDITIONAL 10 11 BONDS. (a) In addition to the other authority granted by this 12 subchapter, the board of regents of The Texas A&M University System may acquire, purchase, construct, improve, renovate, enlarge, or 13 14 equip facilities, including roads and related infrastructure, for projects to be financed through the issuance of bonds in accordance 15 16 with this subchapter and in accordance with a systemwide revenue financing program adopted by the board for the following 17 18 institutions not to exceed the following aggregate principal amounts for the projects specified as follows: 19 20 (1) Prairie View A&M University: 21 (A) \$3,656,390 for a solar observatory; and (B) \$9,946,577 for the Child and Family 22 23 Development Center; (2) Tarleton State University: 24

THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS SYSTEM; ADDITIONAL BONDS. (a) In addition to the other authority granted by this 5 6 subchapter, the board of regents of The University of Texas System 7 may acquire, purchase, construct, improve, renovate, enlarge, or equip facilities, including roads and related infrastructure, for 8 projects to be financed through the issuance of bonds in accordance 9 with this subchapter and in accordance with a systemwide revenue 10 financing program adopted by the board for the following 11 12 institutions not to exceed the following aggregate principal amounts for the projects specified as follows: 13 14 (1) The University of Texas at Arlington, \$76,600,000 15 for educational and related facilities, including an Engineering Research Building and the renovation of three engineering 16 17 facilities; (2) The University of Texas at Austin, \$75 million for 18 19 the Experimental Science Building; (3) The University of Texas at Brownsville, 20 21 \$46,300,000 for educational and related facilities, including a classroom, laboratory, and office building; 22 (4) The University of Texas at Dallas, \$55 million for 23 educational and related facilities, including an administration 24 25 building and renovation of Green Hall and Jonsson Hall; 26 (5) The University of Texas at El Paso: 27 (A) \$65 million for educational and related

15 Sec. 55.1753. UNIVERSITY OF HOUSTON SYSTEM; ADDITIONAL 16 BONDS. (a) In addition to the other authority granted by this subchapter, the board of regents of the University of Houston 17 System may acquire, purchase, construct, improve, renovate, 18 enlarge, or equip facilities, including roads and related 19 infrastructure, for the following institutions, to be financed 20 21 through the issuance of bonds in accordance with this subchapter and in accordance with a systemwide revenue financing program 22 adopted by the board, in aggregate principal amounts not to exceed 23 24 the following: 25 (1) the University of Houston, \$60 million; 26 (2) the University of Houston--Downtown, \$30 million;

(3) the University of Houston--Clear Lake, \$38 27

The amount of a pledge 7 made under this subsection may not be reduced or abrogated while the bonds for which the pledge is made, or bonds issued to refund those 8 9 bonds, are outstanding. (c) If sufficient funds are not available to the board to 10

meet its obligations under this section, the board may transfer funds among institutions, branches, and entities of the University of Houston System to ensure the most equitable and efficient allocation of available resources for each institution, branch, or entity to carry out its duties and purposes.

Sec. 55.1754. TEXAS STATE UNIVERSITY SYSTEM; ADDITIONAL 16 17 BONDS. (a) In addition to the other authority granted by this subchapter, the board of regents of the Texas State University 18 System may acquire, purchase, construct, improve, renovate, 19 enlarge, or equip facilities, including roads and related 20 21 infrastructure, for projects to be financed through the issuance of bonds in accordance with this subchapter and in accordance with a 22 systemwide revenue financing program adopted by the board for the 23 24 following institutions not to exceed the following aggregate 25 principal amounts for the projects specified as follows:

26	bonds for which the pledge is made, or bonds issued to refund those

1 (c) If sufficient funds are not available to the board to 2 meet its obligations under this section, the board may transfer 3 funds among institutions, branches, and entities of the Texas State 4 University System to ensure the most equitable and efficient 5 allocation of available resources for each institution, branch, or 6 entity to carry out its duties and purposes.

7 Sec. 55.1755. UNIVERSITY OF NORTH TEXAS SYSTEM; ADDITIONAL BONDS. (a) In addition to the other authority granted by this 8 9 subchapter, the board of regents of the University of North Texas System may acquire, purchase, construct, improve, renovate, 10 enlarge, or equip facilities, including roads and related 11 12 infrastructure, for projects to be financed through the issuance of bonds in accordance with this subchapter and in accordance with a 13 14 systemwide revenue financing program adopted by the board for the 15 following institutions not to exceed the following aggregate principal amounts for the projects specified as follows: 16

17 (1) the University of North Texas, \$94 million for 18 educational and support facilities; and

19 (2) the University of North Texas Health Science
 20 Center at Fort Worth, \$42,100,000 for campus expansion and
 21 construction of a public health education building.

(b) The board may pledge irrevocably to the payment of bonds authorized by this section all or any part of the revenue funds of an institution, branch, or entity of the University of North Texas System, including student tuition charges. The amount of a pledge made under this subsection may not be reduced or abrogated while the bonds for which the pledge is made, or bonds issued to refund those

1 bonds, are outstanding.

(c) If sufficient funds are not available to the board to meet its obligations under this section, the board may transfer funds among institutions, branches, and entities of the University of North Texas System to ensure the most equitable and efficient allocation of available resources for each institution, branch, or entity to carry out its duties and purposes.

Sec. 55.1756. TEXAS WOMAN'S UNIVERSITY. (a) In addition to 8 the other authority granted by this subchapter, the board of 9 regents of Texas Woman's University may acquire, purchase, 10 construct, improve, renovate, enlarge, or equip facilities, 11 12 including roads and related infrastructure, for Texas Woman's University, to be financed through the issuance of bonds in 13 14 accordance with this subchapter in an aggregate principal amount 15 not to exceed \$44,500,000.

16 (b) The board may pledge irrevocably to the payment of bonds authorized by this section all or any part of the revenue funds of Texas Woman's University, including student tuition charges. The amount of a pledge made under this subsection may not be reduced or abrogated while the bonds for which the pledge is made, or bonds issued to refund those bonds, are outstanding.

22 <u>Sec. 55.1757. MIDWESTERN STATE UNIVERSITY; ADDITIONAL</u> 23 <u>BONDS. (a) In addition to the other authority granted by this</u> 24 <u>subchapter, the board of regents of Midwestern State University may</u> 25 <u>issue bonds in accordance with this subchapter in an aggregate</u> 26 <u>principal amount not to exceed \$10,395,000 to finance utility</u> 27 <u>infrastructure and campus renovations at Midwestern State</u>

## 1 <u>University</u>.

(b) The board may pledge irrevocably to the payment of bonds authorized by this section all or any part of the revenue funds of Midwestern State University, including student tuition charges. The amount of a pledge made under this subsection may not be reduced or abrogated while the bonds for which the pledge is made, or bonds issued to refund those bonds, are outstanding.

Sec. 55.1758. STEPHEN F. AUSTIN STATE UNIVERSITY. (a) In 8 9 addition to the other authority granted by this subchapter, the board of regents of Stephen F. Austin State University may acquire, 10 purchase, construct, improve, renovate, enlarge, or equip 11 12 facilities, including roads and related infrastructure, at Stephen F. Austin University, to be financed through the issuance of bonds 13 14 in accordance with this subchapter in an aggregate principal 15 amount not to exceed \$65,450,000.

16 (b) The board may pledge irrevocably to the payment of bonds 17 authorized by this section all or any part of the revenue funds of 18 Stephen F. Austin State University, including student tuition 19 charges. The amount of a pledge made under this subsection may not 20 be reduced or abrogated while the bonds for which the pledge is 21 made, or bonds issued to refund those bonds, are outstanding.

22 <u>Sec. 55.1759. TEXAS TECH UNIVERSITY SYSTEM; ADDITIONAL</u> 23 <u>BONDS. (a) In addition to the other authority granted by this</u> 24 <u>subchapter, the board of regents of the Texas Tech University</u> 25 <u>System may acquire, purchase, construct, improve, renovate,</u> 26 <u>enlarge, or equip facilities, including roads and related</u> 27 <u>infrastructure, for projects to be financed through the issuance of</u>

The amount of a pledge made under this subsection may not be reduced or abrogated while the 23 24 bonds for which the pledge is made, or bonds issued to refund those 25 bonds, are outstanding. (c) If sufficient funds are not available to the board to 26 meet its obligations under this section, the board may transfer 27

funds among institutions, branches, and entities of the Texas Tech University System to ensure the most equitable and efficient allocation of available resources for each institution, branch, or

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Sec. 55.17591. TEXAS SOUTHERN UNIVERSITY; ADDITIONAL 5 6 BONDS. (a) In addition to the other authority granted by this subchapter, the board of regents of Texas Southern University may 7 acquire, purchase, construct, improve, renovate, enlarge, or equip 8 facilities, including roads and related infrastructure, for a 9 multipurpose university center, a fine arts building, a building 10 for the school of technology, the Robert J. Terry Library, and 11 12 deferred maintenance of campus facilities and infrastructure, to be financed through the issuance of bonds in accordance with this 13 14 subchapter in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$109,560,000. 15

a county with a population of more than 2.2 million;

1 (I) a hospital district in a county that has a 2 population of more than two million; 3 (J) а nonprofit corporation organized to 4 exercise the powers of a higher education authority under Section 5 53.47(e), Education Code; 6 (K) a county with a population of 3.3 million or 7 more; 8 (L) an independent school district that has an average daily attendance of 50,000 or more as determined under 9 Section 42.005, Education Code; 10 (M) a municipality or county operating under 11 Chapter 334, Local Government Code; [or] 12 (N) a district created under Chapter 335, Local 13 14 Government Code; or 15 (O) a junior college district that has a total 16 headcount enrollment of 40,000 or more based on enrollment in the 17 most recent regular semester. SECTION 5. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives 18 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as 19 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this 20 21 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this Act takes effect September 1, 2005. 22

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
