RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, From 1945 to 1991, the world witnessed a military, economic, and ideological confrontation known as the Cold War; waged most prominently by the United States and the Soviet Union, the struggle involved almost every nation on earth to some degree and had a profound impact on the course of world history over the latter half of the 20th century; and

WHEREAS, Although the Cold War never erupted into a full-scale armed conflict between the world's superpowers, it gave impetus to a number of localized hot wars, as well as to a massive, long-term arms race; and

WHEREAS, Throughout the Cold War, the State of Texas played a significant role in this country's military preparedness, contributing personnel to the armed forces, serving as the site of important military facilities, and providing material support by way of private industry; and

WHEREAS, Tens of thousands of Texans served in the military during the course of the Cold War, and many made the ultimate sacrifice; Texan losses in Korea, from 1950 to 1957, numbered 1,719, and in Vietnam, 3,415; and

WHEREAS, The state currently has 16 military installations
that figured notably in the country's defense system during the
period of the Cold War; moreover, Texas was home to Nike and Atlas
Ballistic Missile silos, as well as to Strategic Air Command units
at Biggs, Carswell, Sheppard, Dyess, Amarillo, and Bergstrom Air

- 1 Force Bases; other air force bases located in the state during that
- 2 time included Brooks, Goodfellow, Kelly, Lackland, Laredo,
- 3 Laughlin, Randolph, Reese, and Webb; and
- 4 WHEREAS, All 15 of those air force facilities constituted
- 5 first-strike targets for the Soviet military; secondary targets in
- 6 Texas included Beeville, Corpus Christi, Kingsville,
- 7 Sherman-Denison, Texarkana, Fort Bliss, Fort Hood, and the Houston
- 8 petrochemical complex; and
- 9 WHEREAS, Many industrial enterprises in Texas made vital
- 10 contributions during the Cold War years; the state's oil industry
- 11 had a major role in supplying the Strategic Petroleum Reserve,
- 12 while a number of key defense contractors were either based in Texas
- 13 or had large Texas operations; among such companies were Texas
- 14 Instruments, Lockheed, EDS, Bell Helicopter, and Textron; and
- WHEREAS, One dimension of the Cold War involved a race for
- 16 leadership in space exploration; crucial to American efforts in
- 17 this arena was the Johnson Space Center in Houston, the NASA
- 18 headquarters for manned spaceflight; and
- 19 WHEREAS, Eight successive American presidents grappled with
- the challenges of the Cold War; two of these--Dwight D. Eisenhower
- 21 and Lyndon B. Johnson--were born in Texas and led the nation during
- the Korean War and Vietnam War, respectively; and
- WHEREAS, Military veterans of the Cold War have continued to
- 24 contribute to this country as private citizens and as public
- 25 servants; a number of them have been elected to leadership posts at
- 26 both the state and national levels; and
- 27 WHEREAS, It is essential that the history of the Cold War

- decades be preserved, for the events of that time touched the lives
- 2 of millions of people and helped to set the stage for the 21st
- 3 century; in reflecting on that long and difficult confrontation, it
- 4 is also fitting that tribute be paid to the men and women of the
- 5 United States armed forces, who served selflessly and heroically in
- 6 that epic struggle; now, therefore, be it
- 7 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives of the 79th Texas
- 8 Legislature hereby recognize May 1, 2005, as Cold War Victory Day
- 9 and extend to all Cold War veterans of the American military sincere
- 10 appreciation for their exemplary service.
