1 AN ACT

- 2 relating to the membership and powers and duties of the Texas
- 3 Military Preparedness Commission.
- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
- 5 SECTION 1. Section 436.051, Government Code, as renumbered
- from Section 436.003, Government Code, by Section 3, Chapter 149,
- 7 Acts of the 78th Legislature, Regular Session, 2003, and Section
- 8 436.003, Government Code, as amended by Section 8, Chapter 1328,
- 9 Acts of the 78th Legislature, Regular Session, 2003, are reenacted
- 10 and amended to read as follows:
- 11 Sec. 436.051. COMPOSITION; ELIGIBILITY. (a) The
- 12 commission is composed of:
- 13 (1) 13 [nine] public members, appointed by the
- 14 governor; and
- 15 (2) the following ex officio members:
- 16 (A) the chair of the committee of the Texas House
- 17 of Representatives that has primary jurisdiction of matters
- 18 concerning defense affairs and state-federal relations; and
- 19 (B) one member of the Texas Senate appointed by
- 20 the lieutenant governor.
- (b) To be eligible for appointment as a public member to the
- commission, a person must have demonstrated experience in economic
- 23 development, the defense industry, military installation
- operation, environmental issues, finance, local government, or the

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- 1 use of airspace or outer space for future military missions.
- 2 (c) Appointments to the commission shall be made without
- 3 regard to the race, color, disability, sex, religion, age, or
- 4 national origin of the appointee.
- 5 SECTION 2. Section 436.052(a), Government Code, is amended
- 6 to read as follows:
- 7 (a) The 13 [nine] public members of the commission serve
- 8 staggered terms of six years with the terms of <u>four or five</u>
- 9 [one-third of the] members expiring February 1 of each odd-numbered
- 10 year. A legislative member vacates the person's position on the
- 11 commission if the person ceases to be the chair of the applicable
- 12 legislative committee.
- SECTION 3. Section 436.101, Government Code, is amended to
- 14 read as follows:
- 15 Sec. 436.101. POWERS AND DUTIES OF COMMISSION. The
- 16 commission shall:
- 17 (1) advise the governor and the legislature on
- 18 military issues and economic and industrial development related to
- 19 military issues;
- 20 (2) make recommendations regarding:
- 21 (A) the development of policies and plans to
- 22 support the long-term viability and prosperity of the military,
- 23 active and civilian, in this state, including promoting strategic
- 24 regional alliances that may extend over state lines; and
- 25 (B) [the development of methods to improve
- 26 private and public employment opportunities for former members of
- 27 the military residing in this state; and

- 1 $\left[\frac{\text{(C)}}{\text{)}}\right]$ the development of methods to assist
- 2 defense-dependent communities in the design and execution of
- 3 programs that enhance a community's relationship with military
- 4 installations and defense-related businesses;
- 5 (3) [develop and maintain a database of the names and
- 6 public business information of all prime contractors and
- 7 subcontractors operating in this state who perform defense-related
- 8 work;
- 9 $\left[\frac{(4)}{1}\right]$ provide information to communities, the
- 10 legislature, the state's congressional delegation, and state
- 11 agencies regarding federal actions affecting military
- 12 installations and missions;
- (4) $[\frac{(5)}{}]$ serve as a clearinghouse for:
- 14 (A) defense economic adjustment and transition
- 15 information and activities along with the Texas Business and
- 16 Community Economic Development Clearinghouse; and
- 17 (B) information about:
- 18 (i) issues related to the operating costs,
- 19 missions, and strategic value of federal military installations
- 20 located in the state;
- 21 (ii) employment issues for communities that
- depend on defense bases and in defense-related businesses; and
- 23 (iii) defense strategies and incentive
- 24 programs that other states are using to maintain, expand, and
- 25 attract new defense contractors;
- (5) $[\frac{(6)}{(6)}]$ provide assistance to communities that have
- 27 experienced a defense-related closure or realignment;

- 1 (6) $\left[\frac{(7)}{(7)}\right]$ assist communities in the design and execution of programs that enhance a community's relationship with 2 military installations and defense-related businesses, including 3 4 regional alliances that may extend over state lines; 5 (7) [(8)] assist communities in the retention and 6 recruiting of defense-related businesses, including fostering 7 strategic regional alliances that may extend over state lines; 8 [(9) prepare a biennial strategic plan that: 9 [(A) fosters the enhancement of military value of 10 the contributions of Texas military installations to national defense strategies; 11 [(B) considers all current and anticipated base 12 realignment and closure criteria; and 13 14 [(C) develops strategies to protect the state's 15 existing military missions and positions the state to be competitive for new and expanded military missions; and 16 17 (8) $[\frac{10}{10}]$ encourage economic development in this state by fostering the development of industries related to defense 18
- SECTION 4. Sections 436.103(b) and (d), Government Code, are amended to read as follows:

affairs.

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(b) Not later than July 1 of each <u>even-numbered</u> year, the commission shall prepare and submit a report to the governor and the legislature about the active military installations, communities that depend on military installations, and defense-related businesses in this state. <u>The commission may update the report in an odd-numbered year</u>. The report must include:

- 1 (1) an economic impact statement describing in detail
- 2 the effect of the military on the economy of this state;
- 3 (2) a statewide assessment of active military
- 4 installations and current missions;
- 5 (3) a statewide strategy to attract new military
- 6 missions and defense-related business and include specific actions
- 7 that add military value to existing military installations;
- 8 (4) a list of state and federal activities that have
- 9 significant impact on active military installations and current
- 10 missions;
- 11 (5) a statement identifying:
- 12 (A) the state and federal programs and services
- 13 that assist communities impacted by military base closures or
- 14 realignments and the efforts to coordinate those programs; and
- 15 (B) the efforts to coordinate state agency
- 16 programs and services that assist communities in retaining active
- 17 military installations and current missions;
- 18 (6) an evaluation of initiatives to retain existing
- 19 defense-related businesses; and
- 20 (7) a list of agencies with regulations, policies,
- 21 programs, or services that impact the operating costs or strategic
- 22 value of federal military installations and activities in the
- 23 state.
- 24 (d) The commission shall periodically meet [coordinate
- 25 annual meetings] with [the head of] each state agency that has
- 26 defense-related programs or is engaged in a project in a
- 27 defense-dependent community and with each [or] member of the

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- 1 legislature whose district contains an active, closed, or realigned
- 2 military installation to discuss defense-related issues and the
- 3 implementation of the recommendations outlined in the report
- 4 required under Subsection (b).
- 5 SECTION 5. The heading to Section 436.152, Government Code,
- 6 is amended to read as follows:
- 7 Sec. 436.152. ANALYSIS OF PROJECTS THAT ADD MILITARY VALUE;
- 8 FINANCING.
- 9 SECTION 6. Subchapter D, Chapter 436, Government Code, is
- amended by adding Section 436.1531 to read as follows:
- Sec. 436.1531. LOANS FOR COMMUNITIES ADVERSELY AFFECTED BY
- 12 DEFENSE BASE REDUCTION. (a) The commission may provide a loan of
- 13 <u>financial assistance to a defense community for an economic</u>
- 14 development project that minimizes the negative effects of a
- defense base reduction on the defense community. The loan shall be
- 16 <u>made from the Texas military value revolving loan account</u>
- 17 established under Section 436.156.
- 18 (b) On receiving an application for a loan under this
- 19 section, the commission shall evaluate the economic development
- 20 project to determine how the project will minimize the negative
- 21 effects of a defense base reduction on the defense community,
- 22 <u>including the number of jobs that the project will create and the</u>
- 23 <u>economic impact the project will have on the community.</u>
- (c) If the commission determines that a project will reduce
- 25 the negative effects of a defense base reduction on the defense
- 26 community, the commission shall:
- 27 (1) analyze the creditworthiness of the defense

- 1 community to determine the defense community's ability to repay the
- 2 loan; and
- 3 (2) evaluate the feasibility of the project to be
- 4 <u>financed to ensure that the defense community has pledged a source</u>
- of revenue or taxes sufficient to repay the loan for the project.
- 6 (d) If the commission determines that the funds will be used
- 7 to finance an economic development project that will reduce the
- 8 <u>negative effects of a defense base reduction on the defense</u>
- 9 community and that the project is financially feasible, the
- 10 commission may award a loan to the defense community for the
- 11 project. The commission shall enter into a written agreement with a
- 12 defense community that is awarded a loan. The agreement must
- 13 contain the terms and conditions of the loan, including the loan
- 14 repayment requirements.
- (e) The commission shall notify the Texas Public Finance
- 16 Authority of the amount of the loan and the recipient of the loan
- 17 and request the authority to issue general obligation bonds in an
- amount necessary to fund the loan. The commission and the authority
- 19 shall determine the amount and time of a bond issue to best provide
- 20 funds for one or multiple loans.
- 21 (f) The commission shall administer the loans to ensure full
- 22 repayment of the general obligation bonds issued to finance the
- 23 project.
- 24 (g) A project financed with a loan under this section must
- 25 be completed on or before the fifth anniversary of the date the loan
- 26 is awarded.
- 27 (h) The amount of a loan under this section may not exceed

- 1 the total cost of the project.
- 2 SECTION 7. Section 397.001(1), Local Government Code, is
- 3 amended to read as follows:
- 4 (1) "Defense base" means a federally owned or operated
- 5 military installation or facility that is presently functioning or
- 6 was closed as a result of the United States Department of Defense
- 7 <u>base realignment process</u>.
- 8 SECTION 8. Section 397.002(a), Local Government Code, is
- 9 amended to read as follows:
- 10 (a) A defense community that applies for financial
- 11 assistance from the Texas military value revolving loan account
- 12 under Section 436.153, Government Code, shall prepare, in
- 13 consultation with the authorities from each defense base associated
- 14 with the community, a defense base military value enhancement
- 15 statement that illustrates specific ways the funds will enhance the
- 16 military value of the installations and must include the following
- information for each project:
- 18 (1) the purpose for which financial assistance is
- 19 requested, including a description of the project;
- 20 (2) the source of other funds for the project;
- 21 (3) a statement on how the project will enhance the
- 22 military value of the installation;
- 23 (4) whether the defense community has coordinated the
- 24 project with authorities of the military installation and whether
- 25 any approval has been obtained from those authorities;
- 26 (5) whether any portion of the project is to occur on
- 27 the military installation;

- 1 (6) whether the project will have any negative impact
- 2 on the natural or cultural environment;
- 3 (7) a description of any known negative factors
- 4 arising from the project that will affect the community or the
- 5 military installation; and
- 6 (8) a description of how the project will address
- 7 future base realignment or closure.
- 8 SECTION 9. Chapter 397, Local Government Code, is amended
- 9 by adding Section 397.0021 to read as follows:
- 10 Sec. 397.0021. DEFENSE COMMUNITY ECONOMIC REDEVELOPMENT
- 11 VALUE STATEMENT. (a) A defense community that is adjacent to a
- 12 closed military installation and applies for financial assistance
- 13 from the Texas military value revolving loan account shall prepare
- 14 an economic redevelopment value statement that illustrates
- 15 specific ways the funds will be used to promote economic
- development in the community and include the following information
- 17 for each project:
- 18 (1) the purpose for which financial assistance is
- 19 requested, including a description of the project;
- 20 (2) the source of other funds for the project;
- 21 (3) a statement on how the project will promote
- 22 economic development in the community;
- 23 (4) whether any portion of the project is to occur on a
- 24 closed military installation;
- 25 (5) whether any approval has been obtained from those
- 26 authorities retaining or receiving title to that portion of the
- 27 closed installation to be affected by the project;

- 1 (6) whether the project will have any negative impact
- 2 on the natural or cultural environment; and
- 3 (7) a description of any known negative factors
- 4 arising from the project that will affect the defense community.
- 5 (b) The Texas Military Preparedness Commission may require
- 6 a defense community to provide any additional information the
- 7 commission requires to evaluate the community's request for
- 8 financial assistance under this section.
- 9 (c) Two or more defense communities near the same defense
- 10 base that apply for financial assistance from the Texas military
- 11 value revolving loan account may prepare a joint statement.
- 12 (d) A copy of the economic redevelopment value statement
- shall be distributed to the Texas Military Preparedness Commission
- 14 and any defense community which may be affected by the resulting
- 15 project.
- 16 (e) This section does not prohibit a defense community that
- is not applying for financial assistance from preparing an economic
- 18 redevelopment value statement under this section.
- 19 SECTION 10. (a) Not later than October 1, 2005, the
- 20 governor shall appoint the four additional public members of the
- 21 Texas Military Preparedness Commission as required by Section
- 436.051, Government Code, as amended by this Act. The governor
- 23 shall appoint:
- 24 (1) one public member to serve a term expiring
- 25 February 1, 2007;
- 26 (2) one public member to serve a term expiring
- 27 February 1, 2009; and

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- 1 (3) two public members to serve terms expiring
- 2 February 1, 2011.
- 3 (b) Until all of the members appointed under this section
- 4 have qualified for office, a quorum of the commission is a majority
- 5 of the number of members who have qualified for office.
- 6 SECTION 11. This Act takes effect September 1, 2005.
