4	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
5	SECTION 1. Section 28.002, Education Code, is amended by
6	amending Subsections (a), (k), and (l) and adding Subsections
7	(1-1), (1-2), and (1-3) to read as follows:
8	(a) Each school district that offers kindergarten through
9	grade 12 shall offer, as a required curriculum:
10	(1) a foundation curriculum that includes:
11	(A) English language arts;
12	(B) mathematics;
13	(C) science; and
14	(D) social studies, consisting of Texas, United
15	States, and world history, government, and geography; and
16	(2) an enrichment curriculum that includes:
17	(A) to the extent possible, languages other than
18	English;
19	(B) health, with emphasis on the importance of
20	proper nutrition and exercise;
21	(C) physical education;
22	(D) fine arts;
23	(E) economics, with emphasis on the free
24	enterprise system and its benefits;

1 2 (F) career and technology education; and

(G) technology applications.

3 (k) The State Board of Education, in consultation with the 4 [Texas] Department of <u>State</u> Health <u>Services</u> and the Texas Diabetes 5 Council, shall develop a diabetes education program that a school 6 district may use in the health curriculum under Subsection 7 (a)(2)(B).

The State Board of Education, after consulting with (1)8 9 educators, parents, and medical professionals, by rule may require 10 a student enrolled in kindergarten or a grade level below grade nine [seven in an elementary school setting] to participate in daily 11 physical activity as part of a school district's physical education 12 curriculum or through structured activity during a school campus's 13 daily recess, except that the board may not require more than 30 14 minutes of daily physical activity. If the board adopts rules under 15 16 this subsection, the board must ensure by rule that students enrolled in middle and junior high school settings are allowed to 17 meet the physical activity requirement by participating in physical 18 activity twice each week throughout the school year or the option to 19 schedule at least two semesters overall. If the board adopts rules 20 under this subsection, the board must provide for an exemption for: 21 22 (1) any [a] student who is unable to participate in daily physical activity because of illness or disability; and 23 (2) a middle school or junior high school student who 24 25 participates in an extracurricular activity with a physical

26 <u>activity component that is considered a structured activity under</u> 27 rules adopted by the State Board of Education.

(l-1) In adopting rules relating to an activity described by
Subsection (1)(2), the State Board of Education may permit an
exemption for a student who participates in a school-related
activity or an activity sponsored by a private league or club only
if the student provides proof of participation in the activity.
(1-2) To encourage school districts to promote physical
activity for children through classroom curricula for health and
physical education, the agency, in consultation with the Department
of State Health Services, shall designate nationally recognized
health and physical education program guidelines that a school
district may use in the health curriculum under Subsection
(a)(2)(B) or the physical education curriculum under Subsection
<u>(a)(2)(C)</u> .
(1-3)(1) This subsection may be cited as "Lauren's Law."
(2) The State Board of Education, the Department of
State Health Services, or a school district may not adopt any rule,
policy, or program under Subsections (a), (k), (l), (l-1), or (l-2)
that would prohibit a parent or grandparent of a student from
providing any food product of the parent's or grandparent's choice
to:
(A) children in the classroom of the child of the
parent or grandparent on the occasion of the child's birthday; or
(B) children at a school-designated function.
SECTION 2. Subsection (k), Section 28.004, Education Code,
is amended to read as follows:
(k) A school district shall <u>publish in the student handbook</u>
and post on the district's Internet website, if the district has an

1 Internet website [make available for reasonable public 2 inspection]:

3 (1) a statement of the policies adopted to ensure that
4 [students in] elementary school, middle school, and junior high
5 school students [grades] engage in at least 30 minutes per school
6 day or 135 minutes per school week of physical activity; and

(2) a statement of:

8 (A) the number of times during the preceding year
9 the district's school health advisory council has met;

10 (B) whether the district has adopted and enforces 11 policies to ensure that district campuses comply with agency 12 vending machine and food service guidelines for restricting student 13 access to vending machines; and

14 (C) whether the district has adopted and enforces 15 policies and procedures that prescribe penalties for the use of 16 tobacco products by students and others on school campuses or at 17 school-sponsored or school-related activities.

18 SECTION 3. The heading to Section 38.013, Education Code, 19 is amended to read as follows:

Sec. 38.013. COORDINATED HEALTH PROGRAM FOR ELEMENTARY,
 <u>MIDDLE, AND JUNIOR HIGH</u> SCHOOL STUDENTS.

SECTION 4. Section 38.013, Education Code, is amended by amending Subsections (a) and (a-1) and adding Subsection (c) to read as follows:

(a) The agency shall make available to each school district
one or more coordinated health programs designed to prevent
obesity, cardiovascular disease, and Type 2 diabetes in elementary

1 school, middle school, and junior high school students. Each
2 program must provide for coordinating:

- health education;
- 4

(2) physical education and physical activity;

5

(3) nutrition services; and

6

(4) parental involvement.

7 (a-1) The commissioner by rule shall adopt criteria for evaluating a coordinated health program before making the program 8 9 available under Subsection (a). Before adopting the criteria, the 10 commissioner shall request review and comment concerning the criteria from the [Texas] Department of State Health Services 11 [Health's] School Health Advisory Committee. The commissioner may 12 make available under Subsection (a) only those programs that meet 13 criteria adopted under this subsection. 14

15 (c) The commissioner by rule shall adopt criteria for 16 evaluating the nutritional services component of a program under 17 this section that includes an evaluation of program compliance with 18 the Department of Agriculture guidelines relating to foods of 19 minimal nutritional value.

20 SECTION 5. The heading to Section 38.014, Education Code, 21 is amended to read as follows:

Sec. 38.014. IMPLEMENTATION OF COORDINATED HEALTH PROGRAM
 FOR ELEMENTARY, MIDDLE, AND JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS.

24 SECTION 6. Subsection (a), Section 38.014, Education Code, 25 is amended to read as follows:

26 (a) Each school district shall:

27 (1) participate in appropriate training for the

implementation of the program approved by the agency under Section
 38.013; and

3 (2) implement the program in each elementary school,
4 middle school, and junior high school in the district.

5 SECTION 7. Subchapter A, Chapter 38, Education Code, is 6 amended by adding Section 38.0141 to read as follows:

7 Sec. 38.0141. REPORTING OF CERTAIN HEALTH AND SAFETY INFORMATION REQUIRED. Each school district shall provide to the 8 agency information as required by the commissioner, including 9 statistics and data, relating to student health and physical 10 activity and information described by Section 28.004(k), presented 11 in a form determined by the commissioner. The district shall 12 provide the information required by this section for the district 13 and for each campus in the district. 14

15 SECTION 8. Subsection (a), Section 39.182, Education Code, 16 is amended to read as follows:

(a) Not later than December 1 of each year, the agency shall prepare and deliver to the governor, the lieutenant governor, the speaker of the house of representatives, each member of the legislature, the Legislative Budget Board, and the clerks of the standing committees of the senate and house of representatives with primary jurisdiction over the public school system a comprehensive report covering the preceding school year and containing:

(1) an evaluation of the achievements of the state
educational program in relation to the statutory goals for the
public education system under Section 4.002;

27 (2) an evaluation of the status of education in the

state as reflected by the academic excellence indicators adopted under Section 39.051;

3 (3) a summary compilation of overall student 4 performance on academic skills assessment instruments required by Section 39.023 with the number and percentage of students exempted 5 6 from the administration of those instruments and the basis of the 7 exemptions, aggregated by grade level, subject area, campus, and district, with appropriate interpretations and analysis, 8 and 9 disaggregated by race, ethnicity, gender, and socioeconomic 10 status;

(4) a summary compilation of overall performance of 11 students placed in <u>a disciplinary</u> [an] alternative education 12 program established under Section 37.008 on academic skills 13 assessment instruments required by Section 39.023 with the number 14 15 of those students exempted from the administration of those 16 instruments and the basis of the exemptions, aggregated by district, grade level, and subject area, with appropriate 17 18 interpretations and analysis, and disaggregated by race, ethnicity, gender, and socioeconomic status; 19

(5) a summary compilation of overall performance of 20 students at risk of dropping out of school, as defined by Section 21 22 29.081(d), on academic skills assessment instruments required by Section 39.023 with the number of those students exempted from the 23 administration of those instruments and the basis of 24 the 25 exemptions, aggregated by district, grade level, and subject area, with appropriate interpretations and analysis, and disaggregated 26 27 by race, ethnicity, gender, and socioeconomic status;

(6) an evaluation of the correlation between student
 grades and student performance on academic skills assessment
 instruments required by Section 39.023;

4 (7) a statement of the dropout rate of students in 5 grade levels 7 through 12, expressed in the aggregate and by grade 6 level, and a statement of the completion rates of students for grade 7 levels 9 through 12;

(8) a statement of:

9 (A) the completion rate of students who enter 10 grade level 9 and graduate not more than four years later;

(B) the completion rate of students who enter grade level 9 and graduate, including students who require more than four years to graduate;

14 (C) the completion rate of students who enter 15 grade level 9 and not more than four years later receive a high 16 school equivalency certificate;

(D) the completion rate of students who enter grade level 9 and receive a high school equivalency certificate, including students who require more than four years to receive a certificate; and

(E) the number and percentage of all students who
have not been accounted for under Paragraph (A), (B), (C), or (D);

(9) a statement of the projected cross-sectional and longitudinal dropout rates for grade levels 9 through 12 for the next five years, assuming no state action is taken to reduce the dropout rate;

27 (10) a description of a systematic, measurable plan

1 for reducing the projected cross-sectional and longitudinal 2 dropout rates to five percent or less for the 1997-1998 school year; 3 (11) a summary of the information required by Section 4 29.083 regarding grade level retention of students and information 5 concerning:

6 (A) the number and percentage of students 7 retained; and

8 (B) the performance of retained students on
9 assessment instruments required under Section 39.023(a);

10 (12) information, aggregated by district type and 11 disaggregated by race, ethnicity, gender, and socioeconomic 12 status, on:

(A) the number of students placed in <u>a</u>
 <u>disciplinary</u> [an] alternative education program established under
 Section 37.008;

(B) the average length of a student's placement in <u>a disciplinary</u> [an] alternative education program established under Section 37.008;

(C) the academic performance of students on
 assessment instruments required under Section 39.023(a) during the
 year preceding and during the year following placement in <u>a</u>
 <u>disciplinary</u> [an] alternative education program; and

(D) the dropout rates of students who have been
 placed in <u>a disciplinary</u> [an] alternative education program
 established under Section 37.008;

26 (13) a list of each school district or campus that does27 not satisfy performance standards, with an explanation of the

1 actions taken by the commissioner to improve student performance in 2 the district or campus and an evaluation of the results of those 3 actions;

4 (14) an evaluation of the status of the curriculum 5 taught in public schools, with recommendations for legislative 6 changes necessary to improve or modify the curriculum required by 7 Section 28.002;

8 (15) a description of all funds received by and each
9 activity and expenditure of the agency;

10 (16) a summary and analysis of the instructional 11 expenditures ratios and instructional employees ratios of school 12 districts computed under Section 44.0071;

13 (17) a summary of the effect of deregulation, 14 including exemptions and waivers granted under Section 7.056 or 15 39.112;

16 (18) a statement of the total number and length of 17 reports that school districts and school district employees must 18 submit to the agency, identifying which reports are required by 19 federal statute or rule, state statute, or agency rule, and a 20 summary of the agency's efforts to reduce overall reporting 21 requirements;

(19) a list of each school district that is not in compliance with state special education requirements, including:

(A) the period for which the district has notbeen in compliance;

(B) the manner in which the agency considered thedistrict's failure to comply in determining the district's

1 accreditation status; and

(C) an explanation of the actions taken by the
commissioner to ensure compliance and an evaluation of the results
of those actions;

5 (20) comparison of the performance а of 6 open-enrollment charter schools and school districts on the 7 academic excellence indicators specified in Section 39.051(b) and accountability measures adopted under Section 39.051(g), with a 8 9 separately aggregated comparison of the performance of open-enrollment charter schools predominantly serving students at 10 risk of dropping out of school, as defined by Section 29.081(d), 11 with the performance of school districts; [and] 12

13 (21) <u>a summary of the information required by Section</u> 14 <u>38.0141 regarding student health and physical activity from each</u> 15 <u>school district; and</u>

16 (22) any additional information considered important 17 by the commissioner or the State Board of Education.

SECTION 9. Subchapter D, Chapter 1001, Health and Safety
Code, is amended by adding Section 1001.0711 to read as follows:

Sec. 1001.0711. SCHOOL HEALTH ADVISORY COMMITTEE. (a) 20 The commission by rule shall establish a School Health Advisory 21 22 Committee at the department to provide assistance to the council in establishing a leadership role for the department in support for 23 and delivery of coordinated school health programs and school 24 25 health services. The committee shall include at least: 26 (b)

(1) one representative from the Department of

1 Agriculture, appointed by the commissioner of agriculture; and

2 (2) one representative from the Texas Education
3 Agency, appointed by the commissioner of education.

4 (c) Section 2110.008, Government Code, does not apply to a 5 committee created under this section.

SECTION 10. Section 38.013, Education Code, as amended by 6 7 this Act, applies only to approval of a coordinated health program evaluated on or after the effective date of this Act. The Texas 8 Education Agency shall continue to make available to school 9 10 districts a coordinated health program evaluated and approved before the effective date of this Act under Section 38.013, 11 Education Code, as that section existed before amendment by this 12 Act, until the approval of the program expires as provided by 19 13 T.A.C. Section 102.1031. 14

15 SECTION 11. Except as provided by Section 10 of this Act, 16 this Act applies beginning with the 2006-2007 school year.

SECTION 12. Not later than January 1, 2006, the Health and Human Services Commission shall adopt rules to establish the School Health Advisory Committee as provided by Section 1001.0711, Health and Safety Code, as added by this Act.

SECTION 13. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this Act takes effect September 1, 2005.
