1 WHEREAS, Residents of the city of Socorro are justifiably 2 proud of their community's contributions to the State of Texas; and 3 WHEREAS, Located on the Southern Pacific Railroad in El Paso County, Socorro traces its rich history back to 1680, when Spanish 4 5 and Piro Indian refugees fled the New Mexican Pueblo Indian Revolt and settled in the El Paso region; two years later, Spanish 6 explorers established Nuestra Senora de la Limpia Concepcion del 7 Socorro Mission, and the town developed around the site; and 8 WHEREAS, In 1848, the city became a part of the State of Texas 9 and prospered as a small farming community for the remainder of the 10 11 19th century; the construction of the Elephant Butte Dam on the Rio 12 Grande in 1916 transformed the family-based economy into large-scale cotton production on plantation-sized estates; and 13 14 WHEREAS, Today, citizens of Socorro continue to devote themselves to safeguarding their city's vibrant colonial heritage, 15 and they have instituted a landmark commission to encourage 16 historic preservation in the area; and 17 18 WHEREAS, With its thriving sense of community and history, the city of Socorro remains a treasured asset of the Lone Star 19 State, and it is a pleasure to pay tribute to this special town and 20 21 its citizens; now, therefore, be it
